Baylor returns to action Saturday, Oct. 10, traveling to Norman, Okla., for a Big 12 Conference game against Oklahoma. Kickoff is scheduled for 2:37 p.m. CDT at Gaylord Family-Oklahoma Memorial Stadium on the Oklahoma campus. This is the first conference game for both teams. Saturday's game will be televised regionally on ABC.

The Bears (3-1, 0-0) defeated Kent State 31-15 at home last Saturday. Baylor is 1-0 on the road this season, winning 24-21 at Wake Forest in the season opener. The Sooners (2-2, 0-0) dropped a 21-20 decision at Miami-FL last Saturday. Oklahoma is 2-0 at home this season with wins over Idaho State (64-0) and Tulsa (45-0). The Sooners have won 24 consecutive home games since a 17-10 loss to TCU in the 2005 season opener. Oklahoma is ranked 19th nationally in this week's Associated Press Top 25 and No. 21 in this week's USA Today Coaches' Poll.

All Baylor football games are broadcast live on the Baylor/ISP Sports Radio Network; Waco's 1660 ESPN Radio is the network's flagship station. Live streaming audio and GameTracker also are available for all Baylor football games online at www.BaylorBears.com, the official website of Baylor Athletics and a member of the CBS College Sports network.

BAYLOR-OKLAHOMA SERIES

This is the 19th meeting between Baylor and Oklahoma; the Sooners have dominated the series, winning each of the first 18 meetings. The Sooners' margin of victory has been less than 10 points only three times: 28-24 in 1996, 24-23 in 1997 and 37-30 in double overtime in 2005.

Baylor and Oklahoma first met Oct. 26, 1901; the Sooners left Waco that day with a 17-6 victory. The teams did not play again until 1973, a 42-14 Oklahoma victory in Waco. The Bears and Sooners met again the following season in Norman with OU winning 28-11. Baylor and Oklahoma met twice more before the inception of the Big 12 in 1996, playing at Norman during the 1984 and 1989 seasons.

SERIES NOTES: Oklahoma is the only Big 12 team Baylor has never defeated. In fact, Oklahoma is the only team Baylor has played at least five times without at least one win. ... This is the ninth time in the last 10 meetings that Oklahoma has been nationally ranked when playing Baylor. ... When Baylor faced top-ranked Oklahoma in 2000, it was the Bears' second game against the nation's top-ranked team in a 15-day span. Two weeks prior, Baylor played then-No. 1 Nebraska. ... Baylor held Oklahoma to 56 yards rushing in the 2003 meeting, a season low for the Sooners and the fewest yards rushing allowed by a Baylor team since 1995. In fact, Oklahoma had negative rushing yards until late in the third quarter. ... In the 1989 season opener for both teams, then-No. 8 Oklahoma ran the ball on 70 of 72 plays en route to a 33-7 victory at Norman. The Sooners were 0-of-2 passing, the fourth and most recent time a Baylor opponent did not complete a pass. ... In 2006, **Braelon Davis** returned a fumble 56 yards for a touchdown. That was the last time an opponent did such against the Sooners. ... **Shaun Rochon's** 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown at Oklahoma in 2005 currently is tied for the fourth-longest in program history. ... **Randy Davis** returned a kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown against the Sooners in 2001. That stands as the 10th-longest kickoff return in Baylor history. ... **Pete Rutter's** 81-yard punt against Oklahoma in 1989 still ranks fifth all-time at Baylor.

Baylor's practices are closed to the media and the general public. Media are allowed to attend the first 20 minutes of practice; still and video photography are allowed during this time.

- Baylor is 41-80-2 all-time in televised games.
- Baylor is 41-158-6 all-time against ranked opponents, 26-139-5 when unranked and playing a ranked opponent.
- Baylor is 47-49-4 all-time on the second weekend of October.
- Baylor is 202-201-21 all-time in October, including a 2-3 mark under head coach **Art Briles**.
- Baylor has lost 19 consecutive games when trailing at halftime.
- Baylor is 7-0 in the Briles era when allowing 21 points or fewer and 0-9 when allowing more than 21 points.
- Baylor's schedule is ranked the nation's ninth toughest according to the NCAA, based upon FBS opponents' cumulative winning percentage against FBS competition (.649, 24-13).
- Baylor ranks 29th nationally in rushing (196.3 ypg).
- Baylor averages 5.8 yards per carry, sixth nationally.
- Baylor ranks 16th nationally in scoring offense (36.3 ppg).
- Baylor ranks 33rd nationally in passing efficiency (147.06).
- Baylor leads the Big 12 and ranks 14th nationally in pass efficiency defense (97.45).
- Baylor ranks 19th nationally and second in the Big 12 in pass defense (166.0 ypg).
- Baylor leads the Big 12 and is 13th nationally in turnover margin (plus-1.25 tpg).
- Baylor ranks third in the Big 12 and 15th nationally in kickoff returns (27.2 ypr).
- Baylor ranks 12th nationally and fourth in the Big 12 in net punting (40.38 yds).
- Five Bears appear on national award watch lists: P **Derek Epperson** (Guy), QB **Robert Griffin III** (Manning, O'Brien, Maxwell), FS **Jordan Lake** (Thorpe), LB **Joe Pawelek** (Bednarik, Lombardi, Lott, Nagurski) and C **J.D. Walton** (Lombardi, Outland, Rimington).
- Pawelek will start his 38th consecutive game Saturday against Oklahoma, the longest such streak by a Baylor player (non-special teams) since **Maurice Lane** ended his career in 2005 with a school-record 45 consecutive starts.
- LB **Antonio Jones** leads the Big 12 and ranks 21st nationally with 10.0 tackles per game.
- Pawelek is tied for 26th nationally with 9.75 tackles per game; he ranks third in the Big 12.
- Pawelek enters the Oklahoma game with 352 career tackles, most among active FBS players. He also leads the nation with 195 career assisted tackles and ranks sixth nationally with 8.8 tackles per game on his career.
- Pawelek needs one interception to become the 13th player in Baylor history to amass at least 10 career interceptions.
- RB **Jay Finley** needs 216 yards to become the 15th player in Baylor history to reach 1,500 career rushing yards.
- Finley has rushed for 90-plus yards in four straight games with three 100-yard outings in that span.
- Epperson was named National Punter of the Week by College Football Performance Awards following his performance against Northwestern State.
- Epperson leads the Big 12 and ranks second nationally in punting average (47.6 ypp).
- Epperson's career punting average (42.02 ypp) ranks 10th nationally among active FBS players.
- Lake is tied for fifth nationally among active FBS players with seven career forced fumbles. He ranks seventh nationally in career solo tackles per game (4.7).

OKLAHOMA 49, BAYLOR 17

OCT. 4, 2008 • FLOYD CASEY STADIUM • WACO, TEXAS

Top-ranked Oklahoma scored touchdowns on each of its first four possessions and proved too much for Baylor to overcome as the Bears dropped a 49-17 decision in the Big 12 Conference opener for both teams.

After forcing Baylor to punt without a first down on the game's first possession, Oklahoma scored on its third offensive play when Sam Bradford hit Manuel Johnson for with a 53-yard touchdown pass on third down. It was the first of four first-quarter touchdowns for the Sooners.

Baylor finally got on the scoreboard with 12:34 remaining in the second quarter as **Robert Griffin III** capped an eight-play, 86-yard drive with a 1-yard touchdown run. After Bradford's second touchdown pass of the day pushed OU's lead back to 28 points, Griffin found the end zone on the ground again from one yard out in the first half's final minute.

Oklahoma had little trouble moving the ball on Baylor's defense as the Sooners racked up 594 yards of total offense and averaged 6.5 yards per play.

Bradford finished 23-of-31 for 372 yards and two touchdowns with one interception. He also rushed twice for four yards and a score. DeMarco Murray rushed 26 times for 96 yards and two touchdowns. Oklahoma posted five rushing touchdowns on the day.

Griffin finished with 102 yards rushing and two touchdowns. However, he struggled to dent the Sooner defense through the air. Griffin connected on just 11 of 26 passes for 75 yards. It was Baylor's lowest passing yardage output since New Mexico held the Bears to 62 yards passing in 2002.

Baylor finished with 194 yards rushing on 41 carries, averaging one yard per attempt more than Oklahoma. The Sooners' entered the game allowing only 73 yards rushing per game.

Joe Pawelek led Baylor's defensive unit with 13 tackles, reaching double-digits for the fifth time in as many games. Fellow linebacker **Antonio Johnson** made 12 stops on the day. **Jordan Lake** added seven tackles and an interception.

BAYLOR vs. RANKED OPPONENTS

Baylor is 41-158-6 all-time against ranked opponents, 26-139-5 when unranked and playing a ranked opponent. The Bears are 2-44 against ranked opponents since the inception of the Big 12 Conference (33-30 vs. 20th-ranked North Carolina State in 1998, and 35-34 in overtime vs. 16th-ranked Texas A&M in 2004). Baylor has lost 18 straight to ranked foes since the 2004 victory over Texas A&M, including six such losses last year.

Since the Associated Press began conducting weekly polls in 1936, Baylor has played at least one ranked opponent every season except 1987. Baylor has played at least one top-10 team every season since 1993.

Art Briles assumed Baylor's head coaching post Nov. 28, 2007, ushering in a new era and a new attitude to the storied Bears football program. In his first season on the sidelines in Waco it was quickly evident that the Briles Era was underway at Baylor; from the innovative offense, the reintroduction of a solid running game and a record-setting quarterback, to competitive games and no acceptance of moral victories.

Briles' 2008 Bears finished with a 4-8 record, but six of eight defeats were at the hands of ranked opponents (four in top 10) and three losses came by a touchdown or less.

Highlights of Briles' first season at Baylor included the emergence of sensational true freshman quarterback Robert Griffin III, the Big 12's top newcomer and freshman All-American, a rushing attack that ranked 21st nationally and third in the Big 12 with 195.8 yards per game (2,349 yards, most since 1981) and 29 touchdowns, and a memorable 41-21 home win over Texas A&M. Baylor's 1.33 turnover margin ranked fourth nationally and junior linebacker Joe Pawelek ranked seventh nationally in tackles (10.7) and interceptions (.50).

Briles is a proven developer of professional talent, evidenced over the last three NFL drafts where his proteges include the first lineman selected in 2009 (second overall pick Jason Smith from Baylor), the first receiver selected in 2008 (33rd pick Donnie Avery of Houston) and the third quarterback selected in 2007 (36th pick Kevin Kolb of Houston).

A native of West Texas, Briles became Baylor's 25th head football coach after resurrecting the University of Houston's football program in a five-year stretch from 2003 to 2007.

Briles, who inherited a Houston program that was just two years removed from an 0-11 season and won eight total games from 2000 to 2003, posted a 34-28 record with the Cougars and guided them to four bowl games. He ranks as the program's third-winningest head coach behind College Football Hall of Famer Bill Yeoman (160 wins in 26 seasons) and Clyde Lee (37 victories in seven seasons).

Briles arrived to Houston from Texas Tech, where he spent three years (2000-02) as the Red Raiders' running backs coach. The Tech ground game flourished under Briles' direction, increasing its production every year and producing a 2001 first-team All-Big 12 performer in Ricky Williams. The Red Raiders won seven or more games each season Briles was on Mike Leach's staff and went bowling every year.

Prior to moving into the collegiate coaching ranks at Texas Tech, Briles spent 12 seasons (1988-99) as head coach and athletic director at Stephenville [Texas] High School. His Yellowjacket teams won four state championships, capturing back-to-back crowns in 1993 and 1994 and repeating that feat in 1998 and 1999.

Briles, a former Texas High School Coaches Association president, has spent his entire coaching career in the state of Texas. Following in his father's footsteps, Briles began his coaching career as an assistant at Sundown [Texas] High School in 1979 before moving to Sweetwater [Texas] High School as an assistant from 1980-83. At age 28, he landed his first head coaching job at Hamlin [Texas] High School (1984-86), where he also served as athletic director.

From Hamlin, Briles went to Georgetown [Texas] High School as head coach and athletic director for two seasons (1986-87) before moving to Stephenville in 1988. While coaching in the high school ranks, Briles developed six Division I quarterbacks and had five signal callers throw for over 3,000 yards in a season.

A former wide receiver for the Cougars from 1974 to 1977, Briles was a member of the 1976 Cougar squad that captured the Southwest Conference championship in UH's first season in the league.

He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Texas Tech in 1979 and a Masters of Education degree from Abilene Christian in 1984.

A Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame inductee for his West Texas exploits, Briles and his wife, Jan, have three children: Jancy, a graduate of the University of Houston who works in the Dallas Cowboys Public Relations office; Kendal, a Cougar letterman and UH graduate who serves as an assistant coach on Baylor's staff; and Staley, a UH graduate. Briles was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame in April 2008.

BAYLOR IN TELEVISED GAMES

Saturday's game is the 124th televised game in Baylor football history; the Bears are 41-80-2 all-time in televised games, including a 2-0 mark last season. Baylor snapped a six-game losing streak in televised games with its 45-17 victory over Washington State early last season.

This is Baylor's 26th all-time game on ABC and its second this season. The Bears defeated Wake Forest 24-21 on ABC in the 2009 season opener.

BAYLOR IN CONFERENCE OPENERS

Baylor is 45-43-4 (.511) all-time in conference openers. The Bears are 3-10 in Big 12 Conference openers. Baylor won its Big 12 opener in 2002 (def. Kansas 35-32), in 2003 (def. Colorado 42-30) and in 2006 (def. Kansas State 17-3). The Bears have never won a Big 12 opener on the road (1996 at Texas Tech, 1998 at Colorado, 1999 at Oklahoma, 2001 at Iowa State, 2004 at Texas, 2005 at Texas A&M).

This is the third time Baylor has played Oklahoma in its Big 12 opener, doing so for the second straight season. The Bears suffered a 41-10 loss at Norman in 1999 and a 49-17 loss at Floyd Casey Stadium last season. Baylor opened Big 12 play against Colorado, Iowa State, Texas A&M and Texas Tech twice each, and against Kansas, Kansas State and Texas once each.

In 79 seasons as a member of the Southwest Conference, Baylor was 42-33-4 (.557) in league openers. The Bears won six of their last seven, 10 of their last 12 and 14 of their last 17 such SWC games.

EPPELSON NAMED NATIONAL PUNTER OF THE WEEK

P **Derek Epperson** was named co-National Punter of the Week by College Football Performance Awards. Epperson, a 2009 All-America and Ray Guy Award candidate, punted six times last Saturday against Northwestern State with a 49.3-yard average and a 45.0-yard net average. He also had two punts of 50-plus yards.

Epperson leads the Big 12 Conference and ranks second nationally with a 47.6-yard average this season. Baylor's single-season punting average record is 46.5 yards per punt, established by **Daniel Sepulveda** in 2006. This season, Epperson has produced five punts of 50-plus yards in 15 total punts. Baylor ranks 12th nationally in team net punting (45.3 ypp).

BANGED-UP BEARS

After a nearly injury-free 2008 season, seven Baylor starters have sustained injuries at some point through the first four weeks of the 2009 campaign. That list included two players who have sustained season-ending injuries.

QB **Robert Griffin III** headlines that list; Griffin tore his ACL during the first quarter of the Northwestern State game and is out for the remainder of the season. Also out for the rest of the 2009 campaign is return specialist and nickelback **Mikail Baker**, who also sustained an ACL tear in the Northwestern State game. TB **Jay Finley** missed the last two games with an ankle sprain; however, he is expected to return to the field for Saturday's game at Oklahoma.

Other starters suffering injuries this season are CB **Antareis Bryan** (knee injury; return undetermined), CB **Tim Atchison** (broken hand; may continue playing), LG **John Jones** (ankle; missed Northwestern State game) and S **Jeremy Williams** (ankle; missed Connecticut game). Furthermore, QB **Blake Szymanski**, who would have been Griffin's backup, missed the Kent State game due to an injured shoulder.

RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS STREAK CONTINUES

Baylor has scored at least one rushing touchdown in 16 consecutive games, dating back to last year's season opener. That streak is the second-longest in Baylor history and the Bears' first of more than 13 games since a 14-game stretch that covered the final seven games of the 1997 season and the first seven games of the 1998 season.

The school record for consecutive games with at least one rushing touchdown is 33 games. That streak started in the fourth game of the 1951 season and continued until the sixth game of the 1954 season. Baylor was 19-11-3 during that stretch. After that streak ended, the Bears scored at least one rushing touchdown in each of their next 13 games. In fact, from 1951 to 1956, Baylor never went consecutive games without a rushing touchdown.

BEARS AMONG NATIONAL RUSHING LEADERS

Baylor ranks 29th nationally and sixth in the Big 12 Conference with 196.3 rushing yards per game. The Bears have rushed for at least 147 yards in each game this season and at least 100 yards in seven consecutive games, dating back to last season.

Furthermore, the Bears rank sixth nationally with 5.8 yards per carry. The next best per-carry average in the Big 12 is Nebraska at 5.7 yards per tote.

Baylor has scored 12 rushing touchdowns through the season's first four games. That already eclipses Baylor's season total in eight of the last 10 seasons.

BEARS THROW BLOCK PARTY

Baylor has blocked four kicks this season — three field goals and one extra point. DE **Jason Lamb** and DT **Phil Taylor** are responsible for the four blocks, each claiming two. Lamb had a blocked two field goals last week against Kent State, while Taylor also had a blocked extra point against the Golden Flashes. Baylor's single-season record for team blocked kicks is 13, established in 1980.

FINLEY RUSHING UP BAYLOR CAREER YARDAGE LIST

Due to missing both the Northwestern State and Kent State games, RB **Jay Finley** has not played enough games to qualify for national and Big 12 statistical rankings. If he did, Finley's rushing average (106.0 ypg) would rank 16th nationally and second in the league.

Finley recorded the fourth 100-yard game of his career three weeks ago against Connecticut, going for a career-high 121 yards on eight carries for a 15.1-yards-per-carry average. It was his fourth consecutive game with at least 90 rushing yards and his third 100-yard game in that stretch.

Finley enters the Oklahoma game with 1,284 career rushing yards, the 23rd-best career total in Baylor history. He needs 216 yards to become the 15th player in school history to amass at least 1,500 career rushing yards. With 716 yards, he would become the program's seventh 2,000-yard rusher and Baylor's first since **Darrell Bush** (1997-2000).

GETTIS CLIMBING BAYLOR RECEIVER CHARTS

WR **David Gettis** became the 24th player in Baylor history to amass 1,000 career receiving yards two weeks ago during the Northwestern State game. Gettis is the first Bear to accomplish the feat since 2005 when **Trent Shelton** and **Dominique Zeigler** both reached the 1,000-yard plateau.

Gettis also has recorded his 80th career reception last week against Kent State, moving up to 18th on Baylor's career top-20 list. With 20 receptions, he would become the eighth 100-reception player in Baylor history and the program's first since **Brandon Whitaker** reached the plateau in 2007.

BAYLOR SCHEDULE AMONG NATION'S TOUGHEST

After playing eight teams that went to bowl games in each of the last two seasons, Baylor is again slated to face eight returning bowl teams on its 2009 schedule, including five of its eight Big 12 opponents.

Baylor's 2009 schedule currently ranks as the nation's ninth toughest based upon cumulative opponents' winning percentage (24-13, .649). That factors only FBS opponents and games against FBS teams. Two other Big 12 teams rank in the nation's top 10; Oklahoma's schedule ranks as the nation's second toughest (28-10, .737), and Colorado's is sixth (27-13, .675). Another Baylor opponent — Connecticut — is tied with the Bears at ninth.

SZYMANSKI NO STRANGER TO STARTER ROLE

QB **Blake Szymanski** is no stranger to the starting quarterback role for the Bears. He was Baylor's starter in 2007 and has 13 career starts to his credit. Szymanski is 335-of-594 in his career for 3,691 yards and 27 touchdowns in his career.

A senior from Wichita Falls, Texas, Szymanski ranks 12th in Baylor history in career passing yardage. He also ranks ninth in career attempts, sixth in career completions, fourth in career completion percentage and tied for seventh in career touchdown passes.

In 2007, Szymanski established Baylor single-season records for passing yards (2,844), pass attempts (461) and touchdown passes (22).

HALFTIME STATUS KEY FOR BEARS

Baylor has lost 19 consecutive games when trailing at halftime. The last time the Bears overcame a halftime deficit was Oct. 21, 2006, against Kansas when the Bears overcame a 35-17 halftime deficit for a 36-35 victory. In that game, Baylor scored 19 fourth-quarter points to tie for the third-largest comeback in program history.

Likewise, the Bears have won six of their last eight games when leading at halftime. The lone losses in that time were at Nebraska and at Texas Tech last season.

JOEPAW AMONG NATIONAL TACKLES, INTERCEPTIONS LEADERS

With 352 career tackles, LB **Joe Pawelek** enters the Oklahoma game as the national leader in career tackles among active FBS players. Pawelek also is tied for 14th nationally with nine career interceptions, most among linebackers.

After ranking seventh nationally last season in tackles (10.7 per game), Pawelek ranks third in the Big 12 and is tied 26th nationally with 9.75 tackles per game this season.

BEARS DEFENSE PASSES TEST

Baylor is second in the Big 12 and ranks 19th nationally in pass defense, allowing 166.0 yards per game through the air. Furthermore, the Bears' pass efficiency defense rating of 97.45 leads the Big 12 and ranks 14th nationally. Baylor has seven interceptions this season while allowing only three passing touchdowns; that plus-four margin is the best in the Big 12.

With seven interceptions and five fumble recoveries, Baylor's defense has produced eight turnovers this season. The Bears have committed only six turnovers this season for a per-game turnover margin of plus-1.25 that leads the Big 12 and ranks 13th nationally.

30 POINTS KEY FOR BEARS

Since 2001, Baylor is 21-2 (.913) when scoring at least 30 points and 10-64 (.135) when scoring less than 30 points. The only losses in that span when scoring 30 points were at Texas in 2006 (63-31) and at Oklahoma in 2005 (37-30 in double overtime). Baylor has won 10 consecutive games when reaching the 30-point plateau.

LINEBACKERS BACK TO OLD TRICKS

Baylor's three starting linebackers — **Antonio Johnson**, **Antonio Jones** and **Joe Pawelek** — have combined for 110 of the Bears' 330 tackles this season (33.3 percent). Jones leads the Big 12 and ranks 21st nationally with 10.0 tackles per game, while Pawelek is tied for third in the league and is tied for 26th nationally with 9.75 stops per game. Johnson, who averages 7.75 tackles per contest, ranks 11th in the conference.

- Baylor eclipsed 100 yards rushing for the eighth consecutive game.
- Baylor won its 10 consecutive games when reaching the 30-point plateau. Since 2001, Baylor is 21-2 when scoring at least 30 points.
- Baylor moved to 6-0 when scoring 30-plus points and 5-0 when holding the opposition to 20 points or less in the **Art Briles** Era.

- Gettis moved into 18th place on Baylor's career receptions list. He now has 80 career receptions.
- Gettis moved into 19th place on Baylor's career receiving yards list. He now has 1,061 career receiving yards.
- Pawelek moved into fourth place on Baylor's career tackles list. He now has 352 career tackles.
- IR **Kendall Wright** established a career high for receptions in a game. His previous high was seven on two occasions.
- Wright recorded his second straight 100-yard receiving game and the fifth of his career.

FORMER SIGNAL CALLERS FIND NEW HOMES

Baylor's 2009 roster features seven student-athletes who were starting quarterbacks in high school, including one former signal caller who played quarterback beyond high school.

Safety **Jeremy Sanders** made the move to another position after playing quarterback at Navarro [Texas] College. He played running back last season and switched to safety this season. Sanders was a standout prep quarterback at Marlin [Texas] High School.

The most interesting position change was that of **Zac Scotton**, who now plays defensive end. The six-foot-six, 255-pound Scotton made the switch away from quarterback prior to his junior season at Houston's Cypress Creek High School after out-growing the position.

The "Voice of the Bears," John Morris (Baylor, 1980) enters his 23rd year broadcasting Baylor football and men's basketball in 2009-10. Morris, who has broadcast 239 consecutive Baylor football games entering the 2009 season, will broadcast his 250th consecutive game Nov. 21 when the Bears travel to Texas A&M.

A Kentucky native, Morris also produces the daily "State Farm Baylor SportsBeat," daily Big 12 reports and co-hosts the award-winning "Inside Baylor Sports" television show. Morris also hosts "The Central National Bank Art Briles Show" in the fall, the "State Farm Baylor Hour" January through May and a daily 60-minute program, "The John Morris Show," on Waco's 1660 ESPN Radio. This is Morris' 15th year as signature voice of Baylor athletics since succeeding the legendary Frank Fallon. In November 2002, he was presented the Frank Fallon Sportsmanship Award by the Greater Waco Chamber of Commerce.

Three-time Academic All-American J.J. Joe returns for his sixth season as color analyst. The Bears' leading passer for four consecutive seasons from 1990-1993, Joe graduated as Baylor's career passing and total offense leader and is one of the school's most decorated student-athletes as a three-time Academic All-American. He was inducted into the Baylor Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

Ricky Thompson returns for his 10th season providing sideline color and analysis. Thompson is a former SWC long jump champion and was the Bears' leading receiver in 1975 before embarking on a seven-year NFL career. He also is a member of the Baylor Athletic Hall of Fame.

Baylor's radio team also includes the multi-talented Craig Harper, who, in his 23rd year as a member of the crew, serves as executive producer of the football broadcasts.

PAWELEK NAMED CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALIST

Senior LB **Joe Pawelek** is one of 154 semifinalists for the 2009 William V. Campbell Trophy, presented by the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame (NFF). The award, formerly known as the Draddy Trophy, is endowed by HealthSouth.

Candidates are nominated by their respective schools, which are limited to one nominee each. Semifinalists must be seniors or graduate students in their final year of eligibility and carry a minimum GPA of 3.2 on a 4.0 scale. Candidates also must have demonstrated outstanding football ability, strong leadership and citizenship.

The winner will receive a trophy and a \$25,000 post-graduate scholarship. The Campbell Trophy will be presented Dec. 8 at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City.

BAYLOR ROSTER HAS LOCAL FLAVOR

Baylor's 2009 roster features 11 student-athletes from the Central Texas area, including two starters and three others listed second on the depth chart at their respective positions.

Headlining that group are starters CB **Tim Atchison** (Copperas Cove) and LB **Antonio Johnson** (Waco). Backups on the list are DS **Casey Cooper** (Abbott), BS **Andrew Judy** (Crawford) and RB **Jarred Salubi** (Waco). S **Jeremy Sanders** prepped at Marlin HS and also played junior college ball at Navarro College. Others on the list are DT **Courtney Green** (Corsicana), QB **Robert Griffin III** (Copperas Cove), S **Mike Hicks** (China Spring), OL **Zach Northern** (Waco-Midway) and PK **Chris Winkler** (Temple).

BEARS MEMORIALIZE KYLE WOODS

Baylor football helmets display a black circle with the initials "KW" for the 2009 season. The decal, located on the back of the helmets, is in memory of former Baylor letterwinner Kyle Woods, who passed away in early April at the age of 49.

Woods, who sustained an injury during a 1979 practice at Floyd Casey Stadium that rendered him a quadriplegic, had a heart attack on March 22, 2009, and was unable to regain consciousness.

As a 19-year-old sophomore defensive back from Dallas, Woods was a member of the scout team defense working against the second team offense. While making a tackle, Kyle fractured his neck and severely damaged his spinal cord. Because of Kyle's faith, determination, and positive attitude, he became an inspiration to his teammates and coaches during the 1979 Peach Bowl championship season and the undefeated 1980 Southwest Conference championship campaign.

At the end of the 1979 season, his teammates dedicated the Bears' game against Clemson to their fallen teammate. Baylor's captains proclaimed at the Peach Bowl's pre-game press conference that the Bears would win the game for Woods, and head coach Grant Teaff's team responded with a 24-18 victory over the heavily favored Tigers.

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONESES

Baylor's 2009 roster features five student-athletes with the last name Jones, including two starters **Antonio Jones** (linebacker) and **John Jones** (offensive guard). Also on that list are PK **Aaron Jones**, IR **Darius Jones** and LB **Jenner Jones**.

EPPERSON TABBED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN

Junior punter **Derek Epperson**, who inherited Baylor's punting chores from three-time All-American and two-time Ray Guy Award winner **Daniel Sepulveda**, is a consensus preseason All-Big 12 selection and has been tabbed a preseason All-American (first-team by *Lindy's* and *Yahoo! Sports/Rivals.com*, second-team by *Sporting News/Walter Camp*). Epperson is tied for ninth in Baylor history with 24 career punts of 50-plus yards and tied for sixth all-time with five punts of 60-plus yards.

TAYLOR NAMED PRESEASON BIG 12 NEWCOMER OF YEAR

Phil Taylor, a defensive tackle who sat out the 2008 season at Baylor after transferring from Penn State, was named the Big 12 Preseason Newcomer of the Year by a vote of the league's media. Taylor has been projected an All-Big 12 performer by preseason publications (second-team by *Phil Steele*, third-team by *Athlon*). The 6-4, 355-pound defensive tackle will have two seasons of eligibility with the Bears.

WALTON ANCHORS LINE AS RIMINGTON, OUTLAND, LOMBARDI CANDIDATE

Senior center **J.D. Walton**, an All-Big 12 honorable mention pick in 2008 (Associated Press) and preseason All-Big 12 selection in 2009 (third-team *Athlon*, fourth-team *Phil Steele*), is an All-America, Rimington Award, Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate. Walton has started all 24 games of his career since transferring from Arizona State in 2006. He anchored BU's 2008 offensive line that generated 2,349 rushing yards, the most at Baylor since 1981, as well as 29 rushing TDs.

POSITION CHANGES

A total of 10 Bears have switched positions since 2008, including eight that switched sides of the ball. During preseason camp, senior **Mikail Baker** moved from receiver to defensive back, sophomore **Matt Singletary** moved from receiver to defensive end and sophomore **Courtney Green** switched from the offensive to defensive line.

During the spring seven players were moved, including three offensive players to the defensive backfield: running back **Jeremy Sanders** (senior) and receiver **T.J. Scranton** (senior) moved to safety and receiver **Romie Blaylock** (sophomore) moved to cornerback. **Krys Buerck** (junior) moved back to receiver after playing last season at cornerback. **Sam Sledge** (senior) moved from defensive tackle to big slot (fullback). **Jason Lamb** moved from defensive end to defensive tackle and fellow senior **Ernest Smith** moved from wide receiver to the inside receiver position.

RETURNING AWARD-WINNERS

Baylor returns eight players who received on-field honors in 2008. The Bears return one All-American, five All-Big 12 honorees and two freshman All-Americans.

The returning award-winners are headlined by senior linebacker **Joe Pawelek**, a 2008 third-team All-America pick by *Phil Steele* and a three-year All-Big 12 selection (consensus first-teamer in 2008).

Additional 2008 All-Big 12 returners include first-teamer **Jordan Lake** (senior safety), second-teamer **Derek Epperson** (junior punter) and honorable mention selections **James Barnard** (senior offensive guard) and **J.D. Walton** (senior center).

Freshmen standouts from 2008 back as sophomores are **Robert Griffin** (quarterback, first-team) and **Kendall Wright** (wide receiver, third-team), each freshman All-Americans last season and Griffin was named the Big 12 Freshman of the Year by multiple outlets.

Running back **Jay Finley** (junior) was named second-team All-Texas by *Dave Campbell's Texas Football*.

Baylor's defense forced Wake Forest into three incomplete passes and a sack on the game's final series, sealing a 24-21 victory in each team's season opener. It was Baylor's first road victory in a non-conference game against a BCS opponent since a 14-0 victory at North Carolina State in 1995.

The Bears also earned their first victory in a season opener since a 28-23 victory at SMU in 2005. It was Baylor's first victory in a season opener against a current BCS program since defeating Ole Miss in 1975.

Leading 10-7 at halftime, Baylor took control of the game with a pair of third-quarter touchdowns. The first came on a 37-yard **Kendall Wright** scamper off a backward screen pass from **Robert Griffin III** with 13:12 remaining in the quarter. Later in the period, Griffin threw a backward screen pass to **Ernest Smith**, who then connected with **Lanear Sampson** for a 33-yard touchdown pass.

Wake Forest did not go quietly, though. With just 10 seconds remaining in the third, Riley Skinner hit Devon Brown on a 19-yard touchdown pass. The Deacons cut the Bears' lead to three points with 3:57 remaining in the game when Skinner found Andrew Parker in the back of the end zone for a 5-yard touchdown pass.

That was as close as the Deacons would get, though. The Bears expired nearly three minutes of game clock on their next possession before **Derek Epperson's** punt pinned Wake Forest at its own 12. Skinner, who was under intense pressure from Baylor linemen and linebackers, was unsuccessful on four consecutive pass attempts, including an **Antonio Jones** sack on third down.

Baylor out-gained Wake Forest 366 to 269 and won the turnover battle 4-to-1. Three Bears snagged interceptions, including **Joe Pawelek**; it was Pawelek's ninth career pick and fifth in his last five games. **Mikail Baker**, who moved from receiver to defensive back in the off-season, also had an interception. Pawelek added seven tackles, including one of Baylor's three sacks.

The Bears took the game's opening kickoff and drove 80 yards on eight plays, a drive that culminated in an 8-yard touchdown pass from Griffin to **David Gettis**. Ben Parks' 22-yard field goal in the waning moments of the first quarter staked the Bears to a 10-0 lead. Wake Forest answered at the 6:45 mark in the second quarter as Mike Rinfrette scored on a 2-yard run.

NOTES

- Baylor leads the all-time series 5-1. This was the programs' first-ever meeting at Winston-Salem.
- Baylor improved to 67-36-5 all-time in season openers, including a 13-23-1 mark when opening on the road. It was just Baylor's second victory in a season opener since 2002.
- Baylor snapped a 14-game losing streak when allowing the opponent to rush for at least 100 yards.
- Baylor eclipsed 100 yards rushing for the fifth consecutive game.

Three costly turnovers and a stagnant offensive performance led to a 30-22 loss to Connecticut for the Bears in their home opener.

After blocking a Connecticut field goal attempt on the final play of the first half, Baylor trailed 13-7 to start the second half.

However, **Mikail Baker** fumbled the opening kickoff of the second half; Connecticut recovered and scored four plays later. The fumble bug bit the Bears again on their next offensive play as **Jarred Salubi** fumbled and the Huskies recovered. Six plays later, Andre Dixon scored on a 1-yard run to push UConn's lead to 27-7; it was his third rushing touchdown of the day.

That 20-point deficit was too much for the Bears to overcome. **Robert Griffin** scored on a 5-yard run midway through the third quarter, and Connecticut added a 34-yard Dave Teggart field goal on its next possession.

Baylor pulled within striking distance late in the fourth quarter when Griffin scored on a 1-yard run and then connected with **Justin Akers** on a jump-pass two-point conversion to cut the deficit to 30-22. However, Connecticut recovered the Bears' onside kick and gained two first downs to run out the clock.

Connecticut out-gained Baylor 382-266 on the day, including a 235-147 edge on the ground. The Bears, who managed only 11 first downs on the day, had just 88 yards of offense at the 10:49 mark in the third quarter. Most of that came on **Jay Finley's** 72-yard touchdown run midway through the first quarter that gave the Bears a 7-3 lead, their only lead of the day.

Teggart opened the scoring with a 39-yard field goal, capping an 11-play, 55-yard drive for the Huskies on the game's opening possession. Three plays later, Finley produced the longest run of his career to date on a third-and-four scamper up the middle.

Connecticut recaptured the lead on the first play of the second quarter when Dixon scored on a 1-yard run. Teggart pushed the Huskies' lead to 13-7 with a 30-yard field goal midway through the second quarter.

Dixon finished with 149 yards rushing, the highest total by a Baylor opponent since Connecticut's Donald Brown rushed for 150 yards against the Bears one year earlier. Jordan Todman added 103 yards rushing.

Finley had a career day with 121 yards on eight carries; he also had one reception for six yards and accounted for 47.7 percent of the Bears' offense.

Joe Pawelek tallied 21 tackles, a career high and the most by a Baylor linebacker since **Mike Singletary**.

NOTES

- Connecticut leads the all-time series 2-0. This was the programs' first-ever meeting in Waco.
- Baylor fell to 78-25-5 all-time in home openers, including a 40-20 mark in Floyd Casey Stadium's 60-year history.
- RB **Jay Finley's** 72-yard touchdown run was a career long and tied for the 13th-longest run in Baylor history. It was Baylor's longest TD run since 1997.

Baylor's highest-scoring game in 67 years ended up being a costly victory. The Bears trounced Northwestern State 68-13 but lost quarterback **Robert Griffin III** and S/KR **Mikail Baker** to season-ending knee injuries.

Griffin sustained his injury on the game's opening drive but finished the first half. By the time Baylor had its first offensive possession of the second half, the Bears led 47-10; Griffin did not return to the field.

Baker's injury came on a kickoff return midway through the first half.

Griffin's injury came when he was stopped on a fourth-and-one rush at the Northwestern State 25. The Demons took over possession and marched 75 yards on 15 plays to take the game's first lead on William Griffin's 1-yard touchdown run. That was the last lead of the night for Northwestern State.

Baylor scored twice in the final three minutes, three seconds of the first quarter to take the lead, moving ahead on Griffin's 42-yard pass to **Kendall Wright**. Early in the second quarter, Griffin connected with Wright for another touchdown, this time from 38 yards away.

The Bears added a 76-yard **Jarred Salubi** scoring jaunt, a 9-yard **Terrance Ganaway** touchdown scamper and a 42-yard Gettis-to-**David Gettis** scoring pass to take a 41-10 lead at the half.

Jason Lamb's 25-yard interception return for a touchdown on the opening drive of the second half all but put the game out of reach. The Bears tacked on three more touchdowns in the third quarter. **Blake Szymanski** connected with **Willie Jefferson** for an 18-yard scoring strike, **Chance Casey** returned an interception 66 yards for a touchdown, and Ganaway fou pay-dirt from two yards out for his third touchdown of the night.

Gettis finished the night 13-of-19 passing for 226 yards and three touchdowns. Wright had five of those catches for 105 yards, while Gettis had four receptions for 85 yards. Salubi posted a career high with 131 yards rushing; Wright added 44 yards on four rushes, and Ganaway had 43 yards on seven carries.

Baylor's point total was its largest since a 68-0 victory over Blackland Army Air Force Base in 1942. The Bears marched to the Northwestern State 4 midway through the fourth quarter thanks to strong rushing from walk-on **Caleb McEachern**, who finished the game with 36 yards on seven carries. Third-string quarterback **Nick Florence** then took a knee three consecutive snaps, giving the ball back to Northwestern State.

NOTES

- Second and third quarters tied for the seventh-highest point totals in program history.
- Baylor's largest margin of victory since a 55-0 victory at Army in 1973.
- Baylor eclipsed 100 yards rushing for the seventh consecutive game.

Third-string quarterback **Nick Florence** rushed for two touchdowns in his first career start and Baylor won its first game without standout **Robert Griffin III**, beating Kent State 31-15.

Florence was 20-of-27 passing for 216 yards and added 60 yards rushing. He gave Baylor the lead for good with a 6-yard touchdown run in the second quarter.

Kendall Wright caught nine passes for 125 yards, and **Jarred Salubi** rushed for 64 yards and a touchdown in support of the freshman Florence.

Griffin was not the only offensive starter in street clothes for Baylor. Starting running back **Jay Finley** missed his second straight game with an ankle injury.

Even with most of its starting backfield missing, the Bears had 374 yards of offense.

Florence capped an 89-yard drive with a 6-yard run that finished by diving into the end zone. This gave the Bears a 14-7 lead with 13:02 left in the first half. The score came three plays after he hit Wright on a screen pass, which the speedy receiver turned into a 44-yard gain.

Salubi's 45-yard touchdown run gave the Bears a 21-7 halftime lead. Then Florence showed off his athletic ability on the opening drive of the second half. He scampered for gains of 14 and 10 before his 29-yard scoring run gave the Bears a 21-point lead.

Jacquise Terry had 109 yards rushing for Kent State, including a 61-yard scoring run on the first play from scrimmage after Florence's touchdown run. The Golden Flashes drove deep into Bears territory three times after that but only scored a safety. Freddy Cortez missed a field goal and Kent State was stopped twice on fourth-down attempts inside the 10, including once on a fake field goal.

Kent State got the scoring started when quarterback Giorgio Morgan fired a lateral to receiver Leneric Muldrow, who connected with a wide open Jameson Konz for a 35-yard touchdown pass. It was the first time this season the Golden Flashes scored on their opening drive.

Baylor came right back, tying the game at 7-7 on the ensuing possession. Florence kept the drive alive by hooking up with **Ernest Smith** for 10 yards on third-and-7, then Salubi broke loose for a 28-yard run down to the Kent State 2. Two plays later, Jerod Monk scored on a 1-yard run.

NOTES

- First-ever meeting between Baylor and Kent State.
- Baylor snapped a streak of 23 consecutive losses when being out-gained by the opponent.
- Baylor won its 10th consecutive game when scoring at least 30 points.
- Baylor eclipsed 100 yards rushing for the eighth consecutive game.
- The Bears recorded at least one rushing touchdown for the 16th consecutive game, the second-longest streak in school history.
