GAME INFORMATION

Texas Tech (10-0, 6-0) faces Big 12 South Division foe Oklahoma (9-1, 5-1) on Saturday in Norman at 7 p.m. CT, at Memorial Stadium.

GAME NOTES

► No. 2 Texas Tech is riding its highest ranking in school history as the Red Raiders enjoy the nation's longest winning streak at 12 games.

► The game is the 113th of Head Coach Mike Leach's career at Texas Tech and he boasts a 75-37 record during that span.

► Leach is one win shy of tying legendary Red Raider coach Pete Cawthon in second place on the all-time wins list at the school (Spike Dykes, 82 wins).

► Leach spent one season at Oklahoma as Bob Stoops' offensive coordinator in 1999.

► Leach is the third-most tenured coach in the Big 12 Conference at nine seasons, while his five bowl wins are second since the 2000 season.

► Texas Tech has a 4-0 record on the road this season, marking the first time since 1977 that a Tech team has won as many regular season games away from home.

► The most road wins in a season occurred three times – 1953, 1972 and 1976.

► Texas Tech ranks among the top offensive programs in passing offense (first), total offense (second) and scoring offense (third).

► The Texas Tech offensive line has yielded just five sacks in 499 pass attempts.

► Junior guard Brandon Carter and senior offensive tackle Rylan Reed have not yielded a sack all season.

► The Red Raider rush defense is ranked 20th nationally,

allowing 107.4 yards per game – the number is 8.2 yards per game better than the school record of 115.6 set in 1964.

► Tech's 1,326 yards rushing this season is the most since 2003, while the Red Raiders' 25 rushing scores is five shy of the school record of 30 set in 1993.

PLAYING FOR THE SOUTH

For the second time in Mike Leach's tenure, the Red Raiders' Big 12 South title hopes can be sealed with a win in Norman. Texas Tech entered the 2002 game at OU with a shot at winning the division, but suffered a 60-15 setback. A win this year would give the Red Raiders their first Big 12 South Division title since the inception of the league in 1996. A loss would force the Red Raiders to wait a week for the outcome of the Oklahoma-Oklahoma State game (Nov. 29). An OSU win against OU would hand Tech the South title.

RANKINGS

Texas Tech is ranked second by the AP and USA Today Coaches polls. Oklahoma is ranked fourth and fifth in the USA Today Coaches and AP polls, respectively.

THE TECH-OU SERIES

Oklahoma leads the series 11-4-0, but the Red Raiders have won two of the last three ... Tech dropped a 34-24 decision at Norman in 2006, after leading 24-17 at the half; OU held the Red Raiders scoreless in the second half, while tacking on three points in the third and two touchdowns in the fourth quarter for the win ... the series is relatively young as the two teams first met in 1992 ... OU won the first three, before Tech claimed a 22-12 win in the Big 12's inaugural season in 1996, Tech's only road win in the series.

TEXAS TECH VERSUS THE BIG 12

Texas Tech is 60-42 all-time in Big 12 Conference play and ranks fifth in conference wins during that span ... since Mike Leach arrived in 2000, the Red Raiders have won 41 league games, which ranks third behind Oklahoma (60) and Texas (58).

LAST GAME AGAINST THE SOONERS (TECH 34, OU 27)

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) -- Graham Harrell and Texas Tech knocked No. 3 Oklahoma out of the national title chase Saturday night with a 34-27 victory.

Harrell threw for 420 yards and two touchdowns for the Red Raiders (8-4, 4-4 Big 12) and for the 11th time this season a top-five team lost to an unranked team.

Texas Tech fans stormed the field after the win, the second straight in Lubbock for coach Mike Leach over Sooners coach Bob Stoops, his former boss at OU.

"It's unbelievable," said Harrell, who completed 47 of his career-high 72 passes. "We came out and executed. Coach Leach told us if we executed we could move the ball. That's exactly what we did."

With Oregon losing on Thursday, the Sooners (9-2, 5-2 Big 12), who were fourth in the latest BCS standings, appeared to be in good shape to play for a national title if they could have won out.

The Sooners failed to get on track after quarterback Sam Bradford left the game in the first quarter with an apparent concussion. He did not return.

Oklahoma offense came up feeble on all fronts, falling short of its season averages in rushing and scoring.

The loss put OU in a tie with No. 12 Texas for the Big 12 South title, but the Sooners have the head-to-head edge, having beaten the Longhorns in October, and can clinch a spot in the conference championship game with a victory next week against Oklahoma State.

The Red Raiders had never beaten a team as highly ranked. In 2002, Tech beat No. 4 Texas 42-38 in Lubbock.

Oklahoma backup Joey Halzle, who had attempted just nine passes before coming into the game, struggled to lead the Sooners, going 21-of-41 for 291 yards. He threw for two touchdowns and had one interception.

OU came into the game averaging 191 rushing yards and 45 points, but scored only two offensive TDs, the defense got another, and ran for 106 yards.

By the time the Sooners scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to make it 34-27, it was too late.

Texas Tech recovered an onside kick with less than half a minute left and the upset was complete.

Harrell rushed for Texas Tech's first touchdown. On the play before he scored, Harrell completed a 60-yard pass to his favorite receiver, Michael Crabtree. That pass allowed him to join five other quarterbacks -- two from Texas Tech -- who've thrown for at least 5,000 yards in a season.

Crabtree finished with 12 catches for 154 yards. It was the redshirt freshman's 10th game of 100 yards or more.

The Sooners went up 7-0 when Lendy Holmes intercepted a pass and returned it 67 yards for a touchdown.

But Tech got points soon after. On the Sooners first play from scrimmage, OU running back Allen Patrick fumbled and Texas Tech linebacker Marlon Williams picked it up and took it to the OU 34. Texas Tech couldn't move the ball, though, and settled for a 51-yard field goal to pull within 7-3.

Bradford came out with the Sooners play 7-3 after their second possession of the game. It appeared from television replays that he took a hard hit as he tried to make a tackle after Patrick fumbled on OU's first play from scrimmage. Bradford got up slowly.

Bradford, the nation's leading passer, sat alone on the bench until about 10 minutes remained in the first half when he walked with trainers up a ramp leading out of the stadium.

RED RAIDERS OFF TO HOT START

Only twice in school history have the Red Raiders started a season 10-0 and this year the Red Raiders keep adding to the history books as Tech moved to 10-0 with a 56-20 win over No. 8 Oklahoma State. The Red Raiders are also 6-0 in conference play for the first time in school history. A win over Oklahoma on Saturday in Norman would give Tech an 11-0 record for the first time ever.

BEST 10-GAME STARTS

Texas Tech has only held a 10-0 record twice during its 84-year history -- in 1938 and this season. The Red Raiders of 70 years ago finished the regular season 10-0, before dropping a 20-13 decision to St. Mary's in Tech's first Cotton Bowl appearance.

LOOKING FOR 11

If Texas Tech records an 11th win this season:

► It would mark only the third time in school history that Texas Tech has posted 11 wins.

► It would be the first time since 1973 that Tech has won 11 games. The other 11-win season came in 1953.

ALSO LOOKING FOR 7

Texas Tech's 6-0 conference record this season marks the most wins in conference play since 2005, when the Red Raiders finished with a 6-2 mark. Only two other teams have won six games in conference play in Tech's history -- 1973 and 1976. The 1973 squad finished the season with a 6-1 mark in Southwest Conference play, while the 1976 team's 7-1 record marks the most conference wins in a single season in school history.

NOVEMBER RECORD

Texas Tech is 19-10 in the Mike Leach era in games played during the 11th month ... the Red Raiders are in the midst of arguably their toughest stretch of November dates in school history with games against then-No. 1 Texas (W, 39-33) and then-No. 8 Oklahoma State (W, 56-20) ... the two games remaining include Saturday's meeting with No. 4/5 Oklahoma and Baylor (Nov. 29).

OKLAHOMA CONNECTIONS

Aside from the obvious Mike Leach connection, Texas Tech has several other ties to the University of Oklahoma and the state itself. Nine Red Raiders hail from north of the border -- WR Cornelius Douglas (Lawton), DE Joey Fowler (OKC Westmoore), RB Harrison Jeffers (Lawton Eisenhower), OL Joe King (OKC Putnam City North), DB LaRon Moore (Midwest City), DE Jake Ratliff (Lawton Eisenhower), DB Pete Richardson (Muskogee), WR Tramain Swindall (OKC Millwood) and NT Colby Whitlock (Noble). Tech running backs coach Seth Littrell was a running back at Oklahoma from 1997-2000 and was a captain on the Sooners' 2000 National Championship team. Defensive line coach Charlie Sadler was a member of the OU coaching staff from 1984-90, where he served as defensive line coach (84-88) and defensive coordinator (89-90). The Sooners won the National Championship in 1985 with Sadler on staff. Red Raider assistant strength coach Jozsef Szendrei is the most recent Sooner as he was a member of the OU basketball team earlier this decade. Beaver, Okla., native and Director of Football Operations Tommy McVay began his coaching career at Waynoka, Okla., in 1968, after graduating from Southeastern Oklahoma State University.

WE'RE STREAKING

Texas Tech currently owns the nation's longest win streak at 12 games, dating back to last year's 34-27 win over Oklahoma in Lubbock. The Red Raiders current streak of seven-straight conference wins also leads the Big 12 and is the longest conference streak in the country. Including last year's bowl game, Texas Tech has won five straight away from home, which ties fifth nationally.

► WR Michael Crabtree has caught at least five passes and a touchdown in 13-straight games, trailing former Pitt receiver Larry Fitzgerald, who holds the record with 14 games.

► QB Graham Harrell has completed at least 30 passes in four-straight games and has passed for 400+ yards in three of the four. Harrell also has completed at least 70 percent of his passes in the last four games and is sporting a 76.6 completion rate (154-of-201).

► The ground game tandem of running backs Baron Batch and Shannon Woods has produced 100-yard rushing games each Saturday this season, which is a school record. Not even during the Doak Walker Award-winning years of Byron Morris (1993) and Byron Hanspard (1996) did the Red Raiders rush for 100+ in 10-straight games.

► Texas Tech opened the season with four-straight interception games and currently have picked at least one pass in the last three.

STATS and RANKINGS

- Texas Tech has won 21 of its last 25 games, dating back to the 2006 season ... the Red Raiders have won at least eight games in each of the last seven seasons, which ranks third in the Big 12 Conference behind Oklahoma and Texas.
- Offensively, Texas Tech is ranked 73rd nationally in rushing offense (132.6, 10th in Big 12), 1st in passing offense (433.7, 1st in Big 12), second in total offense (566.3, 1st in Big 12), third in scoring offense (47.9, 2nd in Big 12) and 8th in pass efficiency (166.8, 5th in Big 12).
- Texas Tech's current average in scoring (47.9) is 5.4 points per game ahead of the school record set in 2003.
- Of Texas Tech's 70 offensive scoring drives this season, 27 have taken three minutes or less, including 12 under two minutes and four under a minute.
- Texas Tech has seven scoring drives of 90+ yards on the season, including a 97-yard effort against Oklahoma State and a 96-yard drive against Texas.
- Defensively, Texas Tech is ranked 47th nationally in pass efficiency defense (119.5, 2nd in Big 12), 60th in total defense (351.4, 2nd in Big 12), 46th in scoring defense (22.2, 2nd in Big 12), 98th in pass defense (244.0, 6th in Big 12) and 23rd in sacks (2.6, 3rd in Big 12).

STRIKING QUICK AND OFTEN

Texas Tech has consecutive scoring drives of five or more four times this season – seven each against Kansas State and Oklahoma State, six against UMass and five against Kansas. The six scoring drives against UMass went unanswered, while Tech twice scored 21 unanswered points against Oklahoma State. The Red Raiders' six scores against UMass took only 16:17 off the clock, while Tech used 15:12 in the five scoring drives at Kansas.

PLAYING AT A HIGH LEVEL

Dating back to the second game of the 2004 season, 11 of Texas Tech's 16 losses have come to teams ranked among the nation's top 25, including seven against top 15 programs. On the flipside, Texas Tech this season has wins over Kansas (18), Texas (1) and Oklahoma State (8). By virtue of playing the Big 12 Conference, the schedule year-in and year-out presents one of the greatest challenges in college football.

BIG 12 SOUTH REIGNS SUPREME

The Big 12 South Division can easily lay claim to being the best division and maybe the best conference of its own in the nation. The latest Associated Press poll has three Big 12 South Division teams in the top five including No. 2 Texas Tech, No. 4 Texas and No. 5 Oklahoma. Oklahoma State is just outside the top 10 at No. 11.

CRABTREE BATTING A THOUSAND

WR Michael Crabtree became only the second player in school history with two 1,000-yard seasons following the Oklahoma State game and has 1,010 yards on the season. Crabtree matches former Red Raider Joel Filani, who recorded back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons in 2005 and 2006. Texas Tech also has fielded a 1,000-yard receiver in each of the last six seasons. Only once prior to that stretch did a Tech receiver eclipse the total (Lloyd Hill, 1992).

500TH WIN A MEMORABLE ONE

All wins are memorable, but the last-second heroics against Texas will make Texas Tech's 500th win a conversation item for years to come. HARRELL CONTINUES TO MAKE HIS CASE FOR A TRIP TO NEW YORK

Senior quarterback and Heisman Trophy Candidate Graham Harrell proved again to a national television audience why he is worthy of a trip to New York City as a contender for the 2008 Heisman Memorial Trophy. Harrell is a semifinalist for the Maxwell and Davey O'Brien Awards and put up big numbers against Oklahoma State for the Red Raiders and led them to a 56-20 blowout. Harrell shredded the Cowboy defense for 456 yards (40-of-50 passing) and six touchdowns (tied his career high). He has five 400-yard passing games this season and four games with at least four TD passes. Additionally, he leads the country in passing (407.7) and total offense (407.2) and is the NCAA active career leader in touchdown passes (125), TDs responsible for (136) and passing yards (14,759).

the NCAA single-season mark, while Harrell narrowly missed breaking the record last season with a 5,705-yard performance. Kingsbury, in his third year in the offense in 2002, threw for 5,017.

► Harrell and All-America target Michael Crabtree have connected for touchdowns 40 times since the start of last season, which is a Big 12 record.

CRABTREE FOLLOWS UP TEXAS HEROICS WITH ANOTHER BIG GAME

Sophomore wide receiver and Heisman Trophy candidate Michael Crabtree followed up his heroics against Texas with another huge night for the Red Raiders. He finished the Oklahoma State game with eight catches for 89 yards and three touchdowns.

► Moved into sole possession of fifth place on the school's career touchdowns list as he now has 40. Surpassed Bobby Cavazos who had 32 career TD's between 1951-53.

► His three touchdowns gives him 40 for his career. Of the players in the top 10, Crabtree leads with a ratio of 1.7 touchdowns per game in 23 career games. The next closest is Troy Edwards, who averaged 1.47 TDs per game in 34 games from 1996-98.

► Caught a nine-yard touchdown pass with 10:56 remaining in the first half to give Tech a 20-7 lead. The TD reception was his 16th of the season and the 38th of his career.

► Grabbed his second touchdown of the night with 9:32 remaining in the third quarter when he hauled in an eight-yard pass to give the Red Raiders a 34-14 lead.

► Touchdown catch No. 3 of the evening came at the 4:05 mark in the third quarter when he caught a two-yard fade route to give the Red Raiders a 41-20 lead. His third TD catch of the night tied his career high that he has posted on numerous occasions.

CRABTREE SETS RECORD AGAINST OKLAHOMA STATE

WR Michael Crabtree has 40 career touchdowns over his freshman and sophomore seasons, surpassing former Pittsburgh receiver Larry Fitzgerald's NCAA record of 34 over the same span. Crabtree's scoring catches break the previous Tech record of 30, set by Jarrett Hicks from 2003-06. Crabtree is ninth all-time on the NCAA career touchdowns receptions list.

CRABTREE QUIETLY PRODUCTIVE...

...at least comparatively speaking. This time last season the 2007 Biletnikoff Award winner had over 1,000 yards and 18 touchdowns. That's not to say his performance this season is anything to yawn at. Crabtree's 101.0 yards per game still ranks among the top 10 nationally this season and he is second in the Big 12 Conference. He is averaging 10.8 points per game.

► Has caught at least five passes and one touchdown in 13-straight games, one game shy of the record set by Pitt's Larry Fitzgerald.

► Scored three times against Oklahoma State, the sixth 3-TD game of his career.

► Logged 127 yards and the game-winning touchdown on 10 receptions against Texas.

► Has scored in every game this year.

► Posted the 12th multi-TD game of his career at Kansas.

► Set the Tech career TD receptions record with his first against Nebraska ... finished the game with two.

► Solid outing at Kansas State with 107 yards and two touchdowns on nine receptions.

► Ranks eighth at Tech with 194 career receptions.

► Has 2,972 career receiving yards, which ranks fourth all-time at Texas Tech ... needs 98 to break the all-time mark of 3,069 yards, set by Wes Welker (2000-03).

DEFENSE SHUTS DOWN POTENT COWBOY OFFENSE

One of the nation's most balanced and potent offenses came face to face with a drastically different Texas Tech defense than of the past. Ruffin McNeill's defensive unit held Oklahoma State to 368 yards of total offense and just 168 yards on the ground. Tech also held the high scoring Cowboys to a season-low 20 points. OSU entered the game averaging 512 yards of total offense and 45.3 points per game.

TECH NOW 10-0 FOR THE FIRST TIME IN 70 YEARS

The 2008 Texas Tech Red Raiders have accomplished something that has not been done here in 70 years - started a season 10-0. For the first time since 1938, the Red Raiders stand at 10-0 on the year and have a 6-0 record in

HARRELL/CRABTREE DUO LIFTS TECH TO HUGE WIN

Texas Tech's Heisman Trophy candidates Michael Crabtree and Graham Harrell combined for their only touchdown of the game with one second left to give the Red Raiders their biggest win in school history. Harrell found Crabtree down the Texas sideline for a 28-yard touchdown reception with one second remaining and that gave the Red Raiders a come-from-behind 39-33 win over No. 1 Texas in front of 56,333 fans at Jones AT&T Stadium. The two have connected for touchdown passes 37 times (Big 12 record) in the last two years and No. 37 will forever be remembered in the Tech history books as it gave the Red Raiders their first-ever win over a team ranked No. 1 in the nation. WILLIAMS COMING THROUGH FOR THE RED RAIDERS

Sophomore placekicker Matt Williams continues his storybook journey on the Red Raider football team. Williams made his Red Raider debut at Kansas and kicked nine extra points and that earned him AT&T All-America Player of the Week honors. Williams, who earlier in the season was just a regular student at Texas Tech, quickly found himself on the team after winning a halftime promotion at the UMass game. Williams made a 30-yard field in the Lynwood Townhomes Kick-For-Rent contest and that drew the attention of head coach Mike Leach, who quickly found a spot for him on the team. After receiving word from the NCAA last week that he was eligible, he was named the starter three weeks ago in the extra point role. Williams has 27 points in three games.

DEFENSE COMES UP BIG AGAINST TEXAS

Nearly every pundit in the nation said that the defenses would settle the Texas game and that was certainly the case for Ruffin McNeill's unit. The Tech defense held a potent Texas offense to 110 yards under the season average, while also scoring nine points of its own to help lead the Red Raiders in a 39-33 win over then-No. 1 Texas. The Tech defense got a safety by Colby Whitlock and an interception return for a touchdown by Daniel Charbonnet to aid the effort along with four sacks.

TECH SECURES 16TH-STRAIGHT NON-LOSING SEASON

For the 16th year in a row, Texas Tech can enjoy the fact that it will not post a losing record at season's end. The Red Raiders' win at Texas A&M on Oct. 18 gave the Tech program its seventh win of the season with five regular-season games remaining to play and a bowl game. Texas Tech entered the season ranked fourth nationally with 15-straight non-losing seasons and has sealed up another this year. Florida State leads with 30, while Florida (19) is second. Michigan was second, but was assured a non-winning record a few weeks ago.

GOING BOWLING - AGAIN

Texas Tech secured bowl eligibility with the win over Texas A&M and had to wait until its seventh game to do so. The 10-0 Red Raiders had to get the seventh win due to two

games against FCS competition. The program is eligible for the 16th-straight season, which leads the Big 12 Conference, and ninth straight under Mike Leach.

PLAYERS PICK UP WEEKLY HONORS

QB Graham Harrell was named the Big 12 Conference Offensive Player of the Week for the third-straight week following the win over Oklahoma State. He also earned the honor after his performance at Kansas and against Texas and was named the Walter Camp Offensive Player of the Week. PK Matt Williams earned the Big 12 special teams nod against Kansas, while SS Daniel Charbonnet picked up the defensive honor after his game against Texas; Charbonnet also earned Walter Camp Defensive Player of the Week honors. Additionally, Williams also earned AT&T All-America Player of the Week honors after his performance at Kansas.

RED RAIDERS PICK UP NATIONAL HONOR

Texas Tech was named the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week on Monday after its 39-33 win over then-No. 1 Texas. This is the first time the Red Raiders have received the honor.

TEXAS TECH GETS TO McCOY FOUR TIMES

Much of the talk heading into last Saturday's game against Texas surrounded the team's guys in the trenches. Texas entered the game averaging 3.6 sacks per game, while the Red Raider offensive line had only allowed three all season. On the flip side, the Red Raider defensive line was averaging 2.5 sacks per game, while Texas' o-line had allowed a mere 1.6 sacks per outing. Texas Tech won the battle of the sacks with four on McCoy and Texas was held below its average with only two.

NARROWING THE GAP

If you do a double-take when looking at the stats, don't worry, they're correct. Texas Tech's running game is closing the gap between its TD production and that of the passing game. The ground attack has accounted for 25 touchdowns, while the passing game has accounted for 38 through the air in 10 games this season.

PERFECT AGAINST THE NORTH

Texas Tech completed a sweep of the Big 12 Conference's North Division with its 63-21 win over Kansas in Lawrence. The Red Raiders also swept the North during the 2004 and 2005 seasons against the same teams - Kansas, Kansas State and Nebraska.

RED RAIDERS SCORING AT STEADY RATE

Going back to the Nebraska game (four games ago), Texas Tech has scored on 67.2 percent (37-of-55) of its possessions. The Red Raiders scored on 6-of-9 against the Huskers, 7-of-11 at Texas A&M, 9-of-12 at Kansas, 7-of-13 against Texas and was 8-of-10 against Oklahoma State.

TARGET PRACTICE

Sixteen different players have caught a pass for the Red Raiders this season. Okay, one of them is center Stephen Hamby, but he made a heads-up play for a three-yard gain, so he gets his due. Michael Crabtree leads the group with 78 receptions, followed by Detron Lewis and Eric Morris with 57 and 56, respectively. Nine players total have double-digit receptions and 10 have accounted for the team's 38 scores through the air. Crabtree leads with 18, while Morris follows with six. Edward Britton has four.

SCORE BY QUARTERS

Texas Tech has been strong in the first half of games this year, averaging 26.6 points per game, including a quarter-high of 134 in the second. The Red Raiders have scored 132 in the first, 108 in the third and 99 in the fourth.

GETTING THE MOST OUT OF EACH PLAY

Texas Tech is averaging 7.5 yards per play this season and is first in the Big 12 Conference. That number also is second nationally (Tulsa, 7.8). The Red Raiders have run 756 plays on the year and have rolled up 5,663 yards of total offense, or 566.3 yards per game (second nationally).

O-LINE HAS PROVEN IMPENETRABLE

While the Texas Tech defense has been feasting on opponents to the tune of 26 sacks in 10 games, the Red Raider offensive line has not been so accommodating to the opposition. The unit has allowed only five sacks this season in 499 pass attempts and is second nationally in sacks allowed. Air Force has allowed only two sacks, but has attempted only 110 passes.

LEACH ENTERS THE DISCO ERA

Texas Tech's 58-28 win at Kansas State gave the Red Raider head man his 70th win in his ninth season at Texas Tech. He now has 75 wins and ranks fourth among Big 12 Conference coaches all-time, while the 75 wins for the program are the third-most in the conference since the start of the 2000 season, the year Leach arrived in Lubbock. Additionally, Tech's 41 conference wins over that span are third. Leach is one win shy of tying legendary Texas Tech coach Pete Cawthon (1930-40). Spike Dykes is the all-time wins leader with 82.

THE DYNAMIC DUO

Running backs Baron Batch and Shannon Woods have been a force in the backfield for the Red Raiders this season. The tandem is among the top five in the country in terms of production from one position, averaging 189.6 yards from scrimmage on the season.

► Thanks to the efforts of the duo, and those of the offensive line, the Red Raiders have 1,326 rushing yards on the season - better than last season's total of 771 ... the Red Raider are averaging 132.6 yards per game on the ground, the most since 1999, when that squad finished with 149.5 yards per game.

► The most yards Texas Tech has rushed for in a season under Leach was 1,397 during the 13-game 2003 campaign (107.5 ypg).

► Combined for 242 yards and three touchdowns (all by Woods) in the win over Oklahoma State.

► Batch and Woods totaled 134 yards against Texas.

► The pair rolled up 196 yards at Kansas with 79 coming on the ground from Woods and 71 through the air from Batch ... Woods scored twice on the ground.

► Combined for 187 all-purpose yards from scrimmage, led by Batch's 150, against Nebraska. Batch turned in his best rushing performance of the season with 97 yards on 10 carries and accounted for 11.5 yards per touch.

► Batch's 49-yard run against Nebraska marked the fifth-longest in the Leach era (2000-present).

► Combined for 195 yards from scrimmage against Kansas State as the pair was nearly identical in rushing and receiving yards.

► The duo blistered SMU for nearly 300 yards with Batch totaling 169 on 15 touches.

► Batch's 43-yard touchdown run against SMU was the eighth-longest rush under Mike Leach since the 2000 season.

► Combined for 286 yards against UMass, which ranked as that weekend's sixth-best performance by the nation's backfields (running back/tailbacks only).

► Woods 108 yards on the ground against UMass marked the first time since the Insight Bowl in 2006 that Tech has had a 100-yard rusher (Woods, 109 vs. Minnesota).

BATCH EMERGING AFTER SEASON OFF

RB Baron Batch is showing no signs of the Achilles injury that sidelined him most of 2006 and all of last season. The sophomore back has emerged as the team's leading rusher, averaging 66.7 yards per game. His 7.2 yard average per carry ranks ninth nationally. Batch has led the team in rushing in six games this season, and his two-TD performance (one receiving) against A&M was the first multi-TD game of his career. He is second on the team with 104.1 all-purpose yards per game.

RUSHING FOR 100

After closing out the 2007 campaign with the nation's last-ranked rushing offense, the Red Raiders find themselves in the middle of the pack nationally with 132.6 yards per game on the ground. Tech has rushed for 100 yards in each game this season, marking the longest consecutive-games streak in the Leach era. The last time a Tech team rushed for 100 yards in 10-straight games was in 1979.

OPPONENTS' RUNNING GAMES NOT AS SUCCESSFUL

Thanks to a full allotment of bodies on the defensive line rotation, opposing teams' running games are facing a difficult challenge. The Red Raiders are holding the opposition to 107.4 yards per game, which ranks second in the Big 12 Conference and 19th nationally compared to last year's rush defense that finished the season 82nd nationally and allowed 177.0 yards per game. The opposition also has scored only 11 times on the ground this season after 18 a year ago.

PRODUCTIVE ROTATION AT END

Starting defensive end and Hendricks Award candidate Brandon Williams and backup McKinner Dixon lead the team with 10 and seven sacks, respectively, and rank first and third in the Big 12 Conference – Williams is tied fifth nationally. No matter that Dixon comes off the bench in the rotation, he has been one of the more productive players on defense this season. A former Tech freshman All-American in 2005, Dixon has 27 tackles and has eight tackles for loss. Williams has 11 tackles for loss and 19 tackles. Williams also has three tipped balls at the line of scrimmage and three forced fumbles.

LIKE KICKING OVER AN ANT PILE

This accurately describes this year's defensive intensity – they're everywhere. The Red Raiders have adopted a more aggressive, attacking persona since Ruffin McNeill took over the unit five games into last season. The evidence is in the numbers: among the national leaders with 15 interceptions, two of the top sack leaders in the country and a chokehold on opponents on third down (34%). Additionally, d-linemen are making interceptions (two this year), secondary personnel are forcing fumbles, linebackers are recording sacks and everybody is getting a hand on the ball.

MCBATH TIES SCHOOL MARK

In the 83-year history of the Texas Tech Football program prior to this season, no player had intercepted three passes in a game. FS Darcel McBath grabbed three against Kansas, marking the second time this season a Red Raider has recorded three picks – SS Daniel Charbonnet picked off three SMU passes earlier this season. McBath leads the team lead with six picks this year and is tied seventh with former Red Raider Ryan Aycock on the career INT list with 11. McBath also is tied second on the team with 53 tackles and has seven pass breakups this season.

MCBATH, CHARBONNET AMONG THE TOP 10

Darcel McBath and Daniel Charbonnet are setting a new standard for the safety position at Texas Tech. The duo has combined for 11 picks this season, which leads the country for a secondary tandem. Overall, the Red Raiders have 16 interceptions on the season, the most for a Tech defense since the 2003 squad tallied 16.

MORRIS PROVIDES ALL-AROUND PRODUCTION

Senior Eric Morris is one of the busiest players on the field on Saturdays for the Red Raiders. The player known as "The Elf" is one of the team's top receivers, has punched in two rushing scores and is the team's punt returner. Morris is third on the team with 90.4 all-purpose yards per game, including 59.5 yards per game through the air. He is second with six receiving scores and third with nine overall touchdowns, which includes an 86-yard punt return at Nevada.

► Return for TD at Nevada was his first career punt return for a touchdown and the 25th by the Red Raiders since 1951. The return gave Texas Tech a 7-3 lead at the eight-minute mark of the first quarter. He also gave the Red Raiders a 20-12 lead with 5:20 remaining in the third quarter when he scored on a 13-yard rush. The rushing touchdown was the first of his career.

► While diminutive in size, Morris is one of the most deceptive players in the Big 12 Conference, if not college football. The 5-foot-8, 172-pound slot back exploded for 164 yards on nine catches in the season opener against Eastern Washington and finished with 189 all-purpose yards after

tallying 21 punt return yards.

► Tech coach Mike Leach, the one responsible for Morris' alter ego, has installed the "Elf" package in this year's offense to better utilize the receiver's talents.

► His rushing score at Nevada was the first of his career.

► Caught seven passes at Kansas and scored twice.

► Finished the Nebraska game with one carry for one yard and one touchdown. The score proved to be the most important of the day, giving Texas Tech a 37-31 lead on its first possession of overtime. Morris took a handoff down the line of scrimmage, before angling to the front right corner of the end zone for the score.

DUNCAN LEADING THE CHARGE IN THE MIDDLE

Tech's linebackers have been active this season as middle backer Brian Duncan leads the team with 74 tackles. The sophomore grabbed Tech's first interception of the year on the first play of the season against Eastern Washington. He and Marlon Williams lead the unit with five and two pass breakups, respectively. Bront Bird, who has a 14-tackle game to his credit this season, is sixth on the team with 45 tackles. He also has three tackles for loss, a sack and two pass breakups. The three aforementioned linebackers are among the top six tacklers on the team. Williams is fourth with 52 tackles.

RED RAIDERS STEADY IN SCORING STREAK

The run began with a 16-13 win over Texas A&M on Oct. 25, 1997, a week after dropping a 29-0 decision to then-No. 2 Nebraska. During its current run, the Red Raiders have scored 10+ points in all but five games.

A STRANGE GAME INDEED

Texas Tech had to maximize its opportunities against Nebraska, which executed a near-flawless game plan against the Red Raiders. With the intention of controlling the clock and keeping the ball out of the Red Raiders' hands, the Huskers held onto the ball 40:12 to Tech's 19:48. Tech's 48 total plays are the second-fewest in school history, but the Red Raiders scored on six of nine possessions. Quite possibly the most compelling statistics were Nebraska passing for more yards than Tech and the Red Raiders outrushing the Huskers.

FIRST-TIME MEETINGS

UMass was the 127th different opponent to make an appearance on the Texas Tech ledger (Eastern Washington and Nevada were the 125th and 126th new opponents). Texas Tech has faced 15 programs for the first time under Mike Leach and is 13-2 in those games, including the last nine. Other first-time meetings under Leach include Northwestern State and Virginia in 2007; Southeastern Louisiana and Minnesota in 2006; Florida International, Sam Houston State, Indiana State and Alabama in 2005; California in 2004; Navy in 2003; Clemson in 2002; Stephen F. Austin in 2001; and East Carolina in 2000. A first-time matchup has taken place 25 times in bowl games, with the opponents holding a 14-10-1 advantage (Tech 5-2 under Leach in first-time matchups in bowl games).

NICE START FOR MCNEILL

Although he served as defensive coordinator on an interim basis last season, Ruffin McNeill's first play with the interim tag removed got his tenure off with a bang. LB Brian Duncan took a deflected pass off of EWU receiver Aaron Boyce on the initial play of the game. Tech scored eight plays later.

FOUR RED RAIDERS GET FIRST STARTS

SAM Bront Bird, CB Brent Nickerson, WR Detron Lewis and SS Daniel Charbonnet made their first-career starts against Eastern Washington and each turned in some of the top performances of the night. Nickerson, who had 10 total appearances for the Red Raiders in the previous two seasons, finished the game fourth with six solo tackles and a pass breakup. Lewis exploded for 163 yards on nine receptions, including a 76-yard catch. Charbonnet collected his second-career interception in the fourth quarter and had five tackles and a pass breakup.

TECH SCORES FIVE ON THE GROUND

Texas Tech's running game was the scoring machine in the opener as the ground troops scored five times. RB Shannon

Woods scored twice, RB Baron Batch and RB Aaron Crawford once each and QB Graham Harrell once. The five scores were the most in a game since Tech's Insight Bowl win over Minnesota in 2006.

REED'S BENCH IS IM"PRESS"IVE

Can you imagine the force a guy with a 625-pound bench press max has when he plants his hands in your chest coming off the snap? Opposing defensive ends will be able to answer that this season when facing OT Rylan Reed. The senior returning starter raised the record weight prior to preseason camp in late July, breaking his previous mark of 565 pounds. Reed is a cancer survivor (2004) and former minor league pitcher with the Chicago White Sox. In Reed's last game against Virginia in the Gator Bowl, he held defensive end Chris Long, the nation's sack leader, to three tackles and no sacks.

CRABTREE PICKS UP PRESEASON HONORS

As one of eight unanimous consensus All-Americans last season, it's no surprise that WR Michael Crabtree is on virtually every preseason All-America list. Additionally, he, along with QB Graham Harrell, is a candidate for the Maxwell Award, presented annually to the nation's top collegiate player at season's end.

OFFENSIVE LINE INTACT

Undoubtedly the most important group on the offense is the five guys up front. Texas Tech returns all five starters and backup center Stephen Hamby, who appears to have a hold on the starting nod at center. The unit allowed a meager 18 sacks on 763 pass attempts last season and led the country with only one sack allowed per every 42.4 pass attempts. Additionally, preseason All-American OG Louis Vasquez did not allow a sack last season, while OT Rylan Reed gave up only one throughout the 13-game season.

WALL PICKS UP PRESEASON NOD

CB Jamar Wall was named to the preseason All-Big 12 squad, marking only the second time a Texas Tech defensive back has been named to an All-Big 12 first-team squad – pre- or post-season (Dwayne Slay, 2005). The junior was one of the league leaders with five interceptions a year ago in his first season as a starter. Wall also made 54 stops and recorded six pass breakups. OG Louis Vasquez and WR Michael Crabtree also were named to the preseason first team.

DEFENSIVE LINE GETS BOOST IN OFFSEASON

Already a talented unit that returns all four starters, the defensive line received a jolt of talent in February as the Red Raiders inked the nation's fourth-ranked d-line class. Headlining the group are JUCO transfers McKinner Dixon and Brandon Sesay. A freshman All-American for the Red Raiders in 2005, Dixon went the junior college route following that season, where he redshirted the 2006 season at Cisco (TX) Junior College and starred for the program last season. Sesay is the gem of the group, coming to Texas Tech from College of the Sequoias in California as one of the most talented and highly-touted defensive linemen in the country. Additionally, the Red Raiders hit the jackpot when defensive tackle Chris Perry was cleared to play immediately after transferring from the University of Miami in January. Perry was a redshirt during his true freshman year for the Hurricanes last season.

The group joins one of the most talented and experienced group of linemen in school history. Brandon Williams and Jake Ratliff anchor the ends for the unit, while Rajon Henley and freshman All-American Colby Whitlock plug up the inside. Henley led the group with 52 tackles last season. He also had 7.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks. Whitlock posted 47 stops and 8.5 tackles for loss and two sacks, while Williams led the team with 12.5 tackles for loss and six sacks. Ratliff had 26 tackles and six quarterback hurries.

He solidified his place in college football history as one of only eight players nationally to earn unanimous consensus All-America status.

As Texas Tech's senior passer, Harrell leads what has undoubtedly become the nation's most prolific offense this decade. He ranks among the top ten quarterbacks by yardage in NCAA history and is one of six all-time to pass for 5,000 yards in a season. Harrell is a member of an elite group of players that have passed for more than 12,000 yards in a career and thrown more than 100 touchdowns.

HEAD COACH MIKE LEACH

Arguably one of the most innovative coaches in the country, Mike Leach has not only transformed Texas Tech Football, but also the face of college football with an all-out aerial assault. This is evidenced by the number of programs incorporating more passing into their schemes than before. Leach's offense has become a hot, commodity as coaching staffs from across the country have come to Lubbock get a glimpse into what makes the program tick; but none have mastered it like the ninth-year head coach.

Leading the nation's most prolific passing offenses in the country, Leach, who received the All-American Football Foundation's Johnny Vaught Head Coach Award in 2006, spreads the field with his exciting brand of football and has guided the Red Raiders to five NCAA passing titles and three total offense titles during his tenure. Leach's offense produced school records in nearly every passing category in 2000, but surpassed those numbers in each of the last eight seasons. His eight teams have combined for over 151 team and individual records at Tech.

The 2007 season was special for the Red Raiders as a team and individually. Freshman wide receiver and Biletnikoff Award winner Michael Crabtree led the nation in receptions (134), receiving yards (1,960) and touchdown receptions (22), all NCAA freshman records. For his efforts, he was been decorated as a unanimous consensus All-American, being named to first team of the top five All-America teams (AFCA, FWAA, Walter Camp, Associated Press and The Sporting News). Additionally, he was the first freshman and Big 12 Conference receiver in the history of the prestigious Biletnikoff Award to win the honor.

The Red Raiders' appearance in the tradition-rich Gator Bowl in 2007 was a testament to the team's performance and ability to overcome tremendous losses from the previous season. The graduation of four offensive linemen and three receivers had everyone writing off the offense, while the departure of three key defensive players left many wondering what the 2007 season had in store. The answer: the nation's leading offense; the nation's leading receiver and quarterback; a defense that held Oklahoma to 106 rushing yards, its lowest of the season; and two 100-reception receivers to name a few.

The Texas Tech program has established itself as one of the nation's leading producers of productive quarterbacks since the 2000 season. Current quarterback Graham Harrell threw for 4,555 yards in his debut as the starter in 2006 and became the sixth player and third Red Raider in NCAA history to throw for 5,000 yards in a season with his 5,705-effort in 2007. He also is the third quarterback under Leach to win nine games in a season. Former quarterback Kliff Kingsbury in 2002 and Cody Hodges in 2005 each posted nine-win seasons during their careers, while 2003 and 2004 signal callers B.J. Symons and Sonny Cumbie each won eight games in their respective seasons as the starter.



The Red Raiders have improved their total offensive numbers from 324.8 yards per game to 529.6 yards per game since Leach's arrival. The last eight seasons rank as the top eight all-time at Tech in total offense, while scoring went from 23 points per game in 1999 to 40.9 points last season. The most significant increase has been in the passing game, where the Red Raiders averaged 470.3 yards per game in 2007 compared to 175.4 yards in 1999.

The Red Raiders are not solely known for their play on the scoring side of the ball. The Texas Tech defense also has flourished during Leach's eight seasons. The Red Raiders tied for the national lead with three shutouts in 2000 and followed with others in 2001, 2002, 2005 and 2006. Combined with the six shutouts are five other games where the opposition was held without an offensive touchdown. Tech's shutout of Baylor in Waco during the 2005 season marked Tech's first blanking of a conference opponent on the road since the inception of the Big 12 Conference in 1996.

The program continues to make strides academically as well under Leach. For the last eight years Tech has been recognized as one of the nation's top institutions for consistently being above a 70 percent graduation rate, according to the American Football Coaches Association. In 2007, 16 players were named to the Big 12 Conference Academic Football Team, the second-most of the league institutions.

Prior to coming on board at Texas Tech, Leach, in just one season at Oklahoma, directed a Sooner offense that went from one of the worst in the Big 12 Conference to one of the best. Under Leach's tutelage, Heupel was named 1999 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year. For his efforts, Leach was nominated for the 1999 Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - A good start was all Texas Tech needed to beat Eastern Washington.

The Red Raiders know that won't be enough when the competition gets better.

Graham Harrell threw for 536 yards and two touchdowns and also ran for another score to lead No. 12 Texas Tech past Eastern Washington 49-24 on Saturday night.

The pass-happy offense of Texas Tech was in midseason form against an overmatched opponent. Harrell was 43-of-58 with an interception.

He connected with eight different receivers but it was a quiet night for Michael Crabtree, the nation's leading receiver in 2007.

The All-American finished with 73 yards on nine catches, one a 4-yard TD in the first quarter.

Eric Morris and Detrone Lewis caught nine passes each for Tech. Morris got 164 yards and Lewis had 163 yards.

It was the third time in as many seasons that Harrell has thrown for more than 500 yards in a game, but he wasn't impressed.

"That was a pretty sloppy game and offensively we were pretty sloppy," Harrell said. "We've got a long ways to go and a lot of room to get better."

Tech scored more on the ground than in the air. Shannon Woods rushed for two, and Harrell, Aaron Crawford and Baron Batch each had one.

Matt Nichols, last season's MVP in the Big Sky Conference, threw one touchdown and completed 36 of 61 passes for 335 yards. He also threw three interceptions. Tony Davis caught 13 passes for 114 yards to lead the Eagles.

First-year coach Beau Baldwin lost his debut at Eastern of the Football Championship Subdivision. The Eagles defense pressured Harrell at times but only enough to slow Tech's usual scoring pace.

Tech had one dubious statistic. The Red Raiders set a record for the number of penalties in a game, with 18 for 169 yards.

Leach said he was "incredibly disappointed" by the penalties.

"I think we're going to find in a lot of them that we didn't have good technique and that's focus," he said. The previous high in number of penalties came in 2000 against Baylor when Tech had 17. The record for yardage came against Rice last year when Tech gave up 183 yards on penalties.

The Red Raiders came into the game with their highest preseason ranking in 31 years and proceeded to roll to a big lead. Leach saw inconsistency in his team's tempo, offensively and defensively.

"To go out there and, you know, football's real important for two or three series but it's not important the next two after that," Leach said. "We have to get better and we have to improve."

Texas Tech scored on three of its first four possessions before Eastern could get anything going.

Woods, who lost his starting role at running back last year, made it 7-0 on a 2-yard run on Tech's opening drive. Harrell capped a 10-play drive with a 3-yard TD run. But Tech missed the extra point - its first miss in 234 attempts - and Tech led 13-0 with more than half of the first quarter remaining.

Harrell and Crabtree connected for their first score of the season when Crabtree pulled down a TD pass in the corner of the end zone late in the first quarter. Tech got a 2-point conversion with Harrell hit Detrone Lewis over the middle to put the Red Raiders up 21-0.

RENO, Nev. (AP) - Graham Harrell and Michael Crabtree hooked up for an 82-yard touchdown pass and Eric Morris returned a punt 86 yards for a score to lead No. 12 Texas Tech to a 35-19 victory over Nevada on Saturday night.

Shannon Woods also ran for two touchdowns for the Red Raiders (2-0), who overcame an off night for Harrell to score 30 or more points for the 18th time in their last 20 games.

Tech's defense limited Nevada to four field goals until Wolf Pack quarterback Colin Kaepernick threw a 48-yard touchdown to Marko Mitchell with 10:30 remaining and the game largely out of reach.

"The day was carried by our defense," Tech coach Mike Leach said. "We had some tough periods out there, we had some tough everything. But to win this game the way we did, I'm proud of our guys."

Nevada (1-1), which had 488 yards total offense to Tech's 421, appeared to take a 15-14 lead in the third quarter on quarterback Colin Kaepernick's 3-yard score and the officials signaled touchdown, but after a lengthy review, they overturned the decision and ruled he had

fumbled the ball away to Texas Tech.

Kaepernick completed 24-of-35 passes for 264 yards and ran for another 92 yards on 13 carries. Harrell, who threw for 536 yards last week and led the nation with 5,705 passing yards a year ago, was intercepted twice and completed 19-of-46 of his passes for 297 yards - 132 on two passes to Crabtree.

Harrell was 10-of-25 for 119 yards in the first half, but his 50-yarder to Crabtree set up Woods' 1-yard touchdown run to give Tech a 14-6 lead 5:18 before the half.

"We struggled a little bit but we knew it was only a matter of time before we'd find our rhythm. Nevada did a nice job but we just were a little out of rhythm," Harrell said.

Leach said the team has come to expect Harrell to finish strong despite a slow start.

"That's what makes him what he is, with all of the comebacks in his career he has," Leach said. "He's a guy that never gives up. He never gets rattled and just stays in there and tries to make a play."

Nevada coach Chris Ault said his defense did a good job of pressuring Harrell and played well for three quarters but had some "major breakdowns" in the final quarter.

"They have a great offense and a lot of people underestimate their defense," Ault said. Kaepernick completed 24-of-35 passes for 264 yards and ran for another 92 yards on 13 carries for Nevada.

Nevada lost for the season the Western Athletic Conference's leading returning rusher, Luke Lippincott, to a torn knee ligament in the second quarter.

Brett Jaekle made a 31-yard field goal to cut the Texas Tech lead to 14-12 with 6:40 left in the third quarter. Nevada then tried an onside kick but Texas Tech recovered it at Nevada's 39 and after Harrell passed 15 yards to Tramain Swindall, Morris went in motion, took a hand off and ran 13 yards for a touchdown and a 21-12 lead at 5:20 in the third.

Jonathan Amaya intercepted Harrell's pass at Nevada's 47 with 14 minutes left in the game but Nevada failed to make a first down and Harrell passed to near midfield where Crabtree hauled it in, juked a defender and took off for the 82-yard scoring play and a 28-12 lead with 12:59 left in the game.

Marko Mitchell scored on a 48-yard pass from Kaepernick to cut the lead to 28-19 with 10:30 remaining but Woods answered with a 21-yard TD run to make it 35-19 with 6:18 on the clock.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Graham Harrell threw for 418 yards and five touchdowns, three to Michael Crabtree, to help No. 12 Texas Tech rout SMU 43-7 on Saturday night.

SMU and first-year coach June Jones were overmatched from the outset and turnovers - five interceptions - hurt the Mustangs mightily. Safety Daniel Charbonnet had three interceptions to set a Texas Tech record for a game.

Harrell, coming off his worst game in two years in last week's 35-19 win over Nevada, completed 31 of 48 passes. He threw TD passes of 23, 47, 50, 7 and 44.

Crabtree had his best game of the season, catching eight passes for 164 yards.

Bo Levi Mitchell drove the Mustangs to the Red Raiders 26 and 1 in the first half, but came away empty. In the second half, the closest SMU got against Tech's starters was the 31.

Harrell and Crabtree went out with about 12 minutes remaining in the game. Harrell was replaced by Taylor Potts.

Harrell's five touchdown passes gave him 97 for his career, pushing him past former Red Raiders quarterback Kliff Kingsbury, who had 95 between 1999 and 2002.

Tech (2-0) had its most rushing yards rushing (176 yards) since it ran for 165 yards in a win over Baylor in 2006.

Mitchell, who was 13-of-24 for 155 yards, found his greatest success through the air to Emmanuel Sanders. Mitchell went out midway through the third quarter and was replaced by Logan Turner, who threw a 7-yard touchdown pass to Aldrick Robinson late in the fourth quarter for the Mustangs' lone score.

Sanders caught eight passes for 125 yards. It was his fourth-straight game going back to last season in which he had at least eight catches and 100-plus yards.

The first half ended on an unusual play that nixed an apparent Texas Tech score. Harrell scrambled and when SMU's Patrick Fleming caught up with him, the Mustangs' player pulled his helmet off. But Harrell stayed on his feet and continued to look for a receiver. He hit Trmain Swindall for a TD, but officials had called the play dead and took the score away from the Red Raiders.

On the final play of the first half, Crabtree couldn't hang onto a pass from Harrell in the corner of the end zone. SMU (1-1) fell behind early after the Mustangs turned the ball over on three of their first four possessions. Charbonnet intercepted two passes and Jamar Wall got a third.

A field goal came from Charbonnet's first pick before Baron Batch, a backup running back for the Red Raiders, went in motion, took a handoff from Harrell and exploded through a gaping hole in SMU's line to go nearly untouched for a 43-yard score. It was the Red Raiders' ninth rushing touchdown of the season, an atypical statistic considering Texas Tech's penchant for scoring through the air.

About a minute later, Harrell found Crabtree in the end zone for a 23-yard touchdown strike off Wall's takeaway to put Tech up 15-0 before the end of the first quarter.

The Mustangs got a turnover early in the second quarter just 23 yards from their end zone, but five plays, later Mitchell threw his fourth interception. Mitchell threw the ball to Aldrick Robinson at the 2, but Darcel McBath stepped in front of the pass and got the interception near the goal line.

Six plays later, Crabtree got behind two defenders and was wide open in the end zone when Harrell hit him with a 47-yarder to put the Red Raiders up 22-0 midway through the first half.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Texas Tech's running backs don't usually get the ink its receivers do, making Saturday night's performances by the two who split duty in the backfield stand out all the more.

Baron Batch had 55 yards on the ground and 68 receiving yards, while Shannon Woods, who spent much of last year in coach Mike Leach's doghouse, had 108 yards rushing and 53 yards receiving as the No. 11 Red Raiders rolled over Massachusetts 56-14.

Together they had 284 total yards, more than half of Tech's 538 of total offense.

"I think they compliment each other real well because they literally compete for yards on the ground and in the air," Tech coach Mike Leach said. "You can kind of tell they're observing one another and bringing the best of the other to their game."

Graham Harrell threw for 322 yards and four touchdowns and Woods ran for three scores to help No. 11 Texas Tech.

Texas Tech (4-0) dominated the Minutemen from the outset. The Red Raiders scored on six of seven possessions in the first half and led

42-7 at the intermission.

It was the most first-half points for the Red Raiders since late September 2006 when they scored 42 points against South-east Louisiana in an eventually 62-0 win.

And it could have been worse. Tremain Swindall, Detron Lewis and All-American Michael Crabtree were each unable to hold onto passes in the end zone.

Massachusetts couldn't summon much resistance the rest of the game. Harrell, who completed passes to 10 different receivers, threw TDs of 17, 12, 2 and 4 yards - and that was in the first half alone. He was 27-of-34 and no interceptions.

Woods ran for touchdowns of 2, 38 and 18 yards and finished with 108 yards on 10 carries. It was the most rushing yards for him since he got 109 in a 44-41 win over Minnesota in the 2006 Insight Bowl.

"The doghouse pretty well ended when we started spring and he competed hard," Leach said. "He always has had the ability to be really polished. When's he's on his A-game he blocks as good as anybody in the league. When he's doing all the little things right, he's pretty good."

Woods said Batch helped him hang in when Woods had gone from a starting role in 2006 when he led the Big 12 in all-purpose yards to being benched for the final four regular-season games last season and getting sent home from Jacksonville prior to the Gator Bowl as a disciplinary action.

"It was hard, ain't no lying about it," Woods said. "It was tough to play and then not be able to, you know. That's hard. But I'm happy with myself. I stuck with it."

The Red Raiders have a week off before beginning the Big 12 season at Kansas State on Oct. 4.

Massachusetts' troubles continued to begin the second half. On the third play from scrimmage, Red Raider safety Darcel McBath stepped in from a pass from Liam Coen to Julian Talley and returned it 45 yards to put Texas Tech up 49-7.

Harrell was replaced by Taylor Potts with about 11 minutes remaining in the game. Coen was 13-of-20 for 145 yards, well below his season average of 275 yards per game.

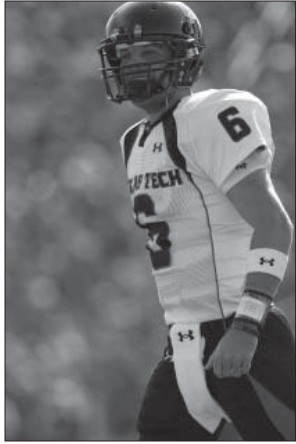
Massachusetts (2-2) avoided a second-half shutout when Korrey Davis scored on a 2-yard run with 51 seconds remaining in the game.

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) - Stuffing No. 7 Texas Tech on fourth-and-inches on its own 29 and moving right in for the game-tying touchdown gave Kansas State hope.

It didn't last long. Behind an offensive line that provided plenty of time to pick and choose from a bevy of receivers, Graham Harrell engineered scoring drives on Tech's next seven possessions, leading the Red Raiders to a 58-28 victory Saturday over the outmanned Wildcats.

Along the way, the senior quarterback threw six touchdown passes and became his school's all-time leader in yards passing.

"It's a huge honor with all the great quarterbacks that have come through here," Harrell said. "It comes with a lot of help."

Lyle Leong snared three touchdown passes from Harrell, who was 38-for-51 for 454 yards. The Red Raiders (5-0, 1-0 Big 12), leading the nation in passing and total offense, rolled up 626 yards. With their highest ranking in 32 years, they did not even attempt a punt until Stefan Loucks replaced Harrell late in the fourth quarter.

"I've had great receivers here and the offensive line has been great to me," said Harrell, whose career total of 12,709 yards erased the record of 12,429 yards Kliff Kingsbury had from 1999-02. "I've played in 30-some games here and only been sacked around 30 times."

The Wildcats (3-2, 0-1) never even threatened to add to that paltry sack total. After play after play, Harrell was barely even hurried as he spread his passes to 10 different receivers and embarrassed the Kansas State defense.

Michael Crabtree had 107 yards in receptions and caught two of Harrell's scoring passes, giving him 30 for his career and tying the school record.

"I feel that he's a good athlete, but they just didn't have Michael Crabtree," Moore said. "A lot of other players stepped up and made plays, not just Crabtree."

Texas Tech coach Mike Leach still is not ready to proclaim Harrell the best quarterback he's had. "But I would say he is the best in the nation this year," Leach quickly added. "If you lead the nation in passing, I would think you deserve some attention. It's not like he just does it once in a while."

Harrell connected with six different receivers in a 14-play, 80-yard touchdown drive in the second quarter. "If you lead the nation in passing, I would think you deserve some attention. It's not like he just does it once in a while."

Mike Leach The Red Raiders, leading the nation in total offense (572.8 yards per game), and passing (426.2), had 417 and 316 while putting up a 38-14 halftime lead over a Kansas State defense which the week before had yielded 300 yards rushing to Louisiana-Lafayette.

The six TD passes tied the career-best for Harrell. He had five in the first half. He got the school record for career passing yards with a 15-yard completion to Adam James and a moment later made it 24-14 with a thread-the-needle 15-yard strike to Leong, who made the catch in double coverage and twisted into the corner of the end zone.

Facing fourth-and-inches from their own 29 late in the first quarter, the Red Raiders sent Shannon Woods on a sweep. Four plays later, Kansas State quarterback Josh Freeman scored on a 1-yard run, knotting the game 14-14. But nothing else happened that was good for Kansas State.

On successive possessions in the second quarter, Harrell led quick-hitting drives of 53, 70 and 54 yards. Freeman, in the meantime, went cold, misfiring on 9 of 10 passes, several of which Tech defenders got their hands on.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Eric Morris scooted 1 yard around right end for a touchdown in overtime and Jamar Wall made that score stand up for Texas Tech with an interception, and the seventh-ranked Red Raiders defeated Nebraska 37-31 on Saturday.

Texas Tech (6-0, 2-0 Big 12) left the door open for the Cornhuskers to win it with a touchdown and extra point, when the Red Raiders botched the PAT after Morris' score.

But the mistake didn't cost the Red Raiders. Joe Ganz, who threw for 349 yards for Nebraska (3-3, 0-2), was scrambling and trying to throw the ball away on the Huskers' second play when Jamar Wall intercepted along the Texas Tech sideline to end the game.

Graham Harrell, who threw for two touchdowns and ran for another, was 20-of-25 for 284 yards.

Late in regulation Harrell threw a 47-yarder to Michael Crabtree on fourth-and-5 from the Red Raiders 36 to keep Texas Tech's drive alive after Nebraska tied it at 24 to midway through the fourth quarter.

A few plays later Harrell took it in on a sneak to put Tech up 31-24.

Ganz brought the Huskers back in quickly. Todd Peterson caught two passes from Ganz for 11 yards each en route to completing a 17-yarder for a TD to cap an eight-play drive in 1:52 - the shortest possession for the Huskers all day.

Nebraska trailed throughout but got back in on a gamble. Jake Wesch came in to hold for a field goal early in the fourth quarter but instead threw for a first down to Mike McNeill on a fake to give Nebraska a first down at the 1.

Ganz took it in for a score with a quarterback sneak to pull Nebraska within 24-17 with 12:10 remaining.

After holding Texas Tech to its first three-and-out, the Huskers went 68 yards to tie it at 24-24 with about six minutes remaining. Ganz hit Dreu Young for a 2-yard TD score.

Nebraska did a good job of keeping the ball out of the hands of Texas Tech's high-powered offense. The Huskers had a balanced attack, running the ball almost as many times as they passed. They got their lone score of the first half following an eight-minute drive, and the Huskers got such good yardage on first and second downs that they rarely faced much on third down.

But Texas Tech was able to score more in half the time the Huskers held the ball. After holding onto the ball for more than five minutes late in the first half, Nebraska came up short on a fourth-and-1 at the Texas Tech 30. The Red Raiders wasted little time with Harrell hitting Edward Britton on a 56-yard pass to the Nebraska 9.

Three plays later, Shannon Woods went 4 yards into the end zone to put the Red Raiders up 17-7.

The Huskers didn't run for cover, though they mildly cratered. Niles Paul returned the ensuing kickoff 69 yards to the Red Raiders 31 before Mike Smith got called for holding on back-to-back plays. Nebraska was forced to go for a field goal but Alex Henry wasn't able to get enough on it from 53 yards.

Crabtree got the Red Raiders first score and a school record for career TDs (31) when he caught a quick slant and went untouched through the Huskers secondary for 35 yards for a 7-0 lead.

Nebraska came in knowing it had to hang onto the ball in order to slow Tech's offense. On their first TD drive the Huskers did just that, running the ball 10 times during of a 15-play drive. Quentin Castille finished off the drive on a 4-yard TD run to tie it at 7 early in the second quarter.

COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS (AP) - Texas Tech coach Mike Leach wasn't worried when the Red Raiders trailed at the half for the first time this season against Texas A&M on Saturday.

There was no fiery tirade in the locker room, no panic-button re-vamping of the entire game plan. Leach simply told his team to stay as calm as he was, and that's all it took.

Graham Harrell threw for three touchdowns and ran for two more and No. 7 Texas Tech beat Texas A&M 43-25 on Saturday, giving the Red Raiders their best start in 32 years.

Harrell completed 44 of 56 passes for 450 yards as the Red Raiders moved to 7-0 - 3-0 in the Big 12 - after beating A&M for the seventh time in eight meetings.

Texas Tech was down 23-20 at the break, after committing two turnovers and eight penalties and giving up 274 yards in the first half. Tech scored on four of six possessions after halftime and held A&M to 32 yards and five first downs.

"Just relax," Leach said he told his players. "Don't get frustrated. We don't want to have any bad body language out there. Expect good things to happen, and they will. You knew it couldn't be as bad as the first half."

Michael Crabtree caught two touchdowns and Baron Batch rushed for 87 yards and another score for the Red Raiders, who now begin the defining stretch of the season. Their next four opponents are all ranked in this week's Top 25: Kansas, Texas, Oklahoma State and Oklahoma.

But the Red Raiders didn't leave Kyle Field without their unorthodox coach creating a stir. Texas Tech led 36-25 with 24 seconds left when Leach called time out and asked referees to review a run by Shannon Woods to the 1-yard line. The Red Raiders had to run one more play or take a penalty, and Harrell scored a meaningless touchdown on the next snap.

Leach said he meant no disrespect to the Aggies - he just wanted Woods to score a touchdown. "Shannon Woods is one of my favorite running backs in the whole world," Leach said. "As a matter of fact, I probably like Shannon Woods more than any 10 players on any other team."

"My only disappointment is Graham snatched it away from him," Leach said. "I wanted Shannon to score. I'm happy we scored. I wish Shannon would've got it."

Crabtree twisted his left ankle on the kickoff and hobbled off the field. Harrell overthrew a receiver and A&M safety Trent Hunter intercepted. Harrell had thrown only three interceptions in 262 attempts coming into the game. "We felt like we played decent in the first half," Harrell said. "We only stopped ourselves."

Bullock kicked another field goal with 6:29 left in the half to put A&M ahead 16-13. Crabtree returned for Texas Tech's next possession, which ended on Harrell's 8-yard touchdown pass to Batch.

A holding penalty wiped out a 78-yard touchdown pass from Johnson to Jeff Fuller and A&M punted with just over 2 minutes left before halftime.

Tremain Swindall caught a 37-yard pass from Harrell, then fumbled near midfield. Tannehill made a diving catch for a 40-yard gain on the next play and Mike Goodson's 1-yard touchdown run put the Aggies ahead 23-20 with 23 seconds left before the break.

"Everything went wrong that could in the first half," Leach said.

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) - It's one down and three to go in a brutish four-game swing that'll either ruin the season for Texas Tech or thrust the Red Raiders squarely into the national championship hunt.

With Graham Harrell throwing for 386 yards and five touchdowns and a swarming defense forcing Todd Reesing into his worst game since high school, No. 8 Texas Tech punted No. 19 Kansas 63-21 Saturday. The Red Raiders scored 49 straight points.

Next up for Texas Tech (8-0, 4-0 Big 12) will be No. 1 Texas, followed in order by No. 7 Oklahoma State and No. 4 Oklahoma.

"We're focusing on not looking ahead," said running back Baron Batch, one of 11 different receivers who caught passes in coach Mike Leach's seemingly unstoppable spread offense.

Harrell, the nation's No. 1 passer also scored on a 1-yard run for the Red Raiders, who rolled up 556 yards of total offense while matching their best start in 32 years.

"Here's the reality of it," Kansas coach Mark Mangino said. "We got a good old-fashioned butt-whipping today and we know that. You just get a day where the snowball starts rolling down the hill and before you know it, you've got no chance to stop it and it runs you over."

Harrell's touchdown passes ranged from 55 yards to Edward Britton to 4 to Michael Crabtree. He also connected with Eric Morris on scoring tosses of 10 and 7 yards and found Crabtree on a tackle-breaking 16-yard scoring play.

"It's all about having fun," Harrell said. "When we have fun, we're at our best." The Red Raiders' career passing leader was 34-for-42 with no interceptions. But late in the game, long after the outcome was decided, Harrell was sacked on successive plays after being sacked only once in his first seven games.

Kansas matched Harrell touchdown-for-touchdown through a first quarter that ended 14-14. But the Red Raiders ripped off 49 unanswered points for their 10th victory in 11 games against Kansas, which had won 13 straight at home.

The Jayhawks kept trying to disguise coverages. But a week after giving up an Oklahoma school-record 468 yards passing, they were helpless against Harrell and his offensive machine. When they dropped everybody back in coverage, Harrell would simply stand back, protected by huge blockers, and pick out targets.

When the Jayhawks tried to blitz, Harrell almost invariably found the open receiver and kept moving downfield. "I thought we had some pressure on him at times," Mangino said. "There were a couple of instances where we hit him as he was throwing the ball and he completed it. That's pretty impressive."

Kansas tried a safety blitz on second down early in the second quarter and Harrell connected with Batch for 24 yards to the 7. On their second possession, Harrell again frustrated a Jayhawks blitz by flipping the ball to Batch on a simple screen that went 42 yards.

Any hope Kansas had in the second half was extinguished by the two quick touchdowns that resulted from McBeth's interceptions, and turned a game that had Kansas favored by two points into one of the most embarrassing routs in Mangino's seven years as coach.

"I've never had that happen to me in a lot of years of football, back-to-back mistakes like that," Reesing said. Reesing finished 16-of-26 for 154 yards and two touchdowns in Kansas' most lopsided home loss since a 64-0 setback to Kansas State in 2002.

LUBBOCK, TEXAS (AP) - It was as risky a pass as Graham Harrell has ever thrown. Also the most important.

With the final seconds ticking off and Texas Tech trailing by a point, the Texas Tech quarterback saw Michael Crabtree in double coverage and let it fly. The All-American wide receiver snagged it on the sideline, shook off a defender and ducked into the end zone with one second left.

With that stunning 28-yard touchdown, the No. 6 Red Raiders turned near-heartbreak into a wild victory, 39-33 over No. 1 Texas on Saturday night.

Texas Tech showed it's tops in the Lone Star State - and maybe even the best team in the land.

"Play 60 minutes," Texas Tech coach Mike Leach said. "You may have a second to spare."

That's what it came down in a West Texas-style shootout that had the Longhorns (8-1, 4-1 Big 12) rally from a 19-0 deficit in the first half and from 29-13 in the third quarter to take a 33-32 lead with Vondrell

McGee's 4-yard TD run with 1:29 to play.

The problem was, Texas left Harrell too much time.

Harrell drove the Red Raiders (9-0, 5-0) 62 yards to the touchdown in six plays, slinging the long pass to Crabtree, who broke the tackle of Curtis Brown, kept his balance, stayed in bounds and scooted the last few yards for a score.

"On the sideline, I kind of dreamed that I would catch a pass and go in the end zone for a game-winning score. I do that, like every game, but it happened. It kind of shocked me," Crabtree said.

Tech really just needed about 10 yards to set up a field goal for Donnie Carona, who had been benched earlier this season but kicked a 42-yarder in the fourth quarter. But Harrell took a big chance with the big throw.

If Crabtree had been tackled instead of getting in, Texas Tech might have had a hard time calling its last timeout to set up a short field goal before time expired.

"All we needed was a field goal, but a touchdown's even sweeter," Harrell said. "If you're a quarterback and don't want to be in that situation, you should probably change positions."

Thousands of Texas Tech fans poured onto the field and had to be sent off while the play was under review to make sure Crabtree didn't step out of bounds. Once the fans were chased off the field and Tech kicked the extra point, the Red Raiders were penalized and forced to kick off from their own 7.

When Texas couldn't pull off a miracle kickoff return, the fans ran back on the field to celebrate the biggest win in Texas Tech history. The victory not only gave the Red Raiders command of the Big 12 South, it puts them smack in the chase for the national title, quite a leap for a program usually left behind by conference powers Texas and Oklahoma.

In fact, maybe Texas Tech shoots to the top of the rankings and the BCS standings? More likely, Alabama moves to No. 1. The question is whether the Red Raiders, on the strength of their first victory against a No. 1 team, can jump over the likes of Florida, Southern California and unbeaten Penn State on Sunday.

Just like Texas over the last month, the Red Raiders also face a daunting schedule the next three weeks. Texas Tech hosts No. 9 Oklahoma State next weekend, then has a bye week before traveling to No. 4 Oklahoma. They finish the regular season at home against Baylor.

LUBBOCK, TEXAS (AP) - Around the time Michael Crabtree caught his second touchdown and stood in the back of the end zone staring at the crowd -- or maybe when he celebrated his third score with a high-flying chest bump into Graham Harrell -- the questions about Texas Tech vanished.

That victory over then-No. 1 Texas was no emotion-fueled fluke. The No. 2 Red Raiders truly are one of the best teams in the country.

Harrell and Crabtree picked up right where they left off against the Longhorns, leading Texas Tech to touchdowns on seven straight possessions on the way to trashing No. 8 Oklahoma State 56-20 Saturday night and solidifying an inside track to the national championship game.

"I feel like every week we have something to prove," Crabtree said. "We really don't too much worry about what other people think. We worry about what we can control, and that's us, and that's our team."

Now that the Red Raiders have gotten by two straight top-10 foes, one more awaits: No. 6 Oklahoma. In Norman.

At least Texas Tech (10-0, 6-0 Big 12) has next weekend off to get ready for yet another game that will be billed as the most important in school history. The stakes will be high--the biggest remaining obstacle to winning the Big 12 South, earning a spot in the conference title game and playing its way into the national championship game. Michael Crabtree and Graham Harrell celebrate a touchdown.

"We've said that all year we have a chance to be really special," Harrell said. "We've just improved every week, gotten better and continued to win. Hopefully we'll continue to improve and to win."

Harrell was 40-of-50 for 456 yards and six touchdowns, three of them to Crabtree, the big, strong sophomore who might be the nation's most dangerous receiver. Harrell lost two fumbles but didn't throw an interception and wasn't sacked. He was rarely even pressured.

Despite playing on a sore left foot, Crabtree caught eight passes for 89 yards while raising his national-best TD total to 18.

Nine other Red Raiders caught passes on the way to piling up 629 yards -- still less than the 718 yards gained in a 49-45 loss to Oklahoma State last year.

"We never could slow them down," Gundy said. "We couldn't get them out of their rhythm." Oklahoma State (8-2, 4-2) came into this game seeking the same goals as Texas Tech. If the Cowboys had won, there would've been a four-way tie atop the division with the Sooners their last remaining obstacle, too. Now, they're in fourth place.

Things looked good for the Cowboys early, when Kendall Hunter scored on a 2-yard run three plays after Oklahoma State recovered a fumbled snap by Harrell. The 7-0 lead only 2:30 into the game silenced a crowd that provided such a boost against Texas the previous Saturday night.

Yet Harrell, the nation's leading passer, marched the Red Raiders 80 yards in five plays. He took them 70 yards on the next drive, then 97 and 72, spreading the ball around, while saving the most important plays for his main man, Crabtree. It was 28-14 at the half and Texas Tech already had 312 yards against a defense allowing an average of 357.4 yards per game. Baron Batch gets around an Oklahoma State defender

The only thing that slowed the Red Raiders was the halftime show.
