BIG 12 FOOTBALL QUICK HITS

- Has the nation's top-ranked team (Oklahoma) in both preseason polls with four other squads (Oklahoma State, Texas A&M, Missouri and Texas) ranked in the coaches poll and three additional (TAMU, OSU and MU) rated in the media poll.
- Is tied with a nation-leading seven appearances in the BCS National Championship Game.
- Has appeared in 18 BCS games during the 13-year history of the structure to rank third among conferences.
- Has advanced two teams to BCS games in the same season five times (2001, '03, '04, '07, '08).
- Leads the country with 89 football consensus All-America selections. The eight honorees in 2010 were a national-high.
- Has been home to four Heisman Trophy winners.
- Will play six 2011 non-conference games against teams that finished last season in one of the Top 25 polls (TCU, Tulsa [twice], Florida State, Arkansas, Nevada).
- Will play half of its 2011 non-conference games (15-of-30) against teams that played in bowl games last season.
- Has 10 non-conference games in 2011 scheduled against teams from BCS automatic qualifying leagues.
- Has produced 81 national award winners in football.
- Is the only conference with bowl tie-ins that feature opponents from BCS automatic qualifying conferences in all of its post-season games.
- Has placed at least one team in the top four of the final BCS Standings in 10 of 13 years.
- Has ranked in the Top 8 nationally in scoring offense every season; with a team in the Top 4, 12 of 15 years.
- Defensively, has had a team finish among the Top 8 in the NCAA in scoring defense 12 of 15 seasons.

Nominees are forwarded by each institution's media relations department and selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis.

Postseason Awards

Big 12 postseason football awards will be announced at the conclusion of regular season play.

BCS Sightings

The 2010 season marked the Conference's 18th BCS game in the 13-year history of the structure. The Big 12 is 8-10 all-time in BCS games and has advanced two teams in the same season five times (2001, '03, '04, '07, '08).

Television Partners

ABC begins its 16th season as the Conference's national network television partner. The Big 12 also continues its long-standing relationship with FOX Sports for its cable rights after a new 13-year agreement that will take effect in 2012.

Television Selections

Television selections will be announced on either a 12-day or six-day advance by the Conference office. The 12-day advances will be released on Mondays while the six-day will be available on Sunday's prior to that week's games.

Home Win Streaks

Oklahoma enters the 2011 season with a nation-leading 36-game home win streak.

Diploma in Hand

Big 12 squads have a combined total of 47 student-athletes with football eligibility remaining who have already graduated.

BAYLOR (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: TCU (Friday)

Next Week: Open

Baylor was one of three schools in 2010 to rank in the top 25 nationally in both passing (19th, 280.7 ypg) and rushing (24th, 194.6 ypg) offense. The offensive balance led BU to a 7-6 record and its first bowl game appearance since 1994.

New defensive coordinator Phil Bennett will direct a unit that lost six starters. Bennett is a 32-year coaching veteran who has served as a coordinator at eight schools and a stint as head coach at SMU.

Junior quarterback Robert Griffin III is coming off a record-setting comeback season in 2010 in which he earned All-Big 12 second team honors and set or tied 27 school records.

The Bears open the season by taking on TCU for the 107th time. Baylor leads the overall series 50-49-7.



IOWA STATE (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: Northern Iowa

Next Week: Iowa

In his third season, Cyclones head coach Paul Rhoads will look to take Iowa State back to a bowl game as he did in 2009. He has a 12-13 record in two seasons in Ames.

The Cyclones return 13 starters (six offense, seven defense) from a 2010 squad that was 5-7 and 3-5 in Big 12 play.

Junior college transfer, Steele Jantz, will start at quarterback for Iowa State in week one. The junior led San Francisco City Community College to an 11-1 record and a state championship last year. Jantz has to replace three-year starter Austen Arnaud.

The Iowa State defense is led by junior linebacker Jake Knott. The team's co-captain averaged 10.8 tackles per game last season, while making four interceptions and forcing four fumbles. Knott is on watch lists for the Butkus Award, the Nagurski Award and the Bednarik Award.



KANSAS (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: McNeese State

Next Week: Northern Illinois

Turner Gill enters his second season as head coach at KU.

The Jayhawks have seven starters returning on offense, including tight end Tim Biere. The senior is a three-year starter and pulled in 19 passes for 228 yards and a team-best four touchdowns in 2010.

Sophomore Jordan Webb will start at quarterback for the Jayhawks in their season opener. Webb started seven games for KU in 2010. He finished 121-of-214 for 1,195 yards and seven touchdowns in nine total games.

On defense, top-tackler Steven Johnson leads a group of eight returnees. In 2010, Johnson had 95 tackles from his linebacker spot.



KANSAS STATE (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: Eastern Kentucky

Next Week: Open

The Wildcats will open the season with four of their first five games at home. All three of the non-conference contests for K-State will be against first-time opponents.

Head coach Bill Snyder enters his 20th season at the helm of the Wildcat program looking to direct K-State to its 13th bowl game in his tenure.

In 2010, Kansas State finished 7-6, with five of the losses by 10 points or less.

KSU has named junior signal-caller Colin Klein as its starter. The dual-threat athlete was one only two Big 12 quarterbacks with at least two 100-yard rushing games in 2010.



MISSOURI (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: Miami (Ohio)

Next Week: Arizona State (Friday)

The Tigers welcome back 17 starters (eight offense, nine defense) from a 2010 squad that finished 10-3 and went to the program's sixth consecutive bowl game.

In his 11th season at Missouri, head coach Gary Pinkel will turn to sophomore James Franklin to replace quarterback Blaine Gabbert. Franklin played in 10 games in 2010 as a reserve.

Offensively, MU will have every one of its 312 receptions and 3,292 receiving yards from the 2010 season coming back. Junior WR T.J. Moe and senior TE Michael Egnew headline that group.

Senior defensive end Jacques Smith and junior linebacker Zavier Gooden highlight a Missouri defense that was first in the Big 12 in scoring defense last season.



OKLAHOMA (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: Tulsa

Next Week: Open

The Sooners enter the 2011 campaign coming off a 48-20 win in the school's fifth Fiesta Bowl appearance. The squad also starts the season with more first-place votes in preseason polls than any other school in the nation, topping nine polls.

Ryan Broyles returns for his senior year as the 2010 NCAA leader in receptions per game (9.36) and total receptions (131). Broyles also ranked No. 3 nationally in receiving yards per game (115.86). He is OU's all-time leader in receiving yards (3,429), single-season receiving yards (1,622) and catches in a single season (131).

After compiling 4,718 passing yards, two shy of OU's school record held by Sam Bradford (2008), QB Landry Jones returns for the Sooners. Jones set the OU career record for pass attempts (1,066), passing Josh Heupel's record of 1,025 set from 1999-00. Jones also set the career completions record with 666.



OKLAHOMA STATE (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: UL-Lafayette
Next Week: Arizona (Thursday)

The Cowboys finished 2010 with a record of 11-2, giving the program its first 11-win season in school history. Head Coach Mike Gundy leads OSU with a 47-29 mark in his career.

Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year Justin Blackmon returns to the Cowboys after a record-setting season with 111 catches, 1,782 receiving yards and 20 touchdown receptions. Blackmon, an unanimous All-America, set NCAA records with 12-straight 100-yard receiving games and the most receiving yards recorded by a sophomore.

Senior QB Brandon Weeden became the first OSU passer to throw for more than 4,000 yards (4,277) last season. Weeden set a school record with 34 touchdown passes.



TEXAS (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: Rice
Next Week: BYU

The Longhorns return five offensive starters and seven defensive starters this season.

Back for action this season is junior QB Garrett Gilbert who completed 260-of-441 passes for 2,744 yards and 10 touchdowns in 2010.

Leading the front lines on defense is DT Kheeston Randall and DE Alex Okafor. Combined, the pair recorded 69 tackles, 17 TFL, 3.5 sacks and 21 pressures.

Texas is 39-7 at Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium versus league opponents during the Mack Brown era, which is the second most by any team in the Conference over the last 13 years.



TEXAS A&M (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: SMU (Sunday)
Next Week: Open

Texas A&M is among a select group of teams in the NCAA FBS that have a returning 1,000-yard receiver (Jeff Fuller), rusher (Cyrus Gray) and passer (Ryan Tannehill).

Jeff Fuller returns for his senior season, after a record-setting junior campaign with 72 catches for 1,066 yards and 12 touchdowns, which tied or set school records in all three categories. The wideout also became A&M's first 1,000-yard receiver.

Running back Cyrus Gray posted 34 receptions for 251 yards last season, and became the second Aggie to surpass the 5,000-yard barrier in career all-purpose yardage.

The Aggies swept the Texas schools in the Big 12 for the first time in 2010 since the formation of the league in 1996.



TEXAS TECH (0-0, 0-0)

This Week: Texas State
Next Week: Open

Fresh off an eight-win season and a victory over Northwestern in the TicketCity Bowl, head coach Tommy Tuberville leads the Red Raiders for his second year. Tuberville became the first coach in school history to win a bowl game in his first season.

With 50 league wins since 2000, Texas Tech is the third-winningest program in the Big 12 this decade. The Red Raiders trail only Oklahoma and Texas.

Junior Seth Doege takes the reins this season as the Red Raiders' signal caller, replacing Taylor Potts. Doege earned playing time in six games over the last two years and made the start against Kansas in 2009.

Running back Eric Stephens returns after setting the TTU single-season kickoff return record twice (as a freshman and sophomore) during his career.
