MIAMI HURRICANES at OKLAHOMA SOONERS

When: Saturday, September 8, 2007, at noon ET

Where: Oklahoma Memorial Stadium (natural grass; 82,112) in Miami

TV: The game will be broadcast nationally on ABC, with Ron Franklin (play by play), Ed Cunningham (analysis) and Jimmy Dykes (field reporter).

THIS WEEK'S GAME: The Randy Shannon Era has begun, and after an impressive 31-3 season-opening victory over Marshall, things get tougher when the Miami Hurricanes make their first road trip of the season to face the Oklahoma Sooners on Saturday in Norman, Okla. The game will be nationally televised on ABC.

This is the first meeting between Miami and Oklahoma since the 1980s, when the two schools had three memorable matchups, with the Hurricanes winning all three games. In 1985, Troy Aikman was injured and Jamelle Holieway took over. Although Miami won the game 27-14 in Norman, Okla., the Sooners won the national championship that season. A year later, in 1986, the two schools were ranked No. 1 and 2, and the game matched Vinny Testaverde and Michael Irvin against Brian Bosworth and Co., with Miami winning 28-16 in a classic and Testaverde throwing for four touchdowns. A year later, on January 1, 1998, the teams met in the Orange Bowl Classic for the national championship, with Miami prevailing 20-14 to win its second national title. The two schools also played in 1973 and 1975, with Oklahoma winning both times.

Oklahoma won its 2007 season opener 79-10 over North Texas at home. Redshirt freshman quarterback Sam Bradford passed for 363 yards and three touchdowns, and wide receiver Juaqu Iglesias caught seven passes for 128 yards, with Malcolm Kelly making four catches for 118 yards and two TDs. The Sooners also gained 265 yards on the ground and held North Texas to 232 total yards.

This is the first game of a home-and-home series. The Hurricanes will host Oklahoma on Sept. 12, 2009 at Dolphin Stadium.

The Hurricanes have lost their last two road openers, at Louisville in 2006 and at Florida State in 2005. Prior to that, UM had won four consecutive road openers.

In their season opener, the Hurricanes were led by a opportunistic defense and a powerful running game. The defense held Marshall to 234 yards while intercepting four passes and making six sacks, the team's most in three years. DL Vegas Franklin recorded two sacks, DE Eric Moncur had 1.5 sacks, and All-America DE Calais Campbell had five tackles and the team's first interception by a defensive lineman since 2001. The UM running game totaled 260 yards rushing, with true freshman Graig Cooper rushing for 116 yards in his first collegiate game and sophomore Javarris James gaining 99 yards and scoring two touchdowns. Cooper's performance was the best ever by a Miami running back in his debut game.

THE OPPONENT: Oklahoma is 1-0, after having defeated North Texas 79-10 last Saturday in Norman, Okla. In 2006, Oklahoma finished 11-3 and won the Big 12 championship before losing in the Fiesta Bowl to Boise State in that thrilling come-from-behind victory for the Broncos. Oklahoma has won seven national championships, its last in 2000.

THE SERIES: This will be the six meeting between the two schools, and Miami has a 3-2 lead in the series, having won the last three games. In the last meeting, Miami won the 1987 national championship with a 20-14 win over Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl Classic.

THE COACHES: Randy Shannon is 1-0 at Miami. Oklahoma's Bob Stoops is 87-19 in nine seasons.
A HURRICANES VICTORY OVER THE SOONERS WOULD: Give Miami a 2-0 record and thrust them back into the top 20 for the first time in a year. It would also give Miami a 2-0 start for the first time since 2004.

MIAMI PLAYERS AMONG BEST IN THE NATION ACADEMICALLY

The University of Miami is known as a "Pipeline to the Pros" for the number of football players it sends on to the NFL. However, it is also one of the nation's finest educational institutions, and the achievements of the football program bears that out:

■ UM's football program tied for 10th in the NCAA in the 2006-07 Academic Progress Rate.

■ In 2006, Miami placed more players on the ACC Academic Football Team than any other school in the conference. Miami led the way with eight players who either had a 3.0 G.P.A. for fall semester or who maintained a 3.0 cumulative grade point average during his career. UM was followed by Duke and Boston College with six players, and Florida State with four.

The eight players cited for their academics in 2006 were: G Andrew Bain, OT Jason Fox, TE Greg Olsen, PK Jon Peattie, S Kenny Phillips, LB Darryl Sharpton, WR Sam Shields and C Anthony Wollschlager. Five of those players return in 2007: Bain, Fox, Phillips, Sharpton and Shields.

■ Miami has 13 student-athletes on this year's team who have already graduated, a total that could lead the country for the second time in three years (no school has had more than 11 graduates in the last four years). Already graduated from UM are: long snapper Ross Abramson (business management), G Andrew Bain (psychology), PK Grant Brown (sport administration), LB Glenn Cook (marketing), S Willie Cooper (liberal arts), LB Tavares Gooden (liberal arts), WR Darnell Jenkins (liberal arts), G Derrick Morse (criminology), OL John Rochford (business management), CB Glenn Sharp (sport administration), OL Cyrim Wimbs (liberal arts), QB Kyle Wright (sport administration) and PK Francesco Zampogna (language studies).

■ In the last two years (2005-2006), Miami graduated a total of 37 football players (fall and spring commencement totals), a number that led the NCAA in that time.

■ In 2006, Miami ranked second in the country (tied with Notre Dame), with nine graduates behind only Auburn, which had 11 graduates.

■ In 2005, Miami led the nation with 11 graduates on the football team.

NO RUNNING VS. THE HURRICANES

In the season opener, Miami held Marshall to 51 yards rushing on 32 carries for an average of 1.6 yards per carry. In its last 14 games, the Miami defense has only allowed one team to rush for more than 100 yards. The Hurricanes allowed 132 yards rushing against Virginia on Nov. 18, 2006 to snap a 10-game streak of holding opponents under 100 yards rushing. UM's 2006 rush defense ranked fourth in the NCAA, allowing an average of only 67.8 yards per game, a school record.

FRESHMEN IN THE LINEUP AGAIN

Miami played 10 true freshmen in this year's season opener, matching last season's overall total. DeMarcus Van Dyke started at right cornerback, and running back Graig Cooper split time in the backfield and led the team with 116 rushing yards, the best debut ever for a UM runner.

In 2006, no team in the ACC had more games started by true freshmen than the Hurricanes. A total of 10 true freshmen played for the Hurricanes last season, and six of those players started a total of 38 games. Only Florida State played more true freshmen in the ACC last year, but the Seminoles' 17 freshmen started only 27 games. ACC champion Wake Forest did not play any true freshman last season.

CAMPBELL, PHILLIPS LOOKING FOR ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Hurricane defenders Calais Campbell and Kenny Phillips are strong candidates for All-America honors in 2007. Here's a quick look at their qualifications.

DE Calais Campbell

►In the 2007 season opener, he recorded five tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss. He also added his first career interception, the first by a Miami defensive lineman since 2001.

2006:

- In 2006, the 6-8, 280-pound junior ranked third on the No. 7-ranked defense with 84 tackles (49 solo).
- Led the team with 20.5 tackles for loss, a total that ranked fourth in Division 1-A football in 2006 and led all returning defensive linemen in BCS conferences.
- Ranked second on the team with 10.5 sacks. That total ranked 15th in college football and second among sophomores in BCS conference schools. It was also tied for the ninth-highest single-season total in school history.
- Had a streak of seven straight games with at least one sack, which was the second-longest streak in school history.
- Had three forced fumbles, which led the team and the ACC, as well as, four pass breakups, 17 QB pressures and one fumble recovered.
- Named All-ACC along with All-American Gaines Adams.
- Voted the team's Most Valuable Player as a sophomore.

S Kenny Phillips

►In the 2007 season opener, totaled five tackles and assisted on a tackle for loss

2006:

- A 6-3, 210-pound junior, he is often compared to former Hurricanes greats Sean Taylor and Ed Reed.
- Named third-team All-America as a sophomore in 2006 despite missing three games with a broken thumb.
- Ranked third on the team with 71 tackles (53 solo), six tackles for loss and six pass breakups.
- Had a team-high four interceptions
- Named second-team All-ACC and to the ACC Academic Team

SHANNON'S DEFENSE CARRIES ON

Randy Shannon's defense finished the 2006 season ranked seventh in the NCAA in total defense, fourth in rushing defense, 13th in scoring defense and 40th in pass defense. Those rankings would be the envy of almost any defensive coordinator, but they are similar to how Shannon's defenses ranked in his six seasons as the defensive coordinator prior to being named head coach. His defenses led the country in scoring or passing defense in four of his six years as the DC.

Shannon's defenses have ranked among the NCAA's top 10 in five of the last six seasons. Only Louisiana State can match that success rate, with Virginia Tech making four appearances in the NCAA's top 10 over the last six seasons. The 2007 defense should continue that trend under new defensive coordinator Tim Walton. With seven defensive starters, UM has already gotten off to a good start this season. The Hurricanes limited Marshall to 234 total yards and 51 rushing yards in the season opener. Below is a breakdown of the performances of Shannon's defenses over the last six seasons as well as the start to the 2007 season:

TOUGH TO SCORE ON

Miami has allowed the fewest defensive touchdowns in college football over the last nine seasons, 165 in 101 games. That averages out to fewer than two touchdowns per game (1.63). In 2006, the Hurricanes defense allowed only 22 touchdowns in 13 games. Below is a look at where Miami compares to the rest of the D-I leaders since 1999.

MIAMI MEDIA POLICIES

Post-Game Interviews

The University of Miami is aware of the importance of media coverage and places great importance on the role of the media insofar as it interacts with their respective duties. To ensure the most workable situation for members of both entities, the following procedures must be observed.

1. The University of Miami football program will observe the customary cooling-off period as granted by the NCAA. Following the game's conclusion and after the team has left the field, media members may assemble outside the locker room. Upon conclusion of the cooling-off period, a UM SID representative will guide media into the locker room.
2. Miami head coach Randy Shannon will be brought directly to the interview room upstairs from the UM locker room as soon as he dismisses the team. The locker room will be open to media as soon as possible after coach Shannon departs for the interview room.
3. Miami's locker room is open to all media.
4. Postgame quotes will be provided for Hurricanes home games.

Each visiting team will set its own post-game interview policy, which will be announced on the press box public address system during the fourth quarter. Check with the opposing team's sports information staff if you have further questions.

It is our sincere desire to make the post-game procedure run as smoothly as possible. Remember, both groups have important tasks and are under extreme pressure.

The Miami Athletic Department is not responsible for problems incurred by any member of the media not following the above procedures. Security personnel will facilitate only those following the proper guidelines. If you encounter a problem while following this procedure, please inform a member of the UM Sports Information staff immediately.

Statistics/Services

Complete game statistics, play-by-play and post-game quotes will be available at all UM home games. Running play-by-play sheets and statistics will be distributed throughout the game. A meal will be served approximately 90 minutes prior to kickoff and a snack at halftime.

Photographers

NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the playing field and outside the 25-yard line. In order to provide adequate working space for those shooting, there are two photo restraining lines surrounding the Orange Bowl playing field. The front line is for photographers and television camera operators actually shooting the contest.

Broadcasts

Those entities requiring live or taped radio or television broadcasts must notify and receive approval at least one week in advance from Mark Pray at (305) 284-3231.

2006 RUN DEFENSE WAS MIAMI'S BEST EVER

Although Miami has a strong defensive reputation, the 2006 run defense set a school record by allowing an average of only 67.85 yards per game, breaking the previous mark of 69.1 yards per game in 1989. The Hurricanes allowed only one 100-yard rusher all season. Not since 1994 had a Hurricane defense given up fewer than 100 rushing yards per game. Below is a list of the top five UM rush defenses.

If the talent on a team's run defense is dictated by who returns from the previous year, then Miami should be just fine in 2007. All-America defensive end Calais Campbell returns for his junior season, and although Campbell had 10.5 sacks last year, he says he actually likes playing against the run more than he does against the pass.

Next to Campbell on the D-line is DT Teraz McCray, who started eight games last season, making 25 tackles and two sacks. DL coach Clint Hurtt plans to rotate four defensive tackles this year. Joining McCray will be junior Dwayne Hendricks, junior Antonio Dixon and redshirt freshman Josh Holmes.

The other starting defensive end will be Eric Moncur, who started the first three games of 2006 before being sidelined by a knee injury. Campbell says Moncur is an even more gifted pass rusher than he is.

JAMES AND COOPER = THUNDER AND LIGHTNING

Miami's running backs Javarris James and Graig Cooper are quickly proving that they are one of the best running back tandems in the country.

In the season opener, they combined for 215 yards rushing and two touchdowns. James, the younger cousin of former UM great and current NFL star Edgerrin James, ran for 99 yards on 14 carries (7.1-yard average) and scored two touchdowns. Cooper, a true freshman from Memphis, had the best debut ever for a Miami running back, gaining 116 yards on 12 carries (9.7-yard average).

Last year as a true freshman, James led the team with 802 yards rushing, which ranked second on the school's all-time list for rushing yards by a true freshman behind only Clinton Portis (838 yards in 1999).

EDGERRIN WAITING FOR JAVARRIS

Arizona Cardinals running back Edgerrin James said recently that he hopes that he plays long enough in the NFL to share the same backfield as his younger cousin, UM running back Javarris James.

"One of my dreams is to play on the same team with Baby J," Edgerrin said recently. "That's the one thing I've been wanting, so hopefully I can hold on. That's the first person I'll be willing to be a backup to."

Edgerrin James, who turned 29 in August, has played nine years in the NFL, rushing for 10,385 yards since 1999. Javarris rushed for 802 yards in 2005, the second-most ever by a Miami true freshman.

A year ago, Edgerrin said this of Javarris: "He's going to be the best back to come out of UM. He's ahead of his time. He's had hands-on coaching and everything. He's watched this for so long, sat in the background and watched me come through, (Clinton) Portis, Willis (McGahee). He's watched everybody. Every player that comes through, he knows their strength and what he likes about their game. You can see that he's going to be the best player because he has the short game, the mid-range game and the end game where he's going to take it to the house. That's the total package. He wants to be the best, that's the main thing."

"The difference between Baby J and myself is that Baby J is going to take it to the house a lot. He has that Eric Dickerson stride that's going to get you a bunch of big runs. That's the thing I've been telling people - this guy is going to take a lot of big runs to the house. What he has is natural. He has a lot of things that are part of his game that are going to make him the best back to come out of UM."

"A lot of people probably thought, 'Well, he's kin to Edgerrin and they just kind of pub him up and it's a bunch of hype.' But now you can believe the hype."

MIAMI FOOTBALL MOVES TO DOLPHIN STADIUM IN 2008

On August 21, the University of Miami announced that the Hurricanes football team will move its home games to Dolphin Stadium beginning with the 2008 football season. One of the top state-of-the-art stadiums in the country, the facility will provide student-athletes and fans with a first-class experience both on and off the field.

"This is a painful and sad decision. We all love the Orange Bowl, its history and traditions," said University of Miami President Donna E. Shalala. "Mayor Diaz and the Commissioners of the City of Miami made an extraordinary effort to identify funds and design a renovation. But in the end, it wasn't enough."

Home of the Miami Dolphins, the FedEx Orange Bowl and four Super Bowls, the stadium is a state-of-the-art facility that boasts all-chairback seats, new high-definition video boards, among the largest in collegiate and pro sports, four 103-inch plasma display boards including one of the world's largest plasma TVs, over 1,600 television monitors throughout the stadium and an all-new LED ribbon board. A \$300 million renovation project, currently underway, will add 360,000 square feet of enclosed space to the facility, making Dolphin Stadium one of the premier facilities in the country.

Many traditions from the Orange Bowl will be moved to Dolphin Stadium including the team running on the field through the smoke tunnel, the Miami Ring of Honor and "Touchdown Tommy," the cannon fired each time the Hurricanes score.

"We are committed to providing the best facilities for our student-athletes and fans," said UM Athletic Director Paul Dee. "The decision to move to Dolphin Stadium was made for that reason. Our student-athletes will be playing in one of the best facilities in the country and the 'fan experience' will be first-class."

UM football officials expect the move to help improve recruiting. "Hurricanes football has a strong tradition of attracting top student-athletes. The move to the stadium and the superior facilities that it offers will greatly enhance our recruiting efforts," said football head coach Randy Shannon.

The University of Miami will continue to offer competitive and consistent ticket pricing. Exact ticket and parking prices will be announced by January 2008. MIAMI'S BAND OF BROTHERS

In an effort to build team unity, coach Randy Shannon screened episodes of HBO's "Band Of Brothers" to the team through the August training camp. The entire team and coaching staff would gather together in the Edgerrin James team meeting room to watch the show.

The 10-part series, that ran on HBO in 2001 and was originally a best-selling book by Stephen Ambrose, is about the 101st Airborne's Easy Company, a squad of paratroopers that landed at D-Day and eventually captured Hitler's "Eagle's Nest" fortress at the end of the war.

Junior offensive lineman Chris Rutledge said, "It's a message of togetherness and unity in the heart of battle. When bullets are flying around you, you know how to stay cool and calm under pressure, not make a mistake and just know that your partner has your back. The team was always a unit, but this show has probably brought us more together, just the concept of working harder together and trusting the person next to you that he's going to do his job."

Punter Daren Daly commented, "It shows how unity and team and staying together is vital, whether you're on the war front or the football field. It's a great show. The whole team, coaches all get together to watch."

And safety Willie Cooper added, "It has messages about overcoming fear, trust, things that are essential to a team. Every time you watch you get a different meaning from it."

HURRICANES' HIGH STANDARDS

One of the first things Randy Shannon did after Miami promoted him from defensive coordinator to head coach in the offseason was gather his players and ask them to raise their hands if they've ever won a national championship. Of course, none could. The Hurricanes haven't won a national title since 2001, and the player who has been around the longest, CB Glenn Sharpe, came aboard in 2002. Then Shannon told his players how he won national titles as a player (1987), graduate assistant (1991) and defensive coordinator (2001).

"If you've never won one, trust me that I can show you how to do it," he recalled telling them.

Game Day Press Policies

Only working press will be admitted to the Orange Bowl press box. The 100 seats will be issued according to the following criteria:

1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area, and student newspapers from UM and opponent's schools.
2. Other daily newspapers, with preference to those that regularly cover UM.
3. Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting.
4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover UM.
5. Scouts. Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status.

Conference Road Game Credentials

Writers covering UM on a regular basis should make all requests for conference road credentials directly with the home team.

Non-Conference Road Game Credentials

Writers covering UM on a regular basis may make requests for non-conference road credentials with the UM Sports Information Office. Credential requests are faxed to the opponent school by Monday two weeks prior to the contest.

FOURTH-QUARTER DOMINANCE

Over the last 22 seasons, Miami has been almost unbeatable when leading after three quarters. Since 1985, Miami has won 195 of 200 regular-season games in which it entered the fourth quarter with a lead. The five losses in this span occurred against Florida State and Georgia Tech (2006), Clemson (2004), East Carolina (1999) and West Virginia (1997). Prior to those five losses, UM's last loss when leading after three quarters was in 1984 against Maryland (42-40), after leading 34-21 heading into the fourth quarter.

THE HURRICANES WHEN SCORING 30 OR 31 POINTS ...

- Miami has won 130 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points since a 31-30 loss at Notre Dame in 1988.
- Miami has won 151 consecutive games when scoring 31 or more points since falling 39-37 to UCLA in the 1985 Fiesta Bowl.
- Excluding bowl games, Miami has won 145 consecutive regular-season games when scoring more than 31 since a 47-45 loss to Boston College in 1984.

IF MIAMI SCORES FIRST ...

Beginning with the 1983 season, the Hurricanes have gone 190-19 when scoring first. The last exception was against Georgia Tech in 2006 when Glenn Cook returned a fumble 19 yards for a touchdown on the first offensive play of the game. However, Georgia Tech was able to overcome that lead in a 30-23 win. In 2006, Miami scored first in five of its 13 games.

MIAMI'S RECORD ACCORDING TO AP RANK

UM is 246-62-2 all time in games while holding an Associated Press national ranking. Miami is 169-31-1 as a top 10 team and 130-17 as a top five team. The Hurricanes are 43-6 as the nation's No.1-ranked team. Miami has won 32 of its last 34 games when ranked No. 1.

MIAMI VS. ASSOCIATED PRESS-RANKED TEAMS

- Miami has won 23 of its last 34 games against ranked teams, dating back to the 2000 season.
- Miami is 84-109-1 vs. AP-ranked teams since its first game against a ranked opponent in No. 18 Alabama in 1941.
- Miami is 39-55 vs. AP top-10 teams since playing No. 6 Alabama in 1947.
- Miami is 22-32 against AP top-5 teams since playing No. 3 Maryland in 1953.
- Miami's victory over No. 1 Florida State on Oct. 7, 2000, extended UM's record to 10-7 against No. 1-ranked teams. Of those 16 meetings with No. 1, six of the past eight were against FSU.

MIAMI VS. RANKED & UNRANKED OPPONENTS SINCE 1990

Since 1990, Miami has registered a 44-32 mark against Associated Press ranked teams and a 117-10 record against unranked opponents. Miami's loss to North Carolina in 2004 marked the first loss to an unranked team since losing to East Carolina in 1999, a span of 65 games.

THE LAST TIME THEY MET....

1988 ORANGE BOWL - (2) MIAMI 20, (1) OKLAHOMA 14 FRIDAY, JANUARY 1, 1988 ORANGE BOWL STADIUM

MIAMI (AP) -- For the second time in five years, the University of Miami Hurricanes were champions of the college football world. Just as they had done in 1983, the '87 Hurricanes knocked off the nation's No.1-ranked team in the New Year's Day Orange Bowl Classic. The second-ranked Hurricanes capped the school's second straight undefeated regular season with a 20-14 victory over Oklahoma. Sophomore quarterback Steve Walsh hit on 18 of 30 passing attempts for 209 yards and two touchdowns. Senior fullback Melvin Bratton nearly broke a UM single game receiving mark by hauling in nine catches for 102 yards before leaving the game with a knee injury. Bernard Clark stepped into the spotlight at middle linebacker and walked away with the game's MVP award after recording 12 unassisted tackles and 14 overall stops, while the entire defensive unit limited the Sooners to just 255 yards in total offense.

The Miami offense took the game's first possession 65 yards for a score. Walsh fired a perfect 30-yard pass to Bratton, who had slipped past the Oklahoma secondary for the touchdown three minutes into the game. The Hurricanes' defense set the tone early for an evening of frustration for the Sooners' vaunted wishbone attack. Oklahoma was forced to punt on its first five possessions of the half. The Sooners finally got on the scoreboard just before halftime after a Walsh pass was intercepted by Rickey Dixon. Fifteen plays later, Oklahoma scored on a 1-yard run by halfback Anthony Stafford with nine seconds remaining in the half. In seven second-half possessions, Oklahoma was able to produce only two drives of more than four plays. The Hurricanes' first two drives of the second half accounted for 24 plays and two scores. Senior placekicker Greg Cox established a Orange Bowl Classic record when he hit a 56-yard field goal with 8:52 remaining in the third quarter. Three OU plays and a punt set up another Miami score. Miami drove the ball 64 yards on 13 plays, which ended with a Walsh to Michael Irvin touchdown pass that brought the score to 17-7. With just under four minutes remaining in the game, Cox punctuated the Hurricanes' scoring with another long field goal -- this time from 48 yards out. Oklahoma put together one last score with a trick play, as Sooners offensive guard Mark Hutson rambled into the endzone after picking up a deliberate fumble by quarterback Charles Thompson with 2:05 left in the game.

MARSHALL GAME NOTES VIRGINIA 31, MIAMI 3 SEPTEMBER 1, 2007 ORANGE BOWL

- Graig Cooper put together the best debut for a Miami freshman running back, finishing with 116 yards on 12 carries for a 9.7-yard per carry average.
- Javarris James rushed for 50 yards or more in a quarter for the fifth time in his career. He had six carries for 50 yards in today's first quarter versus Marshall and finished the game with 99 yards on 14 carries. Other 50-plus yard outings include: 55 yards in first quarter at Georgia Tech (Oct. 28, 2006), including a 49-yard run... 76 yards in third quarter vs. North Carolina (10/7/06), including a 62-yard run... 63 yards in first quarter and 80 yards in third quarter versus Houston (9/30/06) to finish with a career-high 148 yards on 18 carries.
- Miami's five scoring drives averaged one minute, 46 seconds (1:46) ... The quickest scoring drive lasted just six seconds, while the longest lasted three minutes, 36 seconds (3:36). Miami's 341 total yards of offense are the most by the team since a 420-yard offensive showing in a 14-13 win over Houston on Sept. 30, 2006.
- Miami's six sacks were the most since the Hurricanes posted seven vs. Louisiana Tech on Sept. 18, 2004, in a 48-0 Miami win.
- Francesco Zampogna's 34-yard field goal in the first quarter marked the first first quarter points in a season opener for the Hurricanes since facing Louisiana Tech on Aug. 28, 2003, and the 10 first-quarter points are the most by the Hurricanes since then. Miami is 190-19 all time when scoring first.
- Senior Spencer Adkins made it two picks by Hurricane linebackers with an interception in the third quarter. The last time a pair of Miami linebackers recorded a pick was in a 65-7 rout of Washington on Nov. 24, 2001, when Chris Campbell and Jonathan Vilma grabbed two of Miami's six interceptions in the game.
- Miami's captains for the game were DE Calais Campbell and OL Derrick Morse.
- Miami's defense has given up more than 20 points just twice in each of the last two seasons. The Hurricanes gave up just 51 rushing yards - the fewest yards allowed since Miami held Boston College to 24 yards on 25 carries in the Hurricanes' 17-14 win on Nov. 23, 2006.
- Senior Tavares Gooden recorded his first career interception in the first quarter, returning the ball 35 yards before being stopped the 1-yard line. Six seconds later, junior DajLeon Farr caught his first career touchdown reception on Kirby Freeman's first touchdown pass of 2007.
- Junior Calais Campbell recorded his first career interception in the second quarter. He was the first defensive lineman to pick off a ball since William Joseph versus Virginia Tech on Dec. 1, 2001, in a 26-24 Miami win.

MIAMI (AP) - Randy Shannon's debut as coach of the Miami Hurricanes was a breeze. Javarris James ran for two touchdowns, Tavares Gooden and Calais Campbell had interceptions to set up easy scoring drives, and the Hurricanes recorded six sacks while beating Marshall 31-3 at the Orange Bowl.

Graig Cooper ran 12 times for 116 yards in his first college game, James rushed for 99 more and Kirby Freeman completed 9 of 21 passes for 81 yards and a touchdown as Miami (1-0) won its final season-opener.

Bernard Morris completed 16 of 27 passes for 162 yards for Marshall (0-1), but he was intercepted three times.

Unranked entering a season for the first time since 1998, Miami looked at the opener as its first chance to prove this isn't the same sort of team that stumbled its way to a 7-6 record last season. The Hurricanes didn't waste time suggesting their new coach will change things around.

Shannon is a Miami native, was a star linebacker at the school and spent 14 years as a Hurricanes assistant. He was defensive coordinator the past six seasons under Larry Coker, who was fired in November and watched Saturday from the Orange Bowl's third floor -- as a TV analyst.

Shannon probably liked most of what he saw, too.

Gooden caught Morris' deflected pass midway through the opening quarter and ran it back 35 yards to the Marshall 1 -- not scoring only because Morris hopped on his back inside the 5 and eventually wrestled him down. On the next play, Freeman hit DajLeon Farr with a scoring pass that put Miami up 10-0.

Campbell's interception came with 3 1/2 minutes left in the second period. The 6-foot-8 defensive end released from a blocker and made a one-handed snare of Morris' pass, getting taken down at the Marshall 24. James scored on a 5-yard run three plays later for a 17-0 edge.

James pushed the lead to 24-0 with 7:06 left in the third with a 5-yard score. His 50-yard run on that drive was nullified by a holding penalty, but Cooper took off on a 56-yard scamper one play later to set up the Hurricanes' third touchdown.
