BIG 12 FOOTBALL QUICK HITS

- The 2010 non-conference schedule contains five games against teams that finished last season in the Top 25 (Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Iowa, TCU, Utah).
- Eighteen of 48 non-conference games in 2010 are against teams that played in bowl games last season.
- One-quarter (12) of the 2010 non-conference schedule features games against teams from BCS automatic qualifying conferences.
- The Big 12 leads all conferences with seven appearances in the BCS National Championship Game, placing a team in the title game seven of the last ten seasons.
- Since it began competition, the Big 12 leads the country with 81 consensus All-America selections over the last 14 years.
- Through its first 14 years, the Big 12 has been home to four Heisman Trophy winners.
- The Big 12 has produced 75 national award winners through 14 seasons.
- The Big 12 is the only conference with bowl tie-ins this season that feature opponents from BCS automatic qualifying conferences in all of its post-season games.
- Last season marked the second consecutive year the Big 12 had at least two of the top four Heisman Trophy finalists. In 2008, the Big 12 had four of the top five finalists – marking a first for a conference in the award's history.
- Big 12 teams have appeared in 17 BCS games during the 12-year history of the structure; ranking third among conferences, behind the Big Ten (21) and SEC (19).
- At least one Big 12 team has been ranked in the top four of the final BCS Standings in 10 of 12 years.
- A team from the Big 12 has ranked in the Top 8 nationally in scoring offense every season; with a team in the Top 4, 11 of 14 years.
- Defensively, the Big 12 has had a team finish among the Top 8 in the NCAA in scoring defense 11 of 14 seasons.
- Thirty-eight Big 12 Conference student-athletes (across all sports) were named ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-Americans during the 2009-10 academic year, more than any other Division I conference in the nation.

The Big 12 had 13 of its student-athletes earn first-team status, while 13 garnered second-team honors and 12 were named to the third team.

15th Annual Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship

The Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship returns to Cowboys Stadium in Arlington, Texas for the second consecutive year. The 2010 game takes place on Saturday, December 4, at 7:00 p.m. CT and will be nationally televised by ABC.

In 2010, the South representative will be the home team. Ticket information will be available at a later date.

Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Winners

In the 14-year history of the event, there have been six different winners. All-time titlists include Texas (1996, 2005, 2009), Nebraska (1997, 1999), Texas A&M (1998), Oklahoma (2000, 2002, 2004, 2006, 2007, 2008), Colorado (2001) and Kansas State (2003).

BCS Sightings

The 2009 season marked the Conference's 17th BCS game in the 12-year history of the structure. The Big 12 is 7-10 all-time in BCS games and has advanced two teams in the same season five times (2001, '03, '04, '07, '08).

Television Partners

ABC begins its 15th season as the Conference's national network television partner. The Big 12 also continues its long-standing relationship with FSN for its cable rights. FSN has sublicensed select television games in 2010 to ESPN.

Television Selections

Television selections will be announced on either a 12-day or six-day advance by the Conference office. The 12-day advances will be released on Mondays while the six-day will be available on Sunday's prior to that week's games.

Home Win Streaks

Oklahoma enters the 2010 season with a nation-leading 30-game home win streak. Texas is third with 15 consecutive home victories.

2010 NFL Draft

This past April the Big 12 became the first conference since 1946 to be home to the first four selections in the NFL draft.

Big 12 players accounted for five of the first six picks in the 2010 NFL draft; six of the top 14; and nine overall in the first-round, all coming in the first 24 selections.

Big 12 Bowl Partners

The Big 12 will have a new bowl lineup in 2010 with the New Era Pinstripe, Dallas Football Classic and Eagle Bank bowls joining the BCS/Fiesta, AT&T Cotton, Valero Alamo, Insight, Bridgepoint Holiday and Texas bowls.

With the new lineup, the Big 12 will be the only league that is matched up against BCS automatic qualifier opponents in each of its bowl games.

BAYLOR (4-8, 1-7)
This Week: Sam Houston State
Next Week: Buffalo

Baylor will regain the services of starting quarterback Robert Griffin in 2010. Griffin suffered a season-ending injury in the third game of 2009.

Receiver Kendall Wright returns for his junior campaign after totaling 65 receptions in 2009, the third-best single-season total in school history. He has caught at least one pass in each of his career 24 games.

Wright ranks 12th in career receiving yards with 1,365 and ninth on the career receptions list with 115 catches.

Four Bears ranked in the top 25 in the Conference in tackles last season, but only Antonio Johnson (T-23rd with 77), returns for the 2010 season. The senior has 165 career tackles.



COLORADO (3-9, 2-6)
This Week: vs. Colorado State
Next Week: at California

Scotty McKnight enters his senior season with a school-record streak of 36 games with at least one reception. He is in second place in all-time receptions at CU with 165.

Rodney Stewart ranked second in the league with five rushing performances of 100+ yards as a sophomore in 2009. Stewart also checked in at fifth in the conference with 73.1 yards per game.

Colorado had at least one sack in each game of the 2009 season for the first time since 1996. The Buffs return seven starters and 26 letterwinners on defense.

Colorado returns its 2009 All-Big 12 First Team honoree, Nate Solder, along with seven of its honorable mention selections in 2010.



IOWA STATE (7-6, 3-5)
This Week: Northern Illinois (Thursday)
Next Week: at Iowa

In 2009, Paul Rhoads was the first Cyclone coach to have a winning record in his debut season since George Veenker went 5-3 in 1931.

Quarterback Austen Arnaud ranks in the all-time top five of four ISU offensive categories, including third with 6,054 yards of total offense and fourth with 29 passing touchdowns. He is the current all-time leader in career completion percentage.

ISU ranked second in the nation in red zone defense and boasted four of the top 20 tacklers in the Conference. The Cyclones will have to replace three of those performers as David Sims is the only returner.

Alexander Robinson returns as ISU's leading rusher, having run for 100+ yards six times in 2009, giving him a total of nine 100+ games in his career. Robinson is No. 10 on the Cyclones' career rushing chart with 2,363 yards.



KANSAS (5-7, 1-7)
This Week: North Dakota State
Next Week: Georgia Tech

Turner Gill has taken the reins as head football coach after serving the previous four seasons as head coach at Buffalo University.

Kansas returns two of its top three tacklers from 2009, including linebacker Drew Dudley (88 tackles) and defensive back Chris Harris (84).

The Jayhawks return seven defensive starters and seven on offense. They return four of five offensive linemen, including Tanner Hawkinson, who earned Freshman All-America honors from several publications in 2009.

Toben Oporum, KU's leading rusher as a freshman in 2009, has moved to linebacker.



KANSAS STATE (6-6, 4-4)
This Week: UCLA
Next Week: Missouri State

Daniel Thomas ended 2009 with 1,265 yards rushing, the fourth-best single-season total in school history. The Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year led the league with an average of 105.4 yards per game.

The Wildcats finished fifth in the league in rushing defense in 2009 and seventh in pass defense. DE Brandon Harold, who was a freshman All-American after leading all first-year players with 10.5 tackles for loss in 2008, missed most of last season, but his return is expected to boost the pass rush.

As many as four different quarterbacks will compete for the starting job with senior Carson Coffman headlining the group after seeing action in six games last season. The wide receiver corps will feature sophomore transfers Chris Harper (Oregon) and Broderick Smith (Minnesota).

The K-State defense forced 25 turnovers in 2009, good for a +7 margin - second-best in the Big 12 and tied for 20th nationally.



MISSOURI (8-5, 4-4)
This Week: vs. Illinois (St. Louis)
Next Week: McNeese State

Returning QB Blaine Gabbert finished third in the Big 12 in passing yards per game (276.4), second in passing efficiency (140.5) and fourth in total offense (292.1) in 2009.

Defensive lineman Aldon Smith set the MU record for sacks in a season (11.5) and was named Freshman All-America by *CollegeFootballNews.com* and the Football Writers Association of America.

Kicker Grant Ressel returns in 2010 for the Tigers after finishing 2009 with an accuracy percentage of 96.3 (26-of-27) - good for best in the Conference and a Big 12 record. Ressel also made 39-of-39 point after touchdowns.

MU must replace the offensive output of Danario Alexander, who recorded three 200-yard receiving games on the season - tying the record achieved four times previously at MU. He ended his career as the school's all-time leader in receiving yards with 2,778.



NEBRASKA (10-4, 6-2)

This Week: Western Kentucky
Next Week: Idaho

Nebraska finished 2009 with a record of 10-4, giving the program its first 10-win season since 2003 and its 25th overall. With a shutout in the Holiday Bowl, Nebraska improved to 24-22 in bowl games and Bo Pelini is now 3-0 in bowls.

In 2009, the Huskers led the nation in scoring defense, pass efficiency defense and red-zone defense; ranked second in sacks, seventh in total defense and ninth against the run.

The Huskers return defensive tackle Jared Crick, who racked up 9.5 sacks and 73 overall tackles to earn first-team All-Big 12 honors.

On offense, the Huskers return I-back Roy Helu Jr., who earned 1,000 rushing yards last year as a junior. An All-Big 12 honorable mention, Helu enters the 2010 season with 2,159 career rushing yards.



OKLAHOMA (8-5, 5-3)

This Week: Utah State
Next Week: Florida State

The Sooners finished 2009 with a victory at the Brut Sun Bowl. OU is 15-17-1 in 43 bowl appearances with both figures ranked in the top 10 nationally.

QB Landry Jones broke Sam Bradford's Oklahoma record (3,121) for passing yards by a freshman with 3,198 yards last season. Jones also led the nation's freshmen in touchdown passes (26) and passing yards.

Ryan Broyles enters his junior season ranked third on OU's all-time list with 1,120 receiving yards. He is the fourth player in program history to eclipse 1,000 receiving yards in a single-season.

Named on several preseason watch lists, defensive lineman Jeremy Beal returns after recording 19 tackles for loss and 11 sacks in 2009.



OKLAHOMA STATE (9-4, 6-2)

This Week: Washington State
Next Week: Troy

Head Coach Mike Gundy recorded his second straight nine-win season in 2009, including a school-record six conference wins. The Cowboys won nine games for the seventh time in school history.

P/K Quinn Sharp returns for his sophomore season after being honored with the 2009 College Football Performance Award as the nation's top kickoff specialist. Sharp ranked fifth in the nation in punting (45.12), with the second-highest single-season average in OSU history.

Under first-year offensive coordinator Dana Holgerson, the Cowboys have worked on implementing a new offensive scheme for 2010. OSU led the Big 12 in rushing offense for the fourth-consecutive season and ranked 22nd in the nation in 2009.

Junior Brandon Weeden will start at quarterback for the Cowboys. Weeden joined the team in 2007 after playing professional baseball.



TEXAS (13-1, 8-0)

This Week: vs. Rice
Next Week: Wyoming

Mack Brown's teams have finished every season ranked in the top 25 nationally and have not finished lower than second in the Big 12 South division during his tenure.

The Longhorns return sophomore QB Garret Gilbert, who ended his freshman season by playing his first full collegiate game in the 2010 national title contest. He completed 15-of-40 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns.

Senior Sam Acho returns at defensive end after recording nine sacks during his junior season. The Longhorns return a strong secondary, with Blake Gideon, Chykie Brown, Curtis Brown and Aaron Williams in the backfield.

Teas ranked in the top five in scoring offense every week of 2009, finishing the season No. 3. The Horns ranked first in rush defense and third in total defense.



TEXAS A&M (6-7, 3-5)

This Week: Stephen F. Austin
Next Week: Louisiana Tech

The 2009 Aggie offense was the first team in school history to surpass 6,000 total yards in one season, breaking the previous record of 5,653 yards set in 1990.

The Aggies return senior Jerrod Johnson at the helm of the offense. He currently ranks first on A&M's all-time list in single season passing yards (3579), completions (196) and touchdown passes (30). He also has the most career touchdown passes with 53.

Senior Von Miller returns at defensive end/linebacker after leading the nation in 2009 with 17 sacks and an average of 1.31 per game.

Texas A&M finished last season ranked fifth nationally in total offense (465.8), 16th in pass offense (281.6) and 19th in scoring offense (32.8).



TEXAS TECH (9-4, 5-3)

This Week: SMU (Sunday)
Next Week: at New Mexico

Tommy Tuberville will begin his first season as head coach of Texas Tech. He holds an overall career record of 110-60 and is 6-3 in bowl games.

Senior quarterback Taylor Potts ended the 2009 season with 22 touchdown passes, ranking him ninth on Tech's all-time single-season list. He completed 309-of-470 passes for 3,440 yards.

Running back Baron Batch returns after earning season totals of 884 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2009. He finished his junior season by posting 100 yards and two touchdowns in the Alamo Bowl.

The Red Raider offense ranked third or better nationally in passing every week throughout the 2009 season.
