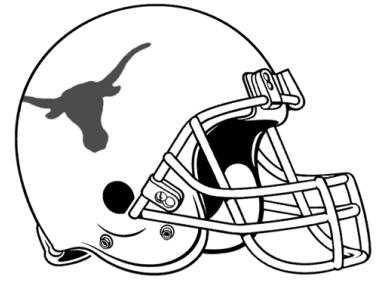

COACHES POLL: Texas is ranked 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll.

THE SERIES: Texas and Oklahoma first met in 1900 in Austin with the Longhorns registering a 28-2 victory. Including that meeting, the two teams have met 105 times. Texas holds a 59-41-5 series lead, including four of the last six.

TELEVISION: The game will be broadcast nationally on ABC. Brent Musburger (pxp), Kirk Herbstreit (analyst) and Erin Andrews (sidelines) will have the call.

RADIO: The game will be broadcast nationally by ESPN radio with Bill Rosinski (pxp), David Norrie (color) and Joe Schad (sideline) calling the action. The game will also be broadcast by the Longhorn IMG Radio Network and KVET (1300 AM/98.1 FM) on its 40-station network and is available online at TexasSports.com with Craig Way (pxp), Roger Wallace (color) and Rod Babers (sidelines). A live radio broadcast for each UT game also can be heard on XM Satellite Radio (Ch. 202) and on Sirius (Ch. 215) with the "Premier" package (Subscriber Only). Dr. Rubén Pizarro (pxp) and Felipe Romero (color) will have the call this season for the Spanish Language Radio Broadcasts.

106TH AT&T RED RIVER RIVALRY GAME:

A classic matchup is once again in place as one of the nation's oldest and most-unique rivalries — the Texas/Oklahoma series — is set for its 106th renewal on Saturday, Oct. 8 at the Cotton Bowl (11 a.m./CT/ABC). The rivalry, which pits the two Big 12 Conference foes on a neutral field with the crowd split evenly, is in its sixth year of sponsorship with AT&T and is officially tagged the AT&T Red River Rivalry. This year has No. 11/10 Texas (4-0/1-0 Big 12) meeting No. 3/1 Oklahoma (4-0/1-0 Big 12). It marks the 32nd time both teams will enter the game undefeated with Texas holding a 17-13-1 advantage in the 31 previous meetings. Both teams enter the game ranked among the Top 10 for the 17th time with Oklahoma holding an 8-7-1 edge. UT is looking to win its fifth Red River Rivalry in the last seven years. The two teams alternate as hosts of the game and the Longhorns are the home team this year. Texas will wear orange jerseys and be seated on the home bench (west/press box side). The Horns are coming off a 37-14 win at Iowa State, while Oklahoma defeated Ball State, 62-6, on Saturday.



RED RIVER RISING: Texas and Oklahoma have met 31 times when both teams were undefeated in the 105 all-time match-ups between the two storied programs. But, the game's impact on the national landscape has increased over the last 10 seasons. After meeting as undefeateds 27 times in 96 games prior to 2001, the Horns and Sooners will be meeting for the fifth time with zero losses since then. All four of the previous games have been match-ups between teams ranked in the Top Five with this season's being a Top 10 match-up. In addition, both teams have been ranked in the Top 15 in eight of the last 12 games (since 2000).

BIG-TIME RIVALRY: There is no rivalry quite like the Texas/Oklahoma series, which is being played for the 106th time this season. The series, which began in 1900, has been played in Dallas since 1912 and at the Cotton Bowl since 1929. Dallas' Cotton Bowl is located an equal distance from Austin and Norman, Okla. The stadium is split evenly among Longhorn and Sooner fans at the 50-yard line. It is the second-oldest UT series and tied for the 19th most-played rivalry in NCAA history. Only Texas A&M has met Texas on more occasions (117 times). Since 1900, the only years Texas and Oklahoma have not met were 1918, '20, '21 and 1924-28. The series resumed in 1929 at the State Fair of Texas and has remained a fixture since.

THE TEXAS-OU SERIES: Texas and Oklahoma first met in 1900 in Austin with the Longhorns registering a 28-2 victory. Including that meeting, the two teams have met 105 times. Texas holds a 59-41-5 series lead, including four of the last six. The Longhorns are the only Big 12 Conference team that holds an all-time series lead against the Sooners. Oklahoma leads the series, 6-4, over the last 10 years, but Texas has the advantage, 10-9-1, over the last 20 years. As for records by decade, Oklahoma led 6-4 in the 2000s, while the Horns led 7-2-1 in the 1990s. That comes after the Sooners held a 5-4-1 advantage in the 1980s. The rest of the series records by decade saw UT lead 9-2-1 in the 1900s; OU lead 6-3 in the 1910s; UT lead 3-0 in the 1920s; UT lead 6-3-1 in the 1930s; UT lead 8-2 in the 1940s; OU lead

7-3 in the 1950s; UT lead 9-1 in the 1960s; and OU lead 6-3-1 in the 1970s.

RED RIVER RIVALRY NO. 1 RANKINGS: Oklahoma enters the Red River Rivalry ranked No. 1 nationally. It marks the 13th time (OU nine times/UT four) in series history that one of the teams entered the game ranked first in the nation. The last time either UT or OU entered the Red River Rivalry as the top-ranked squad was 2008, when the fifth-ranked Longhorns defeated the top-ranked Sooners, 45-35. The last time Texas entered the game ranked No. 1 was 1984 when the Horns and No. 3 Oklahoma played to a 15-all tie. In addition to 1984, Texas entered the game ranked first nationally in 1946, '64 and '65. Prior to this year, Oklahoma entered the game as the No. 1 ranked team in 1954, '56, '57, '63, '78, '87, 2003, and 2008. OU has won six of the eight match-ups when it entered the game ranked first, while UT is 3-0-1 when it entered the game ranked No. 1 nationally.

TEXAS VERSUS NO. 1: Texas has faced off with the nation's No. 1-ranked team on 16 occasions all-time. The last time the Longhorns played the nation's top-ranked team was the 2010 BCS National Championship Game against Alabama. Prior to that, Texas defeated No. 1 Oklahoma, 45-35, in 2008 after falling to No. 1 Ohio State, 24-7 in 2006. The year before that, Texas defeated USC, 41-38, in the Rose Bowl to claim the 2005 National Championship.

MACK BROWN (Florida State '74): Texas' 14th-year head coach is 137-34 (.801) (83-22 Big 12) at UT, including the 2005 National Championship, and has a 223-108-1 (.673) mark over his 27-year career. Brown is the Big 12's winningest active coach (Division I-A games only) and has three BCS bowl wins in four appearances.

BOB STOOPS (Iowa '83): Head coach Bob Stoops holds a 133-31 record in his 13th season at Oklahoma. Stoops led the Sooners to the 2000 National Championship along with seven Big 12 titles. Stoops has also coached at Florida as a defensive coordinator (1996-98), Kansas State (1989-95), Kent State (1988-89) and Iowa (1983-87).

TOP 25 TREND: Both teams enter the game ranked among The Associated Press Top 25 for the 35th time since the poll began in 1936. Oklahoma holds a 17-14-3 edge, however UT is 9-2-1 in Top 25 matchups when it enters the game as the higher-ranked team and 5-15-2 when it is the lower-rated team. Texas and OU have met 25 times when both teams were ranked among the Top 15. The Sooners hold a 13-11-1 advantage in those Top 15 matchups. UT is 7-1-1 in Top 15 matchups when it enters the game as the higher ranked team and 4-12 when it is the lower rated team. Breaking it down further, the teams have met 16 times as Top 10 opponents with Oklahoma leading 8-7-1 and have met 10 times when both teams were ranked in the Top Five. Texas has been the lower ranked team in nine of the 10 Top Five match-ups and has gone 4-5. The Horns and Sooners tied the one Top-Five game when Texas entered as the higher ranked team.

TEXAS VERSUS OU TRENDS: At least one of the teams is entering this year's game ranked among the Top 25 for the 13th straight year and for the 63rd time (out of 75 possible games since the poll began in 1936) in series history ... since the AP Poll was established in 1936, the higher ranked team coming into the Red River Rivalry is 46-14-3 ... either UT or OU has entered as a Top 10 team on 50 occasions in series history ... Texas has been ranked in the Top 10 in 30 of the 50 games and is 21-8-1 in those contests.

TRADITIONAL POWERS: Texas and Oklahoma are two of the five winningest programs in NCAA history based on winning percentage. UT and OU have combined to produce a record of 1,669-629-86 (.718) over 236 years of football. The Longhorns rank fourth in all-time winning percentage (854-325-33/.7182), while Oklahoma is close behind in fifth (815-304-53/.7180). Texas currently ranks second in all-time wins and Oklahoma stands seventh. Texas has played in 49 bowl games and Oklahoma has made 44 bowl appearances.

LEAGUE LEADERS: Texas' 83 regular season conference wins since 1998 are the most of any Big 12 team, while OU ranks second with 82. Texas is 83-22 (.790) and Oklahoma is 82-23 (.781) in regular season league contests during that stretch. No other current league team is within 22 victories of the Horns during that span. As a matter of fact, the Longhorns and Sooners combined 45 Big 12 regular season defeats over the last 14 years are fewer than all but one current conference program. Texas Tech has the third-best record during that time span at 61-44.

SOLD OUT: This year's game is sold out, marking the 66th consecutive sellout at the Cotton Bowl, which has a current stadium capacity of 92,200.

SOONER TIES: UT head coach Mack Brown is one of the few who have seen the Texas/Oklahoma rivalry from both schools' sidelines. Brown was the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma in 1984 when No. 1 Texas and No. 2 Oklahoma played to a 15-all tie. Longtime UT staff member Bill Little will be working his 43rd consecutive Texas-Oklahoma game and his 479th consecutive game overall. University of Texas benefactor Frank Denius, for whom the Longhorns' practice facility is named, will be attending his 65th Texas-OU game.

CONFERENCE FOES: Texas and Oklahoma met as conference opponents in 1996 for the first time in 77 years. The Longhorns and Sooners first met as league foes when the Sooners were a member of the Southwest Conference from 1915-19 and now have conference bragging rights on the line for the 16th year as members of the Big 12. Oklahoma leads 8-7 in Big 12 games and holds a 11-8 lead in all-time conference games against the Longhorns.

OFF TO THE FAIR: The Texas/Oklahoma game is once again a part of a state festival with the State Fair of Texas surrounding the event. That continues a tradition which began in 1929. That year, the game was played in an old wooden structure called Fair Park Stadium, which was located on what is now a parking lot at Fair Park. A new stadium, also named Fair Park Stadium, was built in 1930 and renamed in 1936 as the Cotton Bowl. The name change came about because, at the time, Dallas was the largest interior spot cotton market in the world.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION: ABC Sports is broadcasting this year's game, which marks the 59th time the Texas/Oklahoma matchup will be televised. ABC will be carrying the game for the 20th time in the past 21 years. FOX Sports Southwest's telecast of the 1998 game snapped a string of seven consecutive contests carried by ABC. Forty UT/OU games have been network telecasts. The first-ever television appearance came in 1948 when a Fort Worth station carried the game live. Excluding OU television probation years (1974-75 and '89), the game is being televised for the 36th year in a row.

THE BATTLE LINE: One of the unique characteristics of the Texas/OU rivalry is the colors. With the tickets divided equally, burnt orange and crimson split down the middle. OU claims the south horseshoe from the 50-yard line and UT the horseshoe north of midfield. As the home team, the Longhorns will wear orange jerseys and occupy the west bench area (press box side) with that role reversing next season.

GAMEDAY REGULARS: ESPN College GameDay is set to cover the Longhorns for the 15th time overall when No. 11/10 Texas takes on No. 3/1 Oklahoma in Dallas. This will be the fifth time GameDay has covered a game in the series, with the last time being in 2009 when Texas won, 16-13. The year before, the Red River Rivalry was also featured in the first of three times over a four-week span that GameDay did a Texas game, the second time in the history of the show that a team was featured three times in four weeks. Ohio State also accomplished that in 2006. Overall, Texas is 9-5 with the GameDay crew in attendance. Previously, GameDay has visited Austin six times, Dallas four times, on the road at Ohio State (2005) and Texas Tech (2008) and was in attendance for the BCS National Championship Games for the 2005 and 2009 seasons.

THE GOLDEN HAT: To the victor goes the Golden Hat, a rotating trophy representing the winner of the Texas/Oklahoma contest. It's a gold cowboy hat mounted on a large block of wood and it has been a part of the series since the State Fair of Texas donated it in 1941. The only change has been the actual color. When it first arrived, it was known as the "Bronze Hat" and actually was bronze. When that hat was reworked in the 1970s, it came out gold, hence it is now officially known as the Golden Hat.

GOVERNOR'S CUP: The Governor's Cup is exchanged by the Governors of Texas and Oklahoma following the Red River Rivalry. The tradition started when Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe donated the trophy, and each year it is transported from the office of the previous year's winning Governor to Dallas. It is displayed in the Hall of State on game day and then transported to the office of that year's winning Governor after it has received its engraving.

UT/OU TORCHLIGHT PARADE: The annual Torchlight Parade is set for Wednesday night at 8 p.m. at the Main Mall on the UT campus. Head coach Mack Brown and the Longhorns squad will be on hand at approximately 9 p.m.

FOURTEENTH YEAR UNDER MACK BROWN: With Mack Brown in his 14th season at Texas, he is just the fourth coach in the 119 years of Texas football to coach the Longhorns for at least a decade and just the second UT coach to win 100 games while at Texas. Darrell Royal, who won 167 games, has the longest tenure at 20 years, while D.X. Bible and Fred Akers each coached in Austin for 10 seasons. Brown is the first coach in UT history to post 200 victories during a career. With a 137-34 (.801) record at UT, Brown has led Texas to the nation's third-most victories over the last 14 years. In addition, Brown has guided the Horns to a 110-23 (.827) mark over the last 11 seasons, which is

the nation's third-best winning percentage over that timespan, and includes six 11-win seasons (2001, '02, '04, '05, '08 and '09). The 11-win seasons are fourth-best to UT's 13-win campaigns in 2005 and '09, and its 12-win season in '08. Texas is the only school in the nation that has posted at least 10 wins in nine of the past 10 seasons (a UT record). Brown is the lone coach nationally to lead his team to nine or more victories in 14 out of the past 15 seasons. His 12 straight seasons of nine or more victories at UT are a school best. *Under Brown, the Horns have posted Top 10 finishes seven times in the last 10 years (2001, '02, '04, '05, '07, '08 and '09). Prior to his arrival, the last time UT finished in the Top 10 was 1983.* In addition, Texas played in a bowl game for a school-record 12-consecutive seasons from 1998-2009, bettering the previous streak of nine straight from 1977-85. Brown's personal strings, including time at North Carolina, go back even further. He has posted winning seasons in 20 out of the last 21 years and taken his teams to 18 bowl games in the last 19 seasons. His 20 winning seasons in the last 21 years is the best active streak in the nation and his 18 bowl games in the last 19 seasons is tied for the best active streak in the nation.

200 CAREER VICTORIES: With a victory against Texas A&M in 2008, Mack Brown became the first head coach in UT history to reach the 200-victory plateau during a career, and he currently has a career record of 223-108-1 (.673). Brown's 223 career wins rank 13th on the NCAA all-time victories list. Brown became just the 19th coach who has spent at least 10 years at a NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) school, to win 200 games and the seventh-youngest coach to do so. He also is one of only two active coaches who have reached the 200-victory mark while coaching at an FBS school. In addition, Brown is one of only six active coaches at FBS schools who have won

100 games at their current school (137-34/.801). Of the 69 coaches who have ever won 100 games at the same FBS school, Brown is the 12th-fastest to reach the century mark (124 games) and the fourth-fastest among active coaches.

UT'S NO. 2 ALL-TIME: Mack Brown has won 137 games at Texas. He is in second place on UT's all-time list behind only Darrell Royal, who tallied 167 victories from 1957-76. Brown moved ahead of Fred Akers, who posted 86 wins from 1977-86, during the 2006 season.

TEXAS POSTS SECOND-LONGEST ALL-TIME STREAK OF NINE CONSECUTIVE 10-WIN SEASONS: Texas has posted 10 wins in nine of the last 10 seasons, which includes a streak of nine straight that made it just the second team in college football history to win at least 10 games in nine straight seasons. The Horns' streak trails only Florida State's streak of 14 consecutive seasons in NCAA history. Overall, Texas' 137 victories over the last 14 years are third-most in the nation. The Horns also have the most Big 12 wins (83) during that time. In addition, Texas has won seven of its last nine bowl games, including three BCS triumphs and a BCS Championship Game victory. Mack Brown's eight bowl victories at UT are tied with Darrell Royal. In fact, UT's eight bowl victories over the last 13 seasons under Brown equal the amount Texas won in the 30 years prior to Brown's arrival.

DOUBLE-FIGURE SUCCESS: Texas has won at least 10 games in nine of the last 10 seasons, which includes a string of nine straight. The nine straight years with at least 10 wins is the second-longest streak in NCAA history, trailing only Florida State's 14-year streak from 1987-2000. In addition, Texas posted 12-win seasons in back-to-back years for the first time in school history. Prior to Brown's arrival, the Horns had never before posted consecutive 11-win campaigns let alone consecutive 12-win seasons. Brown has led the Horns to six seasons with 11 or more wins. That compares to the four 11-win seasons (1963, '69, '77 and '83) in Texas history before Brown's arrival.

REWRITE THE RECORD BOOK:

During Mack Brown's 14-year tenure at Texas, the Horns have set 279 school records. The offense has led the way by setting 172 team, individual, game, season and career records. UT also has set 18 defensive records, 33 special teams records, 25 bowl game records and 31 freshman records. In addition, the Horns have set every major school attendance record during the Brown era.

STRING OF SUCCESS: Texas has finished the year ranked among the nation's Top 15 in 10 of the last 11 seasons, which includes a string of 10 consecutive, which is a Longhorn best. In addition, UT has finished in the Top 10 in seven of the last 10 seasons (2001, '02, '04, '05, '07, '08 and '09) and in the Top Five in four of the last seven ('04, '05, '08 and '09). You have to go back to Darrell Royal's string of success in the late 1960s, when the Horns finished among the Top Five four out of five years (1968-72), to equal that consistency in UT history.

BOWL SUCCESS: Texas played in a bowl game for a UT-record 12th straight season in 2009, bettering the previous mark

of nine-straight from 1977-85. The Horns have won seven of their last nine bowls and have an 8-4 record under Mack Brown. In

the 13 years prior to Brown's arrival, Texas went to six bowls and was 2-4. Brown is the first UT coach since Darrell Royal, who was 8-7-1 in bowl games, to post a .500 or better bowl record. With a 24-21 victory over No. 10 Ohio State in the 2009 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, Texas won bowl games in five consecutive years for the first time in school history (2004-08). The Horns did win five straight previously (1963-64, '66, '68-69), but the streak was interrupted by seasons that did not result in a bowl. Brown's personal string, including time at North Carolina, goes back even further. He has directed his teams to 18 bowl games in the last 19 seasons which is tied for the longest active streak in the nation.

LONGHORN RETURNEES:

Texas returns 47 lettermen (25 offense/21 defense/one specialist) and 14 players with starting experience (six offense/eight defense) from the 2010 squad. The 14 players with starting experience have combined to start 233 games (84 offense/149 defense).

NATIONAL AWARDS WATCH:

The Longhorns already have seven players named to 2011 preseason national award watch lists. Senior LB Emmanuel Acho, a 2010 second-team All-Big 12 and first team Academic All-Big 12 selection, has been named to the 2011 Lott IMPACT Trophy (nation's top defensive player) and Butkus Award (nation's top LB) watch lists. In addition, Acho is a nominee for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award and is a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy (college football's top scholar-athlete). Joining Acho on the Butkus list is senior LB Keenan Robinson, a 2010 Butkus semifinalist and second-team All-Big 12 honoree. Robinson is also on the Bednarik Award, Nagurski Trophy (both nation's top defensive player) and Lombardi Award (nation's top interior lineman) preseason lists. Senior DT Kheeston Randall joins Robinson on the Lombardi Award list and is also on the

Outland Trophy list (nation's top lineman), while senior S Blake Gideon is on the Thorpe Award list (nation's top DB), senior K Justin Tucker is on the Lou Groza watch list (nation's top kicker), junior DE Alex Okafor is on the Hendricks Award watch list (nation's top DE) and sophomore WR Mike Davis is on the Biletnikoff Award list (nation's top receiver).

2011 SENIORITY: A group of 14 seniors, who have played in a combined 489 games (182 starts), lead the 2011 Longhorns. TE Blaine Irby (18 games/four starts), RB Cody Johnson (42 games/eight starts), OG David Snow (43 games/23 starts) and RB Fozzy Whittaker (33 games/17 starts) have all started games on the offensive side of the ball while LB Emmanuel Acho (39 games/17 starts), S Blake Gideon (43 games/43 starts), DE Kheeston Randall (38 games/26 starts), LB Keenan Robinson (42 games/30 starts) and S Christian Scott (26 games/10 starts) return with first-team experience on defense. In addition, OG Tray Allen (35 games/four starts), FB Jamison Berryhill (25 games), TE Ahmard Howard (37 games), PK/P Justin Tucker (43 games) and DS Alex Zumberge (25 games) return with game experience.

IMMEDIATE IMPACT: Eighteen true freshmen of a possible 23 played in the season opener against Rice, which is the most in an opener in the Mack Brown era and the most in the nation for the 2011 season. Mack Brown has now played 133 of a possible 323 true freshmen (41.2%) in his 14 seasons at Texas. The group included QB David Ash, RB Malcolm Brown, OL Josh Cochran, CB Quandre Diggs, LB Steve Edmond, DB Sheroid Evans, OL Sedrick Flowers, DL Desmond Jackson, LB Tevin Jackson, RB Joe Bergeron, FB Chet Moss, WR Miles Onyegbule, DE Cedric Reed, DB Leroy Scott, WR Jaxon Shipley, LB Kendall Thompson, DB Mykkele Thompson and DB Josh Turner. In 2010, 12 true freshmen out of a possible 24 saw action in the season opener, which was the previous record under Brown.

OFFENSIVE RETURNEES: Texas returns 12 players in 2011 that have starting experience at almost every offensive position. A pair of running backs return with starting experience in seniors Cody Johnson (42 games/eight starts) and Fozzy Whittaker (33 games/17 starts). In 2010, the pair recorded 943 rushing yards and eight TDs on 214 carries. Also back from 2010 is sophomore wide receiver Mike Davis (15 games/nine starts). Up front, the Horns return four offensive linemen with starting experience in senior C David Snow (43 games/23 starts) and a trio of sophomores in OG Mason Walters (17 games/16 starts), OL Trey Hopkins (16 games/eight

starts) and OT Paden Kelley (11 games/one start). Senior OG Tray Allen (35 games/four starts) also returns for the Horns and has started the first four games in 2011. Junior quarterback Garrett Gilbert (24 games/14 starts) also returned to start the season prior to season-ending surgery. Texas returns three tight ends with starting experience in junior Barrett Matthews (29 games/six starts), sophomore Dominique Jones (10 games/five starts) and senior Blaine Irby (18 games/four starts), who has returned from injury. Jones and Matthews combined for 26 receptions for 61 yards and two TDs in 2010.

DEFENSIVE RETURNEES: The Longhorns' defense returns six starters that covered every level of the defense and nine players with starting experience for the 2011 season. The nine returnees with starting experience entering the season have combined for 159 career starts. Up front, the Horns are led by DT Kheeston Randall (38 games/26 starts) and DE Alex Okafor (30 games/12 starts). Okafor, who started eight games at DT in 2010, combined with Randall to record 69 tackles, 17 TFL, 3.5 sacks and 21 pressures. A pair of defensive ends also return with starting experience in junior Dravanni Johnson (16 games/five starts) and sophomore Jackson Jeffcoat (12 games/six starts). The pair tallied 38 tackles, eight TFL, 3.5 sacks and 13 pressures. Senior linebackers Keenan Robinson (42 games/30 starts) and Emmanuel Acho (39 games/17 starts) will provide veteran leadership for the defense. The duo ranked first and second on the team in tackles in 2010, combining for 200 tackles, 20 TFL, five sacks, three INTs, eight PBU, five pressures, three fumble recoveries and three forced fumbles. In the secondary, senior safeties Blake Gideon (43 games/43 starts) and Christian Scott (26 games/10 starts) return with junior safety Kenny Vaccaro (29 games/10 starts). The trio combined to start every game at the safety positions in 2010, with Gideon starting all 12 games at free safety with Scott and Vaccaro manning the strong safety position. They combined for 177 tackles, eight TFL, four INTs, 13 PBU, four forced fumbles and two blocks. In addition, sophomores DT Calvin Howell

(18 games/one start), DT Ashton Dorsey (13 games/three starts), LB Jordan Hicks (16 games/three starts), CB Carrington Byndom (16 games/four starts), CB Adrian Phillips (16 games/three starts), DE Reggie Wilson (16 games), and DB A.J. White (nine games) returned with experience with many gaining starting nods this season.

NO. 2 ALL-TIME: In 2008, Texas moved ahead of Notre Dame for second place on the NCAA all-time victory list. At 854 victories, Texas trails only Michigan in all-time wins. With the Longhorns in second place on that list, it marked the first time since 1932 that Michigan and Notre Dame did not occupy the one-two spots in all-time wins. Since Mack Brown arrived in 1998, Texas has posted a 137-34 (.801) record and moved ahead of Alabama, Notre Dame and Nebraska on the all-time victory chart.

BROWN'S TOP 10 HORNS: Mack Brown revived the Horns as a Top 10 regular beginning with a No. 5 preseason ranking in 2001. Since then, the Horns have earned a Top 10 standing in 125 of the last 156 AP polls. *All totaled, UT has spent 132 weeks ranked among the AP Top 10 and 135 weeks ranked in the coaches' Top 10 since Brown arrived in 1998.* That coaches poll streak resumed in the Oct. 2, 2011 poll when the Longhorns returned with a No. 10 ranking. In the same 13-year stretch prior to his arrival, UT spent just 16 weeks rated among the Top 10. Brown has led the Horns to a final Top 10 ranking in seven of the last 10 seasons. In 2008, Brown led Texas to its first regular-season No. 1 ranking since 1984. In 2005, he led UT to its first No. 1 ranking to end the season since 1969. Before Brown took over the program, the last time UT earned a Top 10 finish was 1983. From the start of the 1984 season to Brown's arrival in 1998, UT was in the Top 10 just 28 times in 14 seasons.

WIRE-TO-WIRE: Texas is the nation's only school that has both started and finished the season ranked among the Top 15 in 10 of the past 11 seasons.

UT RETURNS TO AP TOP 25 POLL:

The Longhorns entered the Associated Press Top 25 poll at No. 24 after recording a 34-9 win over Rice to open the 2011 season and ended up moving to a tie for No. 23 following a voting mistake where they were initially listed at No. 24 after a win over BYU. They moved up to No. 19 after winning at UCLA and checked in at No. 17 during the bye week before advancing to No. 11 after winning at Iowa State. Following Rice was the first appearance in the poll for UT since its nation-leading and UT-record streak of 162 straight weeks in the poll was snapped following the loss to Oklahoma in 2010. The streak bettered a 114-week stretch from 1968-76. It was the sixth-longest streak in the history of the poll. Prior to the poll on Sept. 12, 2010, the Horns had been ranked in the AP Top 5 for 30 consecutive weeks, which was the longest active streak in the nation and the longest streak in the Mack Brown era. Texas has finished the year ranked among the AP Top 25 in 12 of Mack Brown's 13 years in Austin, including a string of 12 straight. That marked the first time in school history Texas has finished in the AP Top 25 for 12 straight years, bettering the previous record of eight straight seasons from 1968-75. *Dating back to his days at UNC, Brown's teams have finished the year ranked among the AP Top 25 in 14 of the last 15 seasons, including nine Top 10 finishes.*

UT CLIMBES IN COACHES POLL:

Texas moved from No. 24 to No. 21 after posting a season-opening 34-9 win over Rice and maintained that position following its win over BYU before moving up to No. 18 after a win at UCLA and No. 17 after the bye week. The Longhorns then returned to the Top 10 with its win over Iowa State, giving them 135 weeks total in the Top 10 during the Mack Brown era. Prior to Texas' loss to Oklahoma in 2010, UT had been ranked among the USA Today Coaches Poll for 190 straight weeks dating back to late in the 1998 season. The 190 straight weeks was the longest UT streak in any poll and the nation's longest active streak in the coaches poll. The Horns' previous longest streak in the coaches poll was 54 weeks from 1977-80.

Texas has been ranked in the first and last coaches poll in 12 of Mack Brown's 13 completed seasons in Austin. *Dating back to his days at UNC, Brown's teams have finished the year ranked among the coaches' Top 25 in 14 of the last 15 seasons, including nine Top 10 finishes.*

TEN STRAIGHT TOP 15 FINISHES:

Texas' No. 2 ranking in 2009 marked the 10th straight year the Horns finished ranked among the nation's Top 15. That is the first time UT had ever accomplished that feat. The 2009 standing followed a No. 3 ranking in 2008, a No. 10 ranking in 2007, a No. 13 ranking in 2006, a No. 1 ranking in 2005, a No. 5 ranking in 2004, a No. 12 ranking in 2003, a No. 6 ranking in 2002, a No. 5 ranking in 2001 and a No. 12 ranking in 2000.

UT AND THE AP TOP 10:

As a result of its loss at Kansas State in 2006, Texas had its string of 46-straight weeks in the AP Top 10 snapped. Prior to that, the last time the Horns were not among the AP Top 10 was in the final poll of the 2003 season. The 46-straight weeks was the longest for the Horns in the Mack Brown era. The longest Texas streak in the AP Top 10 is 60 weeks from 1961-65. With its loss to UCLA in 2010, Texas had a streak of 33 consecutive weeks ranked in the Top 10 broken. In addition, prior to the poll on Sept. 12, 2010, the Horns had been ranked in the AP Top 5 for 30 consecutive weeks, which was the longest active streak in the nation and is the longest streak in the Mack Brown era, bettering a 19-week streak from 2005-06.

BCS RANKINGS:

Following the loss to Iowa State in 2010, Texas had its streak of 56 consecutive weeks in the BCS rankings snapped, which had been the longest active streak in the nation. The Horns still lead the nation with 86 all-time appearances.

have had against ranked foes during the Mack Brown era. *In Brown's 14 years in Austin, UT is 34-22 (.607) versus Top 25 opponents. That compares to a 16-34-2 (32.7%) mark in the 13 years before Brown arrived.* In fact, the Longhorns have posted a winning record against ranked opponents in nine of the last 10 seasons as compared to just two seasons in the 13 prior to Brown's arrival.

CONFERENCE COMPETITION:

Mack Brown, who has guided the Horns to the 2005 and 2009 Big 12 Championships and has won or shared the Big 12 South Division Championship six times, is 83-22 (.790) in 14 seasons of Big 12 play. That is the best league record over that span, bettering Oklahoma (82-23/.781), Nebraska (65-39) and Texas Tech (61-44). UT has won 52 of its last 65 games (.800) against Big 12 foes. The Horns had tied the school record by winning 21 straight conference games from 2004-06 before the streak was snapped at Kansas State in 2006. The record of 21 straight conference victories was set from 1968-71 when Texas was competing in the Southwest Conference. The 21-straight Big 12 victories also marked the longest streak in league history. At 91-30 (.752), Texas has the top intraconference record since the Big 12 formed in 1996.

UT'S BIG 12 SUCCESS AT HOME:

Texas is 39-7 (.848) at Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium/Jamail Field versus league opponents during the Mack Brown era. The 39 home victories are the second most by any team in the conference over the last 14 years. In addition, the Horns set the league record with a 26-game home winning streak over Big 12 opponents, which was snapped in 2006. Prior to 2006, the last time UT had lost a home game against a league foe was 1999 (35-17 to No. 13 Kansas State)

BIG 12 ROAD SUCCESS: Texas has won 34 of its last 39 (.872) true Big 12 road games (not including neutral-site games), including a league-record 13 consecutive conference road wins from 2002-06. The Horns are 38-7 (.844) in league road contests under Mack Brown. Highlighting the Horns' road record under Brown are victories at Nebraska (1998) to end the Huskers' nation-best 47-game home winning streak, another win that snapped a Nebraska 26-game home winning streak (2002) and a victory to break Oklahoma State's 10-game winning streak (2003).

JAMAIL FIELD ADVANTAGE:

During Mack Brown's 14-year tenure, Texas has won 70 of its 81 games (.864) at Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium/Jamail Field. The Horns' .827 home winning percentage (43-9) since 2003 ranks sixth nationally. That is a dramatic improvement from the Horns' 45-23-1 record (.659) in the 13 seasons prior to Brown's arrival. Under Brown, the Horns have outscored their opponents by an average of 40-17 (3,243-1,371) and outgained them by an average of 451.0 yards to 282.0 (36,533-22,845) at home.

JAMAIL FIELD STREAKS:

The Horns have posted three of the six-longest home winning streaks in school history during the Mack Brown era. The Horns won 20 in a row at home from 1999-2003 (third-longest in school history). Then, from 2003-06, Texas won 16-straight home games, which is tied for the fourth-best string. UT had another 16-game string from 2007-10. The longest streak in school history is a 41-game streak from 1968-76. Texas' 26-game home intraconference winning streak from 1999-2006 is the second-longest in Big 12 history.

DKR'S RENOVATIONS: As Texas football proceeds through the 21st century, Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium continues to evolve as a state-of-the-art facility at the forefront of college football. Following the 2008 season, Texas installed FieldTurf as its playing surface and permanent bleachers were added to the south end of the stadium. Combined with the previous year's north end zone project, DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium now has a stadium capacity of 100,119, which is the fifth-largest college stadium in the country and the largest college stadium in the southwest. The north end zone expansion project that was completed prior to the 2008 season featured an upper deck, club seating, an academic center and a war memorial plaza. The expansion added approximately 2,108 club seats and 47 suites. The lower deck of the north end zone was completed for the 2007 season. Another major upgrade was made prior to 2007, when a new video board was installed at the south end of the stadium. At the time, the scoreboard was the nation's largest high-definition video display board thanks to DAKtronics. The \$8-million Prostar Video Board is 55 feet high by 134 feet wide. In addition, the interior of the Moncrief-Neuhaus Athletics Complex, most notably the players' lounge, is consistently being upgraded. Prior to 2009, a new academic center was constructed. It is approximately three times the size of the old one at Moncrief-Neuhaus. It features writing, math and computer labs, numerous tutoring areas, a multimedia classroom and academic staff office space. In summer of 2011, the Longhorns locker room was renovated with completion in early August. It is all part of a \$176.5 million renovation project at the stadium.

"FAN"-TASTIC: Texas has been one of the best-attended programs in the nation over the past 10 years. The Horns, who have played in front of a sellout crowd in 67 of their last 68 home games, have attracted 49 of the top 50 crowds in UT history since Mack Brown took over in 1998. In addition, the top 25 home crowds at Texas have come since '06. Texas' school-record season-ticket sales of 84,071 in 2010 are more than double the 39,743 sold in 1997, the UT record when Brown arrived. With the completion of the stadium expansion project, the Horns opened 2009 against ULM by hosting 101,096 fans. They upped the single-game attendance record to 101,297 during the Texas Tech game. Then, against Kansas, UT bettered the record with a showing of 101,357 fans. The 2010 season opened with the second-largest crowd in school history with 101,339, then Texas once again upped the single-game attendance record hosting a crowd of 101,437 against UCLA on Sept. 24. The 2011 crowds continued to expand as Texas opened the season in front of a record 101,624 fans, which is the largest crowd to see a college sporting event in the Southwest. UT's previous single-game attendance record of 98,621 was established when it hosted Texas A&M on Thanksgiving night in 2008. Texas also set a total-attendance record in 2009 after playing in front of 1,163,845 fans, breaking the 2008 mark of 1,066,158. Its home season-attendance record came in 2010 with a total of 704,580, which bettered the Horns' previous season best of 686,324, set in 2009. In addition, Texas has attracted record crowds in 10 of its road games over the past six seasons, at Oklahoma State (58,516, 2009), vs. Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl (96,009, 2009-10 and 92,182, 2008), at Texas Tech (60,454, 2010, 56,333, 2008 and 56,158, 2006), at UTEP (53,415, 2008), at Texas A&M (88,253, 2007) and at Nebraska (85,187, 2006).

ROAD WARRIORS: Texas is 67-23 (.744) away from home (road and neutral sites) over the last 14 years compared to a 43-43-2 (.500) record in the 14 years prior to Mack Brown's arrival in 1998. ***The Horns' 64-20 (.762) mark in road and neutral-site games since 1999 is the nation's best record over that span.*** Texas is 51-10 (.836) on the road (not including neutral-site games) and 43-6 (.877) versus unranked road foes during the Mack Brown era. Of the 10 true-road-game losses in Brown's 14-year tenure, two came in his first

three games at UT. Prior to Brown's arrival, UT posted just five winning road records in the 14 seasons leading up to 1998. All totalled during that time, UT was just 33-35 (.485) in true road games. The Longhorns have won 46 of their last 51 true road games (.902). Four of the five losses during that stretch were a group of shootouts, 42-38 at Texas Tech in 2002, 45-42 at Kansas State in 2006, 38-30 at Texas A&M in 2007 and 39-33 at No. 6 Texas Tech in 2008. UT's loss at KSU in 2006 snapped a school-record streak of 17 consecutive road wins. The 17-straight road wins eclipsed the previous record of 13 set from 1981-84. UT also won 12 consecutive road games from 2000-02. In addition, UT is currently on a streak of 12 consecutive non-conference road wins, which is a school record, bettering the previous streak of seven from 1956-63.

LONGHORNS IN THE NFL: Texas is not only one of the best at the collegiate level, but since Mack Brown's arrival, it has become one of the premier sources of talent for the NFL as well. Currently, Texas has 47 players on NFL rosters, which is the most nationally. Of the 47 Longhorns, 36 have started games during their NFL careers, including 29 who started as rookies. Among that group of 47, nine have earned a spot in a Pro Bowl and eight have participated in a Super Bowl with five coming away as Super Bowl Champions. The group also represents a wide array of positions with at least three NFL Longhorns in each position group except for special teams positions. The defensive backs (10), defensive line (9) and offensive line (7) lead the way and are all in the Top Five in the nation. In addition, Texas leads the Big 12 in Top 10 picks, Top 30 picks, Top 100 picks and Top 150 picks in the NFL Draft over the last 10 years. UT also has the most Top Five and second-most Top 10 picks in the NFL Draft since 1999. The Horns' eight Top 10 picks are one behind USC and their six Top Five picks lead LSU, which has four.

HORNS' FINISHING TOUCH: One of the mantras of the program under Mack Brown is "finish," and the Horns have done that since Brown arrived. Over Brown's 14-year tenure, UT has gone 28-5 (.848) in games decided by four points or less and 20-4 (.833) in games decided by three points or less. **The Longhorns' have won 17 of their last 18 (.944) games decided by three points or less.** The only loss came in a shootout at Kansas State, 45-42, in 2006, when Colt McCoy was sidelined by injury after the opening drive. The success under Brown is an improvement from the 12 years prior to his arrival when UT went 18-15-2 (.543) in games decided by four points or less and 16-11-2 (.586) in games decided by three points or less.

COMEBACKS UNDER MACK BROWN: *During Mack Brown's 14 seasons at Texas, the Horns have registered 25 second-half comebacks, including 14 fourth-quarter comebacks.* UT has recorded the six largest comebacks in school history during the Mack Brown era.

vs. BYU (2011): The Longhorns trailed 13-3 at the half and 16-10 entering the fourth quarter but two rushing TDs in the second half gave Texas a 17-16 win. The game-winning score by Cody Johnson came with 8:46 remaining in the game on a four-yard TD run that capped an eight-play, 52-yard drive.

vs. NO. 21/20 NEBRASKA (2009): Texas held the lead against Nebraska for much of the second-half, but a Nebraska field goal with 1:44 left gave the Cornhuskers a 12-10 lead. The Horns quickly moved down the field on the ensuing possession, setting up a Hunter Lawrence 46-yard field goal as time expired, giving UT a 13-12 victory and the 2009 Big 12 Championship.

vs. NO. 20/18 OKLAHOMA (2009): The Horns trailed 6-3 at halftime but scored 10 points on their first two drives of the second half to take a 13-6 lead. The Sooners came back with a TD to make it 13-13, but UT answered with a field goal early in the fourth quarter to take a 16-13 lead, which would end up being the final score. After giving up the TD to OU with 4:39 left in the third quarter, the Horns' defense didn't allow the Sooners into Texas territory for the rest of the game, allowing just 35 yards on 17 plays (2.1 ypp) and intercepting two passes.

vs. NO. 10 OHIO STATE (2008): Texas trailed 6-3 at the half before taking a 17-6 lead entering the fourth quarter. But, the

Buckeyes ran off 15 straight points to take a 21-17 lead with just 2:05 remaining. From there, Colt McCoy led an 11-play, 78-yard drive that culminated with a 26-yard TD pass to Quan Cosby with 16 seconds left to give UT the 24-21 victory.

vs. NO. 1 OKLAHOMA (2008): The Horns erased two 11-point deficits in the first half and trailed by one, 21-20, at halftime. OU went up 28-20 before Texas scored 10 straight to take a 30-28 lead late in the third quarter. OU answered with a TD early in the fourth to make it 35-30, but UT scored the game's final 15 points over the last 7:37 to win, 45-35. In total, Texas went on a 25-7 run to seal the victory.

at OKLAHOMA STATE (2007): Texas erased two fourth-quarter deficits and a second-half deficit, including the largest fourth-quarter comeback in school history against Oklahoma State. The Horns trailed 35-14 entering the final stanza before scoring 24 unanswered points to win, 38-35.

NEBRASKA (2007): Texas trailed Nebraska, 17-9, entering the fourth quarter before running off 19 straight points to win, 28-25. After falling behind 17-3 early in the third quarter, Texas produced 336 total yards and 25 points in the second half to help seal the victory.

at TEXAS TECH (2006): After trailing Texas Tech, 21-0, in the first quarter, the Horns closed the gap to 31-21 at halftime and 31-28 entering the fourth quarter, before going on to win 35-31.

Horns trailed the Buckeyes, 22-16, entering the final quarter, but Vince Young connected with Limas Sweed for a 24-yard TD with 2:37 remaining to give Texas a 23-22 lead. A late safety gave the Horns a 25-22 victory.

vs. NO. 1 USC (2005): The Longhorns trailed 38-26 with 6:42 remaining in the game before Vince Young led two TD drives, including his game-winning eight-yard TD run with just 19 seconds left, to secure the win and the National Championship.

Prior to 2005: The Horns notched four second-half comebacks and a fourth-quarter comeback in 2004, including a 28-point comeback against Oklahoma State, the largest in school history. UT also registered a halftime comeback in '02, a fourth-quarter comeback in '01, two halftime comebacks in 1999 and two fourth-quarter comebacks in '98.

STRONG SECOND HALVES: In its four games this season, Texas has outscored its opponents in the second half, 59-30, including a 21-3 margin against Rice, 14-3 against BYU, and 21-10 at UCLA. The Longhorns were outscored 14-3 in the second half at Iowa State but held a 34-0 advantage at halftime and held the Cyclones scoreless for the first three quarters. They have also outgained their opponents 922 yards to 540 yards with a 491 to 183 edge in rushing and a 431 to 339 yard margin in passing.

OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION: In 14 seasons under Mack Brown, UT's offense has produced 11 of the top 12 passing seasons, 11 of the top 13 total yardage campaigns and the top nine scoring years in school history. The Horns have also averaged at least 200 yards both rushing and passing in four of the 13 completed seasons. During his tenure, the Longhorns have registered 172 school records, forty 50-point games and five of the top seven total offense games on school record. In addition, UT has produced forty-seven 500-yard total offense performances (there are only 70 of them in the 119 years of Texas football) and has recorded 10 of the school's twenty 600-yard total offense games. The Horns' balanced attack has produced at least 400 yards of offense in 85 of its last 133 games (63.9%) and has registered 200 yards both passing and rushing 50 times. Texas has scored at least 25 points in 69 of its last 89 games (77.5%). That includes a streak of at

least 28 points in a UT-best 19 consecutive games from 2007-08, bettering the previous mark of 12 straight (2005-06). Texas also posted an 11-game streak from 2000-01. Prior to Brown's arrival, the longest streak of scoring at least 28 points was seven games.

2011: Through four games in 2011, Texas ranks 25th in rushing offense (206.0 ypg), 46th in total offense (420.75 ypg) and 37th in scoring offense (34.25 ppg). The Longhorns posted 506 total yards in the season-opening game against Rice to mark the 47th 500-yard total offense performance under head coach Mack Brown. The Horns also recorded 229 yards rushing and 227 yards passing for the 49th 200-plus rushing and passing output in Texas history. Three receivers recorded 50 or more yards led by sophomore WR Mike Davis' career-high 115 yards. The Longhorns followed with 289 yards against BYU, including 166 on the ground. At UCLA,

Texas posted its second 200/200 game of the season with 284 yards rushing (5.7 ypc) and 204 yards passing. Five players rushed for over 20 yards, led by Malcolm Brown with 110 yards and Fozzy Whittaker with 63. The offense produced seven touchdowns, including a balanced four rushing and three passing. In the Big 12 opener at Iowa State, UT recorded 400 yards of total offense with two QBs, David Ash and Case McCoy, throwing for over 100 yards and WR Jaxon Shipley posting 141 receiving yards.

2010: Texas averaged 23.8 ppg and 382.5 total yards per game in 12 games. The Horns posted a season-high 522 total yards, including a balanced 263 yards passing and 259 yards rushing (4.5 ypc),

against Florida Atlantic prior to recording 359 yards of total offense, including 140 yards rushing against Texas A&M, which entered the game as the nation's 15th-ranked rushing defense. They registered 358 total yards against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State, including 142 yards rushing and 216 yards passing. They recorded 412 total yards at Kansas State with 272 yards passing and 140 yards rushing. Against No. 25/24 Baylor, they totaled 428 total yards with 257 yards passing and 171 yards rushing. The offense tallied 440 yards of total offense against Iowa State, including a season-high 344 yards passing, and four receivers caught at least five passes. They registered 209 yards rushing against a No. 5/4 Nebraska defense that had ranked 12th in the nation in total defense entering the game. It was the first time the Huskers surrendered over 200 yards rushing in a game since allowing 216 to Baylor on Oct. 25, 2008, a total of 24 games. The offense recorded 373 yards against No. 8 Oklahoma, including 266 passing and 107 rushing. They also tallied 349 yards against UCLA, including 264 yards passing, along with 320 total yards at Texas Tech. Against Wyoming, the Horns averaged 5.8 yards on its 29 carries for a total of 167 rushing yards in addition to 222 passing yards. The Horns opened the 2010 season with 369 total yards at Rice, including 197 yards rushing on 46 carries (4.3 ypc).

2009: Texas averaged 39.3 points per game (third NCAA), 421.2 total yards (29th NCAA), 273.6 passing yards (22nd NCAA) and 147.6 yards rushing. UT posted at least 400 yards of total offense in 8-of-14 games, scored on 44.6 percent of its possessions (82-of-184/58 TDs/24 FGs) and went 54-of-57 in the red zone (third NCAA), including 40 TDs. The Horns also moved the chains, averaging 23.6 first downs per game, which ranked 10th nationally, while converting 45.2 percent (95-of-210) of their third-down opportunities, which ranked 20th nationally.

2008: Texas averaged 42.4 points per game (fifth NCAA), 475.8 total yards (ninth NCAA), 308.3 passing yards (seventh NCAA) and 167.5 rushing yards (41st NCAA). UT posted at least 400 yards of total offense in 12 of its 13 games, at least 500 yards in five games and posted a 600-yard game against Rice. Overall, Texas' 4,008 passing yards set a school

record by almost 500 yards, while its 551 points and 6,185 total yards rank second on UT's single-season list. Texas ranked third nationally on third down, converting 95-of-173 (54.9%), and 16th in red zone offense after converting 61-of-68 chances (90.0%, 52 TDs/nine FGs).

2007: The Texas offense finished the 2007 campaign as one of only 10 teams nationally to average 200 yards passing and 200 yards rushing. The Horns posted 255.4 yards passing (39th NCAA), 207.5 yards rushing (17th NCAA), 462.9 total yards (13th NCAA) and 37.2 points per game (14th NCAA). UT produced at least 400 yards of total offense in nine games and at least 500 yards in five, while scoring at least 30 points in nine of the 13 games. UT eclipsed the 200 yards rushing on seven occasions and reached at least 300 yards rushing in three of its last five games.

2006: Texas finished the 2006 season ranked sixth nationally in scoring offense (35.9 ppg), ninth in passing efficiency (155.9 rating) and 22nd in total offense (391.5 ypg). The Horns registered at least 400 yards in seven of the 13 games and scored at least 35 points in eight contests.

2005: UT led the nation in scoring offense (50.2 ppg), ranked second in rushing offense (274.9 ypg) and finished third in total offense (512.1 ypg). The Horns produced at least 600 yards of offense three times in 2005, which was a first in UT history. Texas also came close to having three more 600-yard games with 591 against La.-Lafayette, 585 at Missouri and 556 in the Rose Bowl versus No. 1 USC. UT's 600-yard games came in three consecutive contests against Oklahoma State (606), Baylor (645) and Kansas (617). Texas rushed for at least 300 yards six times in 2005, matching 2004's total for the most by a Texas team since 1977. UT averaged a balanced 274.9 rushing yards and 237.2 passing yards in 2005, marking just the fifth time in school history the Horns averaged better than 200 yards both rushing and passing.

Prior to 2005: UT ranked second in the nation in rushing (299.2 ypg), seventh in total offense (464.4 ypg) and 12th in scor-

ing (35.3 ppg) in 2004. The Horns posted at least 600 yards of offense twice. They recorded 673 yards of offense (third-most in UT history) versus North Texas and 600 total yards against No. 19 Oklahoma State. In 2003, Texas averaged 232.5 rushing yards (eighth NCAA) and 206.6 passing yards, which was the fourth time in school history UT averaged better than 200 yards for each. Texas also averaged 439.2 yards of offense (20th NCAA) while averaging 41.0 points per game (sixth NCAA) in 2003. That came one year after UT averaged 250.1 passing yards and 33.8 points per game (16th NCAA) in 2002. In 2001, the Horns' led the Big 12 in scoring (39.2 ppg/sixth NCAA) and pass efficiency (136.1 rating/27th NCAA). Brown's first UT squad produced a school-best 692 yards against Rice in 1998 and averaged a balanced 266.5 yards passing per game and 204.2 yards rushing per game.

GROUNDING IT OUT: Texas is taking great pride in its physical running attack this season and nothing has illustrated that better than the efforts in grinding out the game in the fourth quarter this year. Texas outrushed UCLA, 84-1, in the fourth quarter and has rushed for 270 yards to their opponents 61 in the fourth quarter this season.

GETTING INVOLVED EARLY: Texas had at least 20 players take offensive snaps in the first quarter in each of the last two games with 23 seeing action at UCLA and

21 at Iowa State. Overall 55 players played in the opening frame of action in each of the last two contests.

RICE PRODUCTION INCREASE:

Even though the Longhorns finished their game against Rice with the same number of points as last year, the offensive improvement from last season to this season was evident. Texas finished with 506 total yards this season (6.7 ypp) compared to 369 total yards last season (5.3 ypp). UT also posted 277 passing yards this season to 172 yards in 2010, along with 229 rushing yards to 197 a year ago.

SCORING SPREE:

Texas averaged 39.0 points per game in the last decade (2000-09), which ranked second nationally and first among BCS conference schools. The Horns averaged at least 35 ppg in nine of the 10 seasons, including three seasons of at least 40 ppg. In 2005, UT set a then-NCAA record with 652 total points and a school record by averaging 50.2 ppg. During the Mack Brown era, Texas has averaged at least 34 ppg in each of the 13 completed seasons. In contrast, Texas averaged at least 30 ppg only 12 times in the 45 seasons prior to Brown's arrival.

RECORD-BREAKING YEAR:

In 2005, Texas not only set records, it shattered them, in several team offensive categories. The Longhorns set an NCAA record for points scored in a season with 652. The previous high was 624 by Nebraska in 1983, and the previous UT

record was 533 in 2003. The team also set school marks with 50.2 points per game (41.4, 1969), 6,657 total yards (5,709, 2003), 512.1 yards per game (472.1, 1969) and 5.91 yards per carry (5.84, 2004). UT became one of only four teams in NCAA history to average 50 or more points and 500 or more yards per game for a season, and the first to do it since 1995. Texas scored at least 40 points in each of its last 11 games and 12-of-13 contests on the season. In 2005, only one other team in the nation (USC) scored 40 points in more than nine games. Texas scored at least 50 points in a game seven times in 2005. UT was the only school in the nation besides USC to accomplish that (versus NCAA Div. I-A). That is the most 50-point games the Horns have ever had in a season, surpassing the previous best of four set in 2003. As for 60-point games, Texas registered at least 60 points four times, which was also a UT first.

PRODUCTIVE PERFORMERS:

Since Mack Brown took over in 1998, Texas has produced its only 2,000-yard rusher (2,124, Ricky Williams, 1998), 1,000-yard receivers (1,292, Jordan Shipley, 2009/1,188, Kwame Cavil, 1999/1,142, Roy Williams, 2002/1,123, Quan Cosby, 2008/1,087, Wane McGarity, 1998/1,079, Roy Williams, 2003/1,060, Jordan Shipley, 2008), 3,000-yard passers (3,859, Colt McCoy, 2008/3,357, Major Applewhite, 1999/3,328, Colt McCoy, 2009/3,303 Colt McCoy, 2007/3,207, Chris Simms, 2002/3,036 Vince Young, 2005) and 1,000 yard rusher/passers (Vince Young, 2004 and '05) in a season in school history. UT has seen players record school single-season bests for rushing touchdowns (28, Ricky Williams, 1998), TD passes (32, Colt McCoy, 2008), TD receptions (12, Roy Williams,

2002/Limas Sweed, 2006), total TDs (45, Colt McCoy, 2008), passing yards (3,859, Colt McCoy, 2008), receptions (100, Kwame Cavil, 1999), receiving yards (1,292, Jordan Shipley, 2009), scoring (168, Ricky Williams, 1998) and total offense (4,420, Colt McCoy, 2008). In addition, Colt McCoy set the NCAA single-season completion percentage record at 76.7% (332-of-433) in 2008 and is one of just five QBs in NCAA history to post four seasons with at least 2,500 yards passing. Cedric Benson became the fifth player in NCAA history to rush for over 1,000 yards in four straight seasons and finished his career ranked sixth on the NCAA all-time rushing list (5,540 yards). Vince Young became the first player in UT history to rush (1,079 yards) and pass (1,849 yards) for more than 1,000 yards in the same season in 2004 and then repeated the feat in 2005 with 1,050 yards rushing and 3,036 yards passing. He became the first player in NCAA history to rush for 1,000 yards and pass for 3,000 yards in the same season. He came within two rushing yards of becoming just the third freshman QB in NCAA history to post 1,000 yards rushing and passing in a season in 2003. The Longhorns' freshman records for rushing yards (1,053, Cedric Benson, 2001), rushing TDs (12, Cedric Benson, 2001/12, Cody Johnson, 2008), total TDs (13, Cedric Benson, 2001), 100-yard rushing games (5, Cedric Benson, 2001), passing yards (2,570, Colt McCoy, 2006), total offense (2,740, Colt McCoy, 2006), receptions (47, Mike Davis, 2010), receiving yards (809, Roy Williams, 2000), TD catches (8, Roy Williams, 2000) and TD passes (29, Colt McCoy, 2006) have also been set in the Brown era. In addition, McCoy's 29 TD passes in 2006 tied the NCAA record for freshmen.

STINGY SCORING D: During the last four seasons at Texas, the Longhorn defense has held 36-of-42 opponents (85.7%) under their season scoring averages and 21 teams to 14 points or less, including Rice in the 2011 season opener, Iowa State in the first

Big 12 game of 2011 and three in 2010. In 2009, the Horns held 12-of-14 opponents under their scoring averages and didn't allow an offensive TD in four of 14 games. Overall, Texas gave up just 234 total points for a 16.7 points-per-game average (12th NCAA). In 2008, UT's defense allowed just 18.8 points per game (18th NCAA/first Big 12).

PRESSURE AT A PREMIUM: Texas is fourth in the nation in the nation in sacks with 455 since 1999, trailing only USC (462), Virginia Tech (458) and TCU (457). Since 2008, the pressure statistics have continued to go up. *During that span, Texas' 129 sacks rank first nationally and its 351 TFL also rank first nationally.* This year the Longhorns have five sacks and 23 tackles for loss in the first four games. Texas amassed 31 sacks and 93 TFL in 2010. In 2009, the Horns registered 46 sacks, 136 TFL, 143 pressures and 186 hits on opponents' quarterbacks. The 46 sacks were the second-most nationally and the 136 TFL led the country. In 2008, Texas led the nation in sacks with 47, which was also the most in the Mack Brown era, bettering the 43-sack total in 2000. It marked the first time in school history that Texas led the country in sacks. In addition, the 2008 defense produced 99 TFL, 170 pressures and 129 hits on opponents' quarterbacks.

DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE: After inheriting a program that ranked among the NCAA's bottom half in total defense for the

five seasons prior to his arrival, Mack Brown and his staff have reversed that trend. Texas has ranked among the nation's top 25 in total defense in 10 of the last 13 seasons and was sixth in 2010.

2011: Texas currently ranks 15th in the nation in total defense (289.0 ypg), 12th in scoring defense (14.75 ppg), fifth in pass efficiency defense (89.98), 16th in pass defense (178.25 ypg) and 34th in rushing defense (110.75 ypg). At Iowa State, the Longhorns held the Cyclones to more than 15 points below its scoring average while limiting them to just 4-of-15 on third down conversions. At UCLA, Texas held the Bruins to 317 total yards, including 141 rushing yards to an offense that entered the game averaging 252.0 yards. Against BYU, the Longhorns allowed only 235 total yards, including only 43 on the ground. Only one player had double-figure yardage in rushing, which was 39 yards. The defense also limited Jake Heaps to 22-of-38 passing for 192 yards. In the season-opener against Rice, the Longhorns kept the Owls out of the end zone, marking the first time since the 2009 Big 12 Championship Game vs. Nebraska that Texas has held an opponent without a

TD. Rice was limited to just 94 passing yards and 224 yards of total offense.

2010: Texas finished the season ranked sixth in the nation in total defense (300.2 ypg), sixth in passing defense (161.6 ypg), and 44th in rushing defense (138.6 ypg), and forced 63 three-and-outs on 153 drives (**41.2 percent**). The Longhorns held a No. 17/18 Texas A&M offense that entered the game averaging 455.0 ypg to 366 yards, 164 of which came on three plays. They limited Florida Atlantic to 17 points on 298 yards, 105 of which came on two plays. They allowed 33 points to No. 12/11 Oklahoma State, however that was 13 points below the Cowboys' season scoring average. The defense gave up just 270 yards of total offense to Kansas State, including nine yards passing. They held a No. 25/24 Baylor team that entered the game ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (510.8 ypg) to 328 total yards, including 109 on the ground, 69 of which came on one play. Baylor also entered as the fifth-ranked passing offense (314.4 ypg) and was limited to 219 yards, 59 of which came on one play. Texas allowed 335 total yards to Iowa State, including just 136 passing yards. The defense limited a No. 5/4 Nebraska offense that entered the game ranked seventh in the nation in total offense (494.4 ypg) and second in rushing offense (337.6 ypg) to 202 total yards and 125 rushing, which includes 21 yards on 13 carries by Huskers QB Taylor Martinez, who entered the game as the nation's fourth-leading rusher (147.4 ypg). No. 8 Oklahoma recorded 360 total yards in the Red River Rivalry. The Longhorns allowed just 291 total yards to UCLA, including just 27 passing yards, and two of the Bruins scoring drives were under four yards following turnovers. At Texas Tech, the Horns limited the Red Raiders to just 144 total yards, including minus-14 rushing yards. The 144 total yards were the fewest Texas Tech has gained against Texas since 1982 (134) and the fewest overall since gaining 127 against Nebraska in 1997. Meanwhile the 158 passing yards were the fewest since 1999 (137) and the minus-14 rushing yards marked the fourth time the Longhorns have not allowed the Red Raiders to reach positive rushing yards since 2004. The 14 points were the fewest Texas Tech has scored in Lubbock in the series since 1984 (10) and the fewest overall in the series since 2001 (7). Texas also held Texas Tech to minus-four yards overall in the first quarter. The Longhorns held Wyoming to just seven points and 257 total yards, including

58 rushing yards (1.9 ypc). Texas allowed Rice just 17 points to open the 2010 season with seven coming on a tipped pass at the end of the first half and seven more with 24 seconds remaining with the game already decided. The Longhorns held the Owls to just 219 total yards, including zero yards in the third quarter.

2009: The Texas defense allowed 16.7 points (12th NCAA), 251.9 total yards (third NCAA), a 100.5 pass efficiency rating (10th NCAA) and 72.4 rushing yards per game (first NCAA). On 185 total drives, the Horns gave up 23 TDs and 15 FGs. Four of the field goals came after possession changes when the Horns gave up just 32 yards on 20 plays. The Horns held 9-of-14 opponents to 14 points or less, including eight of the last 11. **On 185 drives, the Horns' D forced 77 three-and-outs or better (41.6%)** and gave up two first downs or less on 133 of the 185 drives (71.9%). Overall, the Texas defense allowed just 3,527 total yards on 918 plays for a 3.8 yards-per-play average. The unit ranked first nationally in third-down defense, allowing only 53 conversions on 200 attempts (26.5%). In addition, the Horns forced 37 turnovers (25 INTs/12 fumbles), which tied for first nationally.

2008: The Texas defense led the Big 12 in scoring defense (18.8 ppg/18th NCAA), total defense (342.9 ypg/51st NCAA) and rushing defense (83.5 ypg/third NCAA) and was second in the conference in pass efficiency defense (124.2 rating). In addition, the Horns led the nation in sacks with 3.62 per game (47 total sacks) and posted at least four sacks in five of UT's 13 games. The unit gave up just 29 TDs, which tied for the 18th fewest nationally and were 12 fewer than any other Big 12 team. UT's opponents converted on only 64 of their 183 third-down attempts (35.0%) and the Horns allowed only 31 scores on 42 red-zone possessions (74.0%), which tied for 11th nationally, and gave up just 20 TDs (47.6%).

2007: Texas allowed 25.3 points, 371.2 total yards and 93.4 rushing yards per game (sixth NCAA) in 2007, while holding opponents to a 127.5 passer rating. UT held seven teams under 100 yards rushing, including three games of 10 yards or less. Texas held Rice to -11 yards rushing, which marked the fourth-best performance by the Longhorn D since 1990. The Horns also held five opponents to 14 points or fewer.

2006: Texas finished 2006 ranked third nationally against the run (61.2 ypg), 22nd in total defense (297.4 ypg) and 26th in scoring defense (18.3 ppg). The Horns only allowed two teams to rush for 100 yards and held seven opponents to 14 points or fewer. The 2006 UT defense produced the school's second-best effort since 1990 by holding North Texas to just 95 total yards. UT also held Rice to -12 yards rushing, which marked the fourth time since 1990 that UT held a team to negative yards rushing. In fact, seven of UT's top 22 performances against the rush since 1990 came during the 2006 campaign.

2005: The Longhorns ranked 10th nationally in total defense (302.9 ypg), eighth in scoring defense (16.4 ppg), eighth in passing defense (172.0 ypg) and 33rd in rushing defense (130.9 ypg). Texas only allowed opponents to reach 300 yards of total offense five times and held the remaining eight opponents to 267 yards or fewer. Statistically, UT's best defensive performance came against Oklahoma in the Red River Rivalry. The Sooners only managed 171 total yards and one TD. The Longhorns weren't far off that pace by allowing only 191 yards and one field goal to Colorado in the Big 12 Championship game.

Prior to 2005: Texas held its opponents to 320.1 yards (23rd NCAA), 17.9 points (18th NCAA) and 107.4 yards per game (16th NCAA). Texas ranked 25th nationally in total defense (329.8 ypg) and allowed just 21.1 points per game in 2003, while holding its opponents to 307.7 yards (16th NCAA) and 16.3 points per game (eighth NCAA) in 2002. UT was one of only two teams to post three shutouts against NCAA Division I-A opponents in 2002. The Longhorns defense went from ranking 85th nationally in total defense in 1997,

the year prior to Brown's arrival, to back-to-back top 10 finishes in total defense in 1999-2000 and captured an NCAA statistical title in total defense in 2001. UT's 236.2 yards per game allowed that season were the fewest it had allowed since 1983 (212.0 ypg). It marked the first time since '83 and only the third time in school history that UT led the nation in total defense. Texas also led the Big 12 in rushing (89.5 ypg/sixth NCAA), passing (146.7 ypg/third NCAA) and scoring defense (13.7 ppg/third NCAA) while establishing itself as one of only two defenses ranked among the nation's top 10 in every major defensive category in 2001.

FAST STARTS: Texas has not allowed a point in the first quarter in the last two games and have only allowed nine total first quarter points in the first four games this year with zero touchdowns allowed. UT has outscored its opponents 30-9 in the first 15 minutes of games. A large part of the success is do to forcing turnovers as the Longhorns have caused seven total turnovers in the first quarter this year, including three in each of the last two games. Texas had three interceptions in the first quarter at UCLA and followed with two fumble recoveries and an interception at Iowa State.

SCORELESS PERIODS: This season the Longhorns have held the opponents to zero points in seven of the 16 quarters (43.8 %). Last season UT held its opponents scoreless in 15 of the 48 quarters (31.3 %). At Iowa State, UT held the Cyclones scoreless for the first three quarters of action. It marked the second straight game they did not allow a point in the first quarter. It was also the first time they had shut out an opponent in the first half since leading

Baylor 40-0 at halftime in 2009. That is a streak of 21 games since the Longhorns did not allow a point in the opening 30 minutes of play. The 34-point differential for a first half at Iowa State was the most since that Baylor game. In each of the first three games and seven straight dating back to last season, Texas did not give up a single point in the fourth quarter.

SHUTDOWN QUARTERS: In the first quarters of Texas' games against UCLA (minus-six) and Texas Tech (minus-four) last season, the defense held the opposition to a combined minus-10 yards. That marked the fifth and sixth time the defense has held an opponent to zero or fewer yards in a quarter in the last three seasons. There were three times in 2010, including the third quarter of Texas' 34-17 win over Rice (0 yards). In 2009, it held UTEP to minus-seven in the first quarter and minus-one in the third. It then held Baylor to minus-20 in the second quarter. Although it wasn't a shutout, Texas held BYU to just 17 yards in the decisive fourth quarter of its 17-16 win in 2011.

AIR DEFENSE: Texas' pass defense has been ranked in the Top 10 in six of the last 11 seasons and is currently ranked 16th (178.25 ypg) in yardage and fifth in pass efficiency defense (89.98). The Horns finished the 2010 season ranked sixth (161.6 ypg). It has allowed opponents to complete 57.1 percent (2,656-of-4,651) of their passes for only 193.5 yards per game (28,062 in 145 games), while intercepting 168 passes (1.16 pg).

2011: The Longhorns rank 16th (178.25 ypg) in pass defense and fifth in pass efficiency defense (89.98) in 2011. At Iowa State, UT intercepted one pass and had

three sacks as Steele Jantz was 28-of-51 (.549) for 251 yards with one touchdown and the one interception. Iowa State did not complete a pass over 20 yards. At UCLA, the Longhorns allowed just 11-of-26 passing for 176 yards with three INTs and no TDs. The three INTs all came in the first quarter which was the first time since 2007 against Baylor (fourth quarter) that Texas had three interceptions in a quarter. Only one Bruin caught more than two passes. They limited BYU quarterback Jake Heaps to just 22-of-38 (.579) passing for 192 yards, including just 39 yards in the second half, while also intercepting him twice. No Cougar had more than three catches or more than 40 receiving yards in the game. Texas allowed just 94 passing yards on 15-of-30 attempts in the season-opening game against Rice. The Longhorns held the Owls to just 3.1 yards per attempt and 6.3 yards per completion while limiting them to just two plays over 10 yards, one for 15 and one for 14. No Owl had more than 36 yards receiving.

2010: Texas finished sixth in the nation in pass defense (161.6 ypg) in 12 games. The Longhorns held Texas A&M, which entered the game ranked 11th in the nation in passing offense at 295.7 ypg to just 128 yards on 14-of-30 (46.7%) attempts. They kept Florida Atlantic to 201 passing yards, 105 of which came on two plays. The defense limited Kansas State to just nine yards passing. They held a No. 25/24 Baylor team that entered the game as the fifth-ranked passing offense (314.4 ypg) to 219 yards, 59 of which came on one play. They allowed Iowa State to record just 136 yards passing on 11-of-23 attempts with an interception. They limited No. 5/4 Nebraska to just 77 yards on 8-of-21 attempts. Oklahoma entered the Red River Rivalry as the nation's 10th-ranked passing offense at 308.8 ypg and was held to 236 yards, including five receptions for 36 yards by Ryan Broyles, who entered the game leading the nation in receptions (10.25 pg) and ranking fourth in receiving yards per game (120.5). Against UCLA, the Longhorns allowed just 27 passing yards, which is the third time in the Mack Brown era the defense has allowed only 27 yards, which is tied for 13th in UT history. At Texas Tech, the Horns limited the Red Raiders to just 158 passing yards, which is the fewest the defense has allowed them since 1999 (137). Texas posted two INT and four sacks in Lubbock, while holding Tech to just 4.4 yards per attempt and 7.5 yards

per completion. The Longhorns allowed Wyoming just 199 passing yards and no TDs on 20-of-31 attempts with three sacks. Texas limited Rice to 131 passing yards on 12-of-18 attempts with one TD and one INT. Forty-seven of those yards and the TD came on a tipped pass at the end of the first half.

2009: Texas allowed just 179.6 passing yards per game (19th NCAA), a 55.4% completion rate and a 100.5 pass efficiency rating (10th NCAA). UT held 9-of-14 opponents to less than 200 yards passing, including six opponents to under 100 yards. The Longhorns intercepted 25 passes, which led the nation, and posted an INT in 12-of-14 games. They had at least two INTs in seven games, including two games with four INTs. *Over the last 11 games, plus the fourth quarter against Texas Tech, UT's opponents threw 332 passes and Texas intercepted 24 of them or one in every 14 pass attempts.*

2008: The Texas secondary had to replace three of its four starters from 2007 and it did so with a senior, a junior and four underclassmen, including two true freshmen. Overall, the Horns had eight members of its secondary see significant action. UT gave up 259.4 yards per game, but held opponents to a 124.2 passer rating, which ranked second in the Big 12. The Horns held five teams to 220 yards passing or less. In addition, on 69 attempts, the Horns' defense only allowed 13 conversions of third down and 10 or more (18.8%).

2007: UT allowed 277.8 yards passing per game, held opponents to a 127.5 passer rating and intercepted 17 passes on the season. Marcus Griffin led the team in tackles (99) and INTs (five), while Ryan Palmer (80 tackles, 14 PBU) and Brandon Foster (71 tackles, four INTs, 12 PBU) finished second and third on the team in tackles.

2006: The 2006 campaign saw Aaron Ross win the Thorpe Award as the nation's top DB. It marked the second consecutive season that a Longhorn won the award after Michael Huff did so in 2005. Ross' six INTs helped UT total 13 for the season, and he also finished second nationally with 25 passes defended. Michael Griffin led

the team in tackles for the second consecutive year and, along with Ross, earned All-America and first-team All-Big 12 honors.

2005: UT finished eighth nationally in pass defense (172.0 ypg). The Horns also finished fourth nationally in pass efficiency defense (96.7 rating) that year. Opponents averaged only 5.13 yards per pass attempt, which led the nation, and threw for only 10 TDs compared to UT's 11 INTs. In 13 games, Texas allowed only two teams, Texas Tech and USC, to throw for over 200 yards. Both of those teams finished in the top five nationally in passing offense.

Prior to 2005: The Horns intercepted 13 passes and ranked 31st nationally in pass efficiency defense (114.3 rating) in 2004. Texas allowed opponents to complete just 167-of-354 passes (47.2%/third NCAA) for 2,305 yards (177.3 ypg/ninth NCAA) and ranked 18th nationally in pass efficiency defense (106.5 rating) in 2003. UT's recent pass defense efforts continue a turnaround that started when Mack Brown took over the Longhorns' program in 1998. That year, UT was coming off a season that saw it rank 75th nationally in pass efficiency defense (132.7 rating). In just their third season (2000), UT led the nation in pass efficiency defense (88.3 rating). The Horns limited opponents to the second-lowest completion percentage in the nation (45.2%/171-of-378), 184.3 yards per game, 5.36 yards per pass attempt (second NCAA), while allowing just eight TD passes that season. The Horns put up comparable numbers in 2001, holding a schedule that featured several high-powered passing attacks to a Big 12-low 146.7 passing yards per game (third NCAA) and ranked fourth nationally in pass efficiency defense (88.0). Texas held its opponents

to a NCAA-low 4.77 yards per attempt and just six TDs (t-2nd NCAA) in 2001. In 2002, Texas allowed opponents to complete just 192-of-400 passes (48.0%) for 2,147 yards (165.2 ypg/eighth NCAA). UT also ranked seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense (96.1 rating). Texas' 22 interceptions were tied for the fourth-most nationally and second-most in UT history. The Horns ranked 92nd nationally in pass efficiency defense (138.7 rating) in '98 and improved to 12th in '99 (101.6 rating) before leading the nation in 2000.

TAKEAWAYS: The Texas defense has caused 11 turnovers in the four games this season with at least two in all four contests. They have tallied six interceptions and five fumble recoveries to lead to a plus-6 turnover margin for the season. The turnover margin ranks tied for seventh best nationally. The six interceptions are tied for 22nd most while the five fumble recoveries rank tied for 25th in the country. Last season the Longhorns had a minus-3 turnover margin after the first four games of the season. UT has either scored points or ended the game after 10 of the 11 forced turnovers this season. Eight caused turnovers have led to a combined 44 points for Texas (5 TD, 3 FG) in the four games while UT also ran out the clock following takeaways against Rice and BYU.

HAT TRICK OF PICKS: In the first quarter of this season's game at UCLA, Texas intercepted three passes, including one each from Adrian Phillips, Carrington Byndom and Kenny Vaccaro. It marked the first time since 2007 that the Longhorns picked off three passes in a quarter when they did it at Baylor. Safety Marcus Griffin had two, including a 91-yard TD return, and CB Deon Beasley had one.

FORCING TURNOVERS: Texas' defense has forced 370 turnovers during the Mack Brown era (171 games/2.16 per game), while only giving up 297 turnovers for a plus-73 turnover margin. So far, the Longhorns are plus-six in 2011, which is tied for seventh nationally. Overall, the Horns have averaged a plus-five turnover margin per season during Brown's tenure. They were plus-nine in the turnover margin in 2009, which ranked 15th nationally, having forced 37 turnovers (12 fumbles/25 INTs), while giving up 28 (12 fumbles/16 INTs). **UT's 37 forced turnovers tied for first nationally.** In 2008, Texas forced 16 turnovers (10 fumbles/six INTs), while giving up 14 (six fumbles/eight INTs). In 2007, Texas forced 27 turnovers (10 fumbles/17 INTs), while giving up 26 (seven fumbles/19 INTs). In 2006, UT forced 32 turnovers (19 fumbles/13 INTs), while only giving up 23 (14 fumbles/nine INTs), for a plus-nine margin (T-No. 13 NCAA). The 32 takeaways were tied for the sixth-most in the nation and the 19 fumble recoveries tied for the most nationally. In 2005, UT forced 27 turnovers (16 fumbles/11 INTs). Three of those 27 turnovers were returned or recovered for scores, and the 16 fumble recoveries ranked fourth nationally. The Horns finished the season with a plus-nine turnover margin. Texas had a plus-five turnover margin, forcing 23 turnovers (10 fumbles/13 INTs) and losing 18, in 2004. UT forced 29 turnovers (14 fumbles/15 INTs) in 2003. UT's attacking unit provided several big plays in forcing 35 turnovers (T-No. 12 NCAA) in '02. The Longhorns combined for 22 INTs (T-No. 4 NCAA) by eight different players and recovered 13 fumbles.

TURNING OVER THE TURNOVERS: The Texas defense is forcing turnovers and the Longhorns' turnover margin has taken a dramatic turn from 2010 to 2011. Last year, Texas was minus-12 in turnover margin, ranking 116th out of 120 FBS

teams, forcing just 18 turnovers in 12 games. This year, after having already forced 11 turnovers in four games, the Horns are plus-six in turnover margin, which is tied for seventh in the FBS.

GROUND PATROL: Mack Brown and his staff inherited a ground defense that had ranked no better than 64th nationally in the five seasons prior to their arrival. In 14 seasons at Texas, they have turned that around dramatically. The Horns have limited 67 of their last 130 opponents (51.5%) to fewer than 100 yards rushing and allowed just thirty-six 100-yard rushers in the last 157 games (22.9%). The Horns have been ranked in the top six in rush defense in four of the last six seasons, including a No. 1 national ranking in 2009 (72.4 ypg). During that span (69 games), UT has held opponents to just 90.1 yards per game (6,214 yards on 2,187 carries) and just 2.8 yards per carry. In addition, at home over the last six seasons (35 games), Texas has only allowed 12 teams to break the 100-yard plateau and has only allowed eight individual 100-yard rushers. In true road games over the last five seasons (22 games), Texas has allowed only 11 teams to reach 100 yards rushing and just four individual 100-yard rushers. Texas has held its opponent under 50 yards rushing 43 times during the Mack Brown era.

2011: The Longhorns currently rank 34th in the nation in rushing defense, giving up only 110.75 ypg. Iowa State averaged just 3.4 yards per carry with 38 rushes for 129 yards. The top rusher for the Cyclones had 64 yards on 11 attempts. At UCLA, the Bruins rushed for 141 yards, however that was 111 yards below their season average of 252.0 ypg entering the contest. RBs Johnathan Franklin and Derrick Coleman were both held well below their season averages with 58 and 47 yards, respectively. The defense held BYU to just 43 rushing yards on 23 attempts (1.9 ypc) with only one player gaining double-figure yardage, which was 39 yards by J.J. Di Luigi. The team total was minus-nine yards in the second quarter for a total of 15 yards in the first half, followed by just six yards in the decisive fourth quarter. Texas limited Rice to 130 yards rushing on 30 attempts for an average of 4.3 yards per carry and no TD.

2010: Texas ranked 44th in the nation in rushing defense (138.6 ypg). UT allowed just 88 yards rushing against Florida Atlantic. No. 25/24 Baylor rushed for 109 yards against the Longhorns, however 69 of that came on one play and the Bears had been averaging 196.5 ypg. The defense held a No. 5/4 Nebraska offense that entered

the game ranked second in rushing offense with 337.6 ypg to 125 yards rushing (63% below average), which includes 21 yards on 13 carries (1.6 ypc) by Huskers QB Taylor Martinez, who entered the game the nation's fourth-leading rusher (147.4 ypg) and led the nation with 10.8 yards per carry. The Longhorns held Texas Tech to minus-14 yards (-0.8 ypc), which was

the fourth time since 2004 Texas has not allowed Texas Tech to reach positive rushing yards. Against Wyoming, UT surrendered only 58 rushing yards, including minus-12 in the third quarter, with no Cowboy rushing for more than 30. The Longhorns opened the season allowing Rice to rush for just 88 yards on 42 attempts (2.1 ypc), including minus-six yards in the third quarter, with no player rushing for more than 47 yards.

2009: Texas allowed just 72.4 rushing yards per game to claim the No. 1 national ranking in rush defense. In total, the Horns allowed just 1,013 yards rushing, while tallying 579 yards in losses via tackles for loss and sacks, and just 2.2 yards per carry. The Horns only allowed four opponents to eclipse the 100-yard mark and forced two into negative rushing totals. The Horns held Texas Tech to minus-six yards rushing on 18 attempts. Tech gained just 51 yards and lost 57 on nine TFL. Then, the Texas defense held Oklahoma, which came into the game averaging 187.8 ypg, to minus-16 rushing yards, the lowest total by either team in the 104-game series.

2008: Texas gave up just 83.5 yards rushing per game (third NCAA/first Big 12) and allowed just eight rushing TDs, which tied for eighth nationally and was 11 fewer than the next best Big 12 team. Overall, Texas gave up just 1,086 rushing yards on 356 carries (3.1 ypc) and forced its opponents into 522 lost yards on sacks and TFL. The Horns allowed only five teams

to rush for over 100 yards and just three individual 100-yard rushers, while holding the other eight opponents to less than 50 yards rushing.

2007: Texas allowed just 93.4 yards per game to rank sixth nationally. The Horns held seven of their 13 opponents under 100 yards rushing and gave up just 2.9 yards per carry. Highlighting the season were games against No. 19 TCU (43 yards), Rice (-11 yards), Baylor (eight yards), Texas Tech (10 yards) and Arizona State (22 yards). All five games rank in UT's top 35 performances since 1990. In fact, the minus-11 yards by Rice were the fourth-fewest since 1990 and the fifth time UT has held an opponent to negative rushing yards in that span. All five occasions have come during the Mack Brown era.

2006: The Horns rush defense gave up just 61.2 yards per game in 2006 (third NCAA), turning in the best performance on school record since 1942 (57.5 ypg). They gave up only 795 yards rushing on 345 carries (2.3 ypc). UT allowed just two teams to rush for 100 yards and held six teams to 27 yards or less, including two games in which the opponent rushed for negative yards (Texas Tech, -13; Rice, -12). In addition, seven of UT's top 22 performances against the rush since 1990 came during the 2006 campaign.

2005: Texas allowed 130.9 ypg on the ground, 3.7 ypc and gave up only 15 rushing TDs, while holding nine of their 13 opponents to under 120 yards.

Prior to 2005: The Horns ranked 16th nationally in rushing defense

(107.4 ypg) in 2004, allowing just 60.0 yards per game over the final six contests. UT held six foes to 70 (or fewer) yards rushing that season. After inheriting a unit that ranked 104th nationally and allowed 241.5 yards per game in 1997, Brown and company guided the Horns to the nation's 17th-best run defense (105.7 ypg) in 1999 and the 12th-best ground defense (94.0 ypg) in 2000. UT's 94.0 yards allowed rushing per game in 2000 was, at the time, the fewest allowed by a Longhorns' squad since 1977 (91.1 ypg). UT followed that effort up in 2001 by allowing a Big 12-low 89.5 rushing ypg (sixth NCAA) and just 2.8 yards per carry.

NON-OFFENSIVE SCORES: Since 1999, UT has scored 77 TDs via returns, turnovers and blocked kicks. The 77 scores during that stretch rank second nationally behind only Virginia Tech (82). Texas received its first non-offensive score of 2011 at Iowa State when Mykkele Thompson blocked a punt and Josh Turner returned it 34 yards for a touchdown. It was the first blocked punt return for a touchdown since 2009 when Malcolm Williams recovered one in the end zone for a score at Missouri. **UT scored 11 non-offensive TDs in that 2009 season, which led the nation and is the most in UT history.** Prior to 2009, the most non-offensive TDs came in 2003, when the Horns posted nine. The 11 TDs came on 89 (ULM) and 91-yard (UTEP) kickoff returns by D.J. Monroe, a 95-yard kickoff return by Marquise Goodwin (Texas A&M), 46 (Texas Tech) and 74-yard (Colorado) punt returns by Jordan Shipley, 92 (Colorado) and 31-yard (Oklahoma State) INT returns by Earl Thomas, a 77-yard INT return by Curtis Brown (Oklahoma State), a 60-yard INT return by Eddie Jones (Baylor), a three-yard blocked punt return by Ben Wells

(Colorado) and a blocked punt recovery in the end zone by Malcolm Williams (Missouri). Texas posted five non-offensive TDs in 2008 behind two INT returns, a fumble return, a kickoff return and a punt return. In 2007, UT posted five non-offensive TDs on three INT returns, a fumble return and a kickoff return, which was UT's first since 2003. The Horns scored eight non-offensive TDs in 2006 with four coming off fumble recoveries, two from punt returns, one on an INT return and one on a blocked punt recovery in the end zone.

GUARDING THE END ZONE: Texas' defense has made it difficult for opponents to reach the end zone over the last 12 seasons. Since 2000, the Horns have allowed only 302 TDs in 145 games (2.1 TDs per game), which ranks fourth nationally. Miami has allowed the fewest TDs, giving up 268. Through four games in 2011, the Horns have only surrendered five TDs, two to Iowa State, two to UCLA, and one to BYU, after holding Rice out of the end zone. This season UT has not allowed a touchdown in the first quarter. The Longhorns allowed two TDs to Rice to open the 2010 season, however one came on a long tipped pass at the end of the first half and the other came with 24 seconds left in the game with the outcome decided. They then surrendered just one TD against Wyoming and one at Texas Tech. The 14 points were the fewest Texas Tech has scored in Lubbock in the series since 1984 (10) and the fewest overall in the series since 2001 (7). UCLA reached the end zone four times, however three of the drives were 50 yards or fewer with one drive of only four yards and two drives coming off turnovers in Texas territory. Oklahoma scored four TDs, however three of the four drives were kept alive by penalties. The defense held No. 5/4 Nebraska out of the end zone with the Huskers only score coming on a punt return. Iowa State scored four touchdowns, however two of them came on drives of 37 and 40 yards. The Longhorns allowed four TDs to No. 25/24 Baylor with one coming on a one-play drive and another on an 11-yard drive. Kansas State scored five TDs and one FG, however the defense

faced a short field in all but one of those, including scoring drives of 38, -1, 10 and 14 yards. Texas allowed four TDs to No. 12/11 Oklahoma State, however still held the Cowboys 13 points below their season scoring average. The defense gave up two TDs against Florida Atlantic and three against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. In 2009, the Horns' defense allowed just 23 TDs on 185 possessions (12.4%). UT's best season came in 2001, when the Horns' top-ranked unit gave up only 19 TDs. Texas has allowed 29 TDs or fewer in seven of the last 11 seasons. Conversely, Texas has scored at least 45 TDs in nine of the last 10 seasons, with a high of 81 scores in 2005.

SCORING DEFENSE: Texas' defense has been a scoring machine since 1999. During that time, the defense has accounted for 286 points and scored in 41 of the 159 games (25.8%). It posted four TDs and a safety in 2009 for 30 points. The Horns' defense has scored at least three TDs in 10 of the last 12 seasons, led by seven TDs scored in 2000. That defense tallied 46 points, which is the most over the 12-year stretch. The 2003 unit scored six TDs, while the 2006 unit scored five TDs.

SHORT DRIVES: The Texas defense has prevented its opponents from moving the chains on 36.3 percent of their drives over the last nine seasons (133 games). During that time, UT forced 636 three-and-outs or better in 1,754 possessions. So far in 2011, that number stands at 20-of-51 (.392), which includes 4-of-14 at Iowa State, 5-of-13 at UCLA and 7-of-12 against BYU, including all three possessions in the decisive fourth quarter. *In 2010, Texas posted 41.2 percent (63-of-153) and was one of only five teams nationally to average at least five three-and-outs per game (5.25). The Horns forced 7-of-13 at Rice, 5-of-11 against Wyoming, 9-of-13 at Texas Tech, 4-of-13 against Oklahoma, 7-of-11 at Nebraska, 8-of-14 against Iowa State, 3-of-11 against Baylor, 3-of-14 at Kansas State, 1-of-12 against Oklahoma State, 8-of-13 against Florida Atlantic and 6-of-16 against Texas A&M.* In 2009, the Horns forced 77 three-and-outs or better

5.5 three-and-outs or better per game. The Horns forced 44 three-and-outs or better on 152 possessions (.289) in 2008, averaging over three three-and-outs per game. In 2007, UT forced 52 three-and-outs or better on 168 possessions (.310). Texas forced 60 three-and-outs or better on 154 possessions (.390) in 2006. Previously, the Horns held foes to three-and-outs or better on 73-of-178 possessions (.438) in 2005, 46-of-153 possessions (.307) in 2004, 56-of-181 possessions (.309) in 2003, 73-of-176 possessions (.414) in 2002 and 73-of-165 possessions (.442) in 2001.

OPENING POSSESSION: In three of the four games this season, the Texas defense has held its opponent to three plays or less on the opening drive. Iowa State went three-and-out with a total of negative four yards. Also this season the Longhorns stopped Rice to three-and-out and negative nine yards on the opening drive and then at UCLA the Longhorns intercepted a pass on the third play from scrimmage.

QB TRIO: So far in 2011, the Longhorns have used a trio of quarterbacks in their 4-0 start. Against Rice, junior Garrett Gilbert went 13-of-23 for 239 yards and one TD with no INTs. Then against BYU, Gilbert started the game, however sophomore Case McCoy (7-of-8, 57 yards) and true freshman David Ash (2-3, 35 yards) entered the game and combined to complete 9-of-11 passes for 92 yards with Ash also rushing for 36 yards on nine carries and making one reception for 23 yards that came on

the final possession to help seal the game. At UCLA, McCoy made the first start of his career and completed 12-of-15 passes for 168 yards and two TDs with no INTs. Ash also completed 3-of-3 passes for 31 yards. In the Iowa State game, both McCoy and Ash threw for over 100 yards passing, combining for 255 yards on 14-of-24 passing and two touchdowns.

ASH THROWS FIRST TD PASSES:

True freshman QB David Ash threw the first two touchdown passes of his college career at Iowa State. The first came on a 48-yard scoring toss to Mike Davis and the second on a 40-yard touchdown throw to Jaxon Shipley off a reverse pass. Ash is the first true freshman quarterback at Texas to throw a touchdown pass since Garrett Gilbert threw two in the 2009 BCS National Championship game against Alabama. Ash is just the 10th true freshman quarterback in Texas history to throw a touchdown pass. The record for most touchdown passes by a true freshman quarterback is three by Ted Costanzo in 1975. Also of note, Shipley threw a touchdown pass earlier this season as a true freshman wide receiver.

GILBERT TO MISS REMAINDER OF 2011:

Longhorn junior QB Garrett Gilbert underwent successful surgery on his right throwing shoulder on Sept. 20 and will be out for the remainder of the 2011 season, but he is expected to make a full recovery. During his three seasons at Texas, Gilbert has completed 305-of-538 passes for 3,301 yards (No. 9 on UT's career list) with 13 TD and 23 INT and has rushed 118 times for 416 yards and six TDs in 24 games (14 starts). Gilbert opened the 2011 season going 13-of-23 for 239 yards and one TD against Rice with no INT. During 2010, his first season as a starter, Gilbert completed 260-of-441 passes (59.0%) for 2,744 yards

(No. 7 on the UT single-season list) with 10 TDs and 17 INTs. His 260 completions rank fifth on the UT single-season list and his 441 attempts rank third. He also rushed for 380 yards and five TDs on 100 carries for a total of 3,124 yards (No. 6 on the UT single-season list). Gilbert completed 20-of-37 passes for 219 yards and one TD, while rushing for another TD against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. He completed 15-of-21 passes, including TD passes of 63 and 47 yards for 263 yards, and rushed for 60 yards on 14 carries against Florida Atlantic. He completed 19-of-32 passes for 202 yards and one TD, while rushing for 55 yards on 12 carries against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. At Kansas State, he rushed for a career high 93 yards and completed 32-of-59 passes for 272 yards and one TD with five INT. The 59 attempts were a UT record. He completed 22-of-39 passes for 231 yards and one INT against No. 25/24 Baylor, while rushing for 79 yards and one TD on eight carries. Against Iowa State, he completed 34-of-57 passes for 344 yards with two TDs and three INTs. He recorded 71 yards and two TDs on 11 carries (6.5 ypc) while completing 4-of-16 passes for 62 yards at No. 5/4 Nebraska. In the Red River Rivalry against No. 8 Oklahoma, he went 27-of-41 for 266 yards with one INT. He completed 30-of-45 passes for 264 yards and one TD with one INT, while rushing for 19 yards against UCLA. At Texas Tech, he completed 21-of-36 passes for 227 yards and two TDs with three INTs, all of which came on deflected passes. Against Wyoming, Gilbert connected on 22-of-35 attempts for 222 yards and a 45-yard TD. In his first career start at Rice, Gilbert completed 14-of-23 passes for 172 yards, while rushing twice for 11 yards, with no turnovers. He appeared in 10 games as a freshman and completed 30-of-66 passes for 310 yards and two TDs. He replaced an injured Colt McCoy after five plays in the BCS Championship game versus No. 1 Alabama and went 15-of-40 for 186 yards and two TDs, including 11-of-24 attempts for 162 yards and two TDs in the second half. His 44-yard TD pass near the end of the third quarter and 28-yard TD connection midway through the fourth, both to Jordan Shipley, brought the Horns within three points at 24-21 with 6:15 left to play. He completed 7-of-8 passes for 64 yards in leading UT on a nine-play, 65-yard TD drive that drew UT within a field goal. In the 2010 spring game, Gilbert completed

10-of-13 passes for 165 yards and three TDs (no INTs). He was the first Texan to ever win the Gatorade National Prep Player of the Year and was also tabbed Parade Player of the Year, EA Sports Mr. Football USA and USA Today's Offensive Player of the Year. He was 31-1, including a 30-game winning streak, in high school and led Lake Travis to back-to-back state titles his last two years.

GOODWIN RETURNS:

Junior WR Marquise Goodwin decided to return to football for the 2011 season and rejoined the team on Sept. 6. He saw his first action against BYU, making two receptions for 10 yards, while also returning three kickoffs for 74 yards, including a long of 40. That performance came just days after competing in the long jump halfway around the world in Korea. At UCLA, he rushed three times for 33 yards with one reception for five yards, while returning three kickoffs for 65 yards. Goodwin had previously chosen to redshirt the 2011 campaign to focus on track and field, including competing at the 2011 World Championships (where he finished 13th) and training for the 2012 Summer Olympics. Goodwin has posted 134 catches for 1,719 yards and 17 TDs over his three-year career, but made a name for himself as a track and field standout. Over two seasons as a Longhorn in that sport, Goodwin won the 2011 U.S. Outdoor Long Jump National Title (27-4), three Big 12 Long Jump Championships and the 2010 NCAA Outdoor Long Jump Championship (26-9). He is also a two-time World Junior Champion (long jump, 4x100m). In 2010, Goodwin had 31 receptions for 324 yards and one TD, including two catches for 31 yards and a TD against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. He produced a career-high 71 receiving yards on four catches against No. 25/24 Baylor. He set a career high with seven catches against Iowa State for 54 yards. Against No. 8 Oklahoma, he caught three passes for 32 yards after having six receptions for 62 yards against UCLA. He opened the 2010 football season with 65 all-purpose yards (50 receiving/15 rushing) at Rice. He made four catches for 25 yards at Texas Tech. **2009:** Goodwin saw the first action of his career against ULM and made three catches for 39 yards. He caught five passes for 36 yards against UTEP. Goodwin added a seven-yard reception against Colorado and blocked the first punt of his career. In his first Red River Rivalry, Goodwin posted

four receptions for 36 yards and his first career TD, a 14-yard reception on third down. He added four catches for 24 yards in the first start of his career at Missouri. Goodwin posted two catches for 34 yards against Kansas. He clinched the Texas A&M game with a 95-yard kickoff return for a TD after the Aggies cut the lead to three with seven minutes left, giving UT its final margin, 49-39. For the season, Goodwin posted 30 catches for 279 yards and a TD to go along with a 95-yard kickoff return TD and a blocked punt. The 30 catches rank third on UT's freshman list.

DAVIS DELIVERING: Sophomore WR Mike Davis, who is on the Biletnikoff Award Watch List, picked up this season where his standout freshman campaign left off as he recorded the third 100-yard receiving game of his career with a career-high 115 receiving yards in the 2011 season opener against Rice. He scored his first touchdown of the year at Iowa State on a 48-yard grab and would finish with three receptions for 72 yards in the win. At UCLA, he made three receptions for 77 yards. As a true freshman in 2010, he set the UT freshman single-season receptions record with 47, which was also second on the team in 2010. The 47 receptions passed B.J. Johnson's previous record of 41 set in 2000. He has also amassed 478 yards (No. 3 on UT freshman list) and two TDs. Davis caught two passes for 14 yards against both Texas A&M and Florida Atlantic. He had five receptions for 70 yards against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. At Kansas State, Davis set the UT freshman single-game record with 11 receptions, passing

Johnson's mark of nine against Baylor in 2000. He also recorded his second 100-yard receiving game, making him just the third UT freshman to have two, along with Johnson and Williams. Davis' other 100-yard game came when he caught seven passes for 104 yards, including a 45-yard TD, in his home debut against Wyoming, which made him the ninth UT freshman to record a 100-yard game. By doing so in his second overall game, he tied for second-fastest to have a 100-yard game. His seven receptions were also tied for second on the UT freshman single-game list at the time before he exceeded that with eight against Iowa State. With the Kansas State game, he now ranks first, third and tied for fourth on the single-game list. Following Wyoming, Davis went on to catch six passes for 45 yards and a TD at Texas Tech and added three catches for 34 yards against UCLA. He missed the game against No. 8 Oklahoma and was limited against No. 5/4 Nebraska with an injury prior to the eight receptions for 50 yards against the Cyclones. He caught three passes for 38 yards against No. 25/24 Baylor.

SHIPLEY WITH A FIRST: With his 36-yard TD reception in the third quarter against Rice, true freshman WR Jaxon Shipley became the first Longhorn rookie to catch a TD reception in a season-opener in program history. Shipley, the younger brother of UT's all-time receptions leader Jordan Shipley (248, 2006-09), finished the game with two receptions for 54 yards and rushed for 25 yards on three carries averaging 8.1 yards per carry. Against BYU, Shipley made three receptions for 39 yards, however two of them came on critical third downs. He also threw a 23-yard pass to David Ash for another late third-down conversion that helped put away the game in the fourth quarter. He then completed the second pass of his career at UCLA, and this time for a TD on a five-yard completion to D.J. Grant, while also making five receptions for 46 yards and rushing once for 15 yards. The prep All-American was a two-time first team all-state and three-time all-district performer at wide receiver for Brownwood High School. As a three-year starter, he tallied 203 receptions for 3,444 yards and 43 TDs while recording eight special teams TDs.

for a freshman at Iowa State, catching six passes for 141 yards and one touchdown. He recorded just the 13th 100-yard receiving game by a freshman at Texas. His 141 yards were the seventh most and fifth most by a true freshman. The six catches ranked tied for seventh most by a freshman and tied for sixth most by a true freshman. With 280 receiving yards in the first three games he is already approaching the top five for most freshman receiving yards in a season. He is now 36 yards away from tying Kwame Cavil (1997). The school record is 809 by Roy Williams in 2000. He also needs seven catches to tie Cavil and Limas Sweed for fifth most and is one touchdown shy of a tie for second on the freshman receiving touchdowns chart.

RUNNING BACK ATTACK: The Texas running back corps has combined for 719 yards on 141 carries and nine touchdowns in the first four games. The group consists of Joe Bergeron, Malcolm Brown, Cody Johnson, D.J. Monroe and Fozzy Whittaker. Brown, a true freshman, leads the team with 327 yards on 67 carries. Johnson and Whittaker are tied for the team lead with four rushing touchdowns each. Whittaker and Monroe join Brown over the 100-yard mark for the season, giving Texas three players with at least 100 rushing yards. Whittaker has 141 yards

on 28 carries while Monroe leads the way with 7.9 yards per attempt, tallying 118 yards on just 15 attempts. Last season, the trio of Tre' Newton, Cody Johnson and Fozzy Whittaker combined for 1,099 rushing yards and 22 rushing TDs on 256 carries. Johnson, who moved to fullback this year, emerged to lead the team in rushing with 592 yards, and both he and Whittaker had at least 80 carries.

Cody Johnson: Throughout his career at Texas, Cody Johnson has been a touchdown machine. His four rushing TDs this season give him 34 for his career and put him in seventh place on UT's career list for rushing TDs. He scored twice in the second half against BYU, including the game winner in the fourth quarter, and finished off the UCLA game with a fourth-quarter TD. **2010:** Johnson posted 134 carries for 592 yards and six TDs in 11 games in 2010. He set a career high with 124 rushing yards with one TD on 28 carries against Florida Atlantic and followed with 107 yards on 14 carries against No. 17/18 Texas A&M for the first back-to-back 100-yard games of his career. He rushed for 68 yards and one TD with two receptions for 14 yards against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. He registered a four-yard TD run at Kansas State after rushing for 39 yards on 10 carries against No. 25/24 Baylor. Johnson ran for 73 yards on 11 carries (6.6 ypc), including a season-long 24-yarder that helped the Longhorns run out the clock in a win at No. 5/4 Nebraska. Against No. 8 Oklahoma, he had a 33-yard reception and a five-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. He registered 35 yards on 17 carries at

Texas Tech after posting 46 yards on nine carries and two TDs against Wyoming. He opened the season rushing for 59 yards on 15 carries (3.9 ypc) with one reception for two yards at Rice. **2009:** Johnson rushed for 335 yards and 12 TDs on 87 carries (3.9 ypc), while catching seven passes for 42 yards. He opened the year with three rushing TDs against ULM and finished the game with 27 yards on 11 carries. He added another rushing TD against Texas Tech and posted an 18-yard TD run against UTEP. Johnson carried the ball five times for 31 yards against No. 20/18 Oklahoma and added 28 yards on seven carries at Missouri. Johnson notched 31 yards and two TDs on nine carries at No. 13/13 Oklahoma State. He added 44 yards and two TDs on 10 carries versus UCF. In his first start of the season at Baylor, Johnson posted his second career 100-yard game with 109 yards on 19 carries (5.7 ypc) and two TDs to go along with three catches for 19 yards. The 109 rushing yards and 128 total yards were both career highs at the time. He added a TD run against Kansas. **2008:** As a redshirt freshman in 2008, Johnson rushed 76 times for 338 yards and 12 TDs. His 12 TDs tied for first on UT's freshman list with Cedric Benson. Johnson opened 2008 with a streak of seven straight games with a TD, which was snapped against No. 7 Oklahoma State. The streak is a UT freshman record and is tied for fourth on UT's overall list. As UT's goal-line specialist, Johnson converted 10 of his 12 carries inside the five into TDs, including three against No. 1 Oklahoma. Johnson posted the first 100-yard game of his career against Texas A&M with 102 yards and two TDs on eight carries (12.8 ypc). **Career:** For his career, Johnson's carried the ball 312 times for 1,308 yards (No. 30 on the UT career list) and 34 TDs, which puts him seventh on the UT career rushing TDs list. **His 24 TDs through his freshman and sophomore seasons tied for second in school history with Cedric Benson, and trailed only Vince Young (25).**

JOHNSON AND GOAL: RB Cody Johnson has had five rushing attempts in four goal-to-go situations for the Longhorns this season and has produced a TD in all four situations. Against Rice, Johnson got the ball with the Horns at the 4-yard line and took it to the 1 on his first attempt before putting it in on the next. He then had TD rushes of one yard and four yards against BYU before taking it in from

seven yards out against UCLA. He's been almost as effective in third-down situations, converting 5-of-6 into first downs or touchdowns.

Fozzy Whittaker: In the 2011 season opener, Whittaker became the first Longhorn since 2008 to score both a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same game and the first since 2006 to do so in the same quarter. Overall, he accounted for 33 yards rushing on nine attempts and 55 yards receiving on four attempts. At UCLA, he again showed his versatility. As part of his eight carries for 64 yards and two TDs, Whittaker twice took direct snaps, including a 36-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. Whittaker tallied his fourth rushing touchdown of the season at Iowa State on a 16-yard rush and finished with 41 yards on seven carries. He is tied for the team lead with four rushing touchdowns in 2011. **2010:** Whittaker had 351 yards on 80 carries (4.4 ypc) with two TDs to go along with 34 receptions (No. 6 on the UT single-season receptions by a RB list) for 217 yards. He caught five passes for a career-high 59 yards and rushed 10 times for 35 yards against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. He missed most of the Oklahoma State game and all of the Florida Atlantic game with an injury, but at Kansas State, he rushed five times for 35 yards and caught four passes for 11 yards. He rushed for 28 yards on 11 carries and had one reception for 41 yards that led to a TD at No. 5/4 Nebraska. Against No. 8 Oklahoma, he rushed nine times for 53 yards, including a 24-yard run, and caught six passes for 25 yards. He pulled in a career-high six receptions against UCLA. At Texas Tech, he registered 55 yards and one TD on 15 carries, including a seven-yard TD that gave the Longhorns a 7-0 lead. Against Wyoming, he rushed for 62 yards, including a career-long 39-yard TD run that gave Texas a 27-7 lead. He began the season by rushing nine times for 51 yards, including a long of 21 yards, at Rice. **2009:** After missing the first three games of 2009 with a knee injury, Whittaker returned against UTEP and

posted 38 yards and a TD on four carries. He scored his first TD of the season against Colorado. Whittaker earned the starting job against No. 20/18 Oklahoma and rushed 18 times for 71 yards. He added 36 yards on nine carries, including an 11-yard TD run, at Missouri. For the season, he rushed for 212 yards and four TDs on 53 carries (4.0 ypc). **2008:** After missing the 2008 season-opener against FAU with a knee injury, he saw his first action as a Longhorn at UTEP and rushed for 72 yards on 12 carries (6.0 ypc). He added 20 yards on two carries against No. 11 Missouri and 42 yards on six carries at No. 6 Texas Tech. Whittaker earned the first start of his career against Baylor and rushed for 77 yards on 15 carries. On the season, Whittaker posted 284 yards on 64 carries. Whittaker spent the 2007 season gaining valuable experience on the scout team after finishing his prep career ranked sixth on the all-time Texas 5A rushing chart with 5,717 yards. **Career:** Whittaker has played in 33 career games with 18 starts, rushing for 988 yards and 10 TDs on 225 carries (4.4 ypc), with 65 receptions for 393 yards and one TD.

WILD FOZZY: Eight times this season RB Fozzy Whittaker has lined up behind center and taken direct snaps resulting in 75 rushing yards and three TDs. He had a seven-yard TD run against Rice, a 36-yarder at UCLA and a 16-yarder at Iowa State. He also took a direct snap that led to a speed sweep, reverse pass that ended with a 40-yard touchdown pass from David Ash to Jaxon Shipley against the Cyclones.

BROWN CONTRIBUTES EARLY: Freshman RB Malcolm Brown has added to Texas' running game this season, leading the team in rushing in all four games. He has tallied 327 yards on 67 carries with one touchdown. In the 2011 season opener against Rice, he recorded a team-high 86 yards on 16 carries. It was the best perfor-

mance to open a career by a UT running back since Jamaal Charles ran for 135 yards on 14 carries in 2005. He followed that by leading the Horns in rushing with 68 yards on 14 carries (4.3 ypc) against BYU. At UCLA, Brown broke the century mark for the first time in his career with 110 yards and one TD on 22 carries (5.0 ypc). His 16-yard TD run gave the Longhorns a 21-0 lead in the second quarter. At Iowa State he had a team-high 63 yards on 15 attempts. Overall, his 81.8 ypg is third among true freshmen in the NCAA, trailing only Anthony Samuel of Bowling Green (107.0 ypg) and Isaiah Crowell of Georgia (103.0 ypg).

TOUGH TO TAKE DOWN: Freshman RB Malcolm Brown has shown the ability to earn yards after contact. Through four games, 171 of his 327 yards (52.3%) have come after contact. His powerful running has also helped him surge into the defensive backfield. Of his 67 carries, only eight have been for a loss or no gain and those have been for a total of only minus-13 yards.

IRBY, GRANT RETURN: After almost three years away from game action, TE Blaine Irby returned to action in the season-opener against Rice after a serious knee injury that kept him out since it occurred on Sept. 20, 2008, against the Owls in Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium. The Camarillo, Calif. native has played in 18 career games, starting four, and has recorded 12 receptions for 124 yards and two TDs. Fellow TE D.J. Grant also returned following his own serious knee injury that kept him out since it occurred in fall camp of 2009. After redshirting in 2008, Grant missed the 2009 and 2010 seasons due to the injury. Grant made his first catch of the season against BYU, converting a fourth down for five yards in the third quarter. He then erupted at UCLA with six catches for 77 yards and three TDs. Grant caught TD passes of 45 yards, two yards and five yards, including the five-yarder from WR Jaxon Shipley. For his efforts, Grant was named national tight end of the week by the College Football Performance Awards. He also added a 19-yard reception at Iowa State to give him eight catches for 101 yards and three touchdowns this year.

RECENT O-LINE SUCCESS: The Texas offensive line has been one of the nation's steadiest units over the past five

seasons and that has been reflected in their presence in the NFL. The pipeline over the last five years began with OT Jonathan Scott, who was taken in the fifth round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions and is now playing with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Then, in the 2007 draft, the Horns had two players, OL Justin Blalock and OG Kasey Studdard, picked. Blalock was selected in the second round by the Atlanta Falcons and has started all 65 games of his professional career, while Studdard was taken in the sixth round by the Houston Texans. In addition, C Lyle Sendlein signed with the Arizona Cardinals as a free agent and has become the starter, including all 20 games of the Cardinals' 2008 run to the Super Bowl. Then, in 2008, the Horns dealt with the departure of two seniors from 2007 in OT Tony Hills, a first-team All-America selection who was drafted in the fourth round by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and C Dallas Griffin, who won the Draddy Trophy and was an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection. OL Kyle Hix and OG Michael Huey were the latest to join the group as they signed as free agents with the New England Patriots and San Diego Chargers, respectively.

EXPERIENCED FRONT: Despite losing three starters from last year's offensive line, the 2011 line features two seniors and a pair of sophomores that all have valuable game experience. Gone from 2010 are LT Kyle Hix, LG Michael Huey and RT Britt Mitchell. The four returners have appeared in 110 games. Senior OT Tray Allen, who missed the 2010 season due to a foot injury, has seen action in 35 games working at both tackle and guard. Senior C/OG David Snow has played in all 43 games of his career including 23 starts and earned UT's Bevo Beast Award in each of the last two games against UCLA and Iowa State. He started at center in all 12 games during the 2010 season. Sophomore Mason Walters has recorded 16 starts, including every game during 2010 and earned the Bevo Beast Award with 17 knockdowns against BYU. Sophomore Trey Hopkins has played in 16 career games with eight starts, including the first four of the season at right tackle, while redshirt freshman Dominic Espinosa has established himself at the center position and has started the first four games of 2011.

MANNING THE MIDDLE: The defensive tackles unit has been a major reason why Texas' rush defense has ranked in the top six nationally in four of the last five seasons. The Horns finished the 2010 season ranked 44th (138.6 ypg) in rush defense, led the nation in 2009 allowing just 72.4 ypg, and finished third in 2008 (83.5 ypg), sixth in '07 (93.4 ypg) and third in '06 (61.2 ypg). Of the group manning the middle over the last four seasons, four have gone on to the NFL. DTs Frank Okam and Derek Lokey combined to play in 83 games, while making 60 starts during their four-year careers that included '06 and '07. Okam, who was a third-team All-American in '07 before being drafted in the fifth round by the Houston Texans, finished his career with 160 tackles, 10 sacks, 28 TFL, 12 PBD, one forced fumble and five fumble recoveries. Lokey garnered first-team All-Big 12 honors in '07 and earned a spot on the Kansas City Chiefs' practice squad during the 2008 season. He finished his career with 101 tackles, three sacks, 18 TFL, three PBD and a fumble recovery. Roy Miller played a major role on all three defenses prior to being drafted in the third round of the 2009 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Miller finished his career with 138 tackles, 10 sacks, 25 TFL, 44 pressures, six PBD, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Lamarr Houston was a second-round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders in the 2010 draft. Houston played

in 50 career games, starting 33, at defensive tackle (21) and defensive end (12) and notched 170 tackles, 15 sacks, 43 TFL, 65 pressures, 13 PBD, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble during his career.

Kheeston Randall: Senior Kheeston Randall, who is on the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy watch lists, led the defensive tackles group in 2010. Through four games this season, Randall has five tackles, three pressures and a PBU, while helping anchor a run defense that is allowing just 110.8 ypg, including only 43 yards against BYU. It also held UCLA over 100 yards below its season average entering the game. Randall has played in 38 career games, including all 12 games in 2010 where he recorded 39 tackles, including 13 TFL, one sack, eight pressures, three PBU and two blocked kicks. Randall had three tackles, one TFL and blocked a FG against Florida Atlantic. He registered two tackles, one pressure and a blocked PAT against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. He had three tackles, one TFL and one pressure versus No. 25/24 Baylor. Against Iowa State, he notched four tackles, one PBD and one pressure. Randall also recorded four tackles with one TFL and two pressures at No. 5/4 Nebraska after notching six tackles with three TFL and a pressure against No. 8 Oklahoma. Against UCLA, he tallied five tackles. He registered two tackles, one sack, two TFL and one pressure at Texas Tech. That followed two tackles, two TFL and a PBD against Wyoming after opening with three tackles and two TFL at Rice.

END TO END: Junior Alex Okafor and sophomore Jackson Jeffcoat have started together at the end positions for the first four games to open the 2011. Okafor now has 12 starts in 30 career games during which he has totaled 62 tackles (28 solo), eight TFL, 2.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Against Rice, he notched two tackles with one TFL. He followed that with two tackles, one PBU and two pressures against BYU. At UCLA, he posted one tackle, one PBU and one pressure. He had his best game of the season at Iowa State with five tackles, one TFL, one fumble recovery and one pressure. Jeffcoat, who was named honorable mention Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year in 2010, made his sixth start in 12 career games against Iowa State. He posted a career high six tackles to go along with

one pressure at UCLA. He has totaled 29 career tackles with seven TFL, 2.5 sacks and one fumble recovery.

SENIOR BACKERS: Seniors Emmanuel Acho and Keenan Robinson gained valuable experience during the 2010 season as the starting linebackers, following the loss of Roddrick Muckelroy to the NFL. Last season, they combined for 200 tackles with Robinson leading the team (130) and Acho ranking second (87). They also combined for 20 TFL, five sacks, three fumble recoveries, three forced fumbles, three INTs, eight PBU and five pressures. They will be supported this season by sophomore Jordan Hicks. Hicks has now appeared in 16 games with 47 tackles, three PBU, one sack, one TFL and two pressures. He posted an 11-tackle game at No. 5/4 Nebraska during the 2010 season and had another 11-tackle game against BYU this season.

Emmanuel Acho: Acho, who is a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy and on the watch list for the 2011 Lott IMPACT Trophy and Butkus Award, leads the team in several defensive categories including tackles (30), tackles for loss (5.5), sacks (2.0) and pressures (5). He opened the 2011 season with a team-high 10 tackles (three solo) and registered one pressure against Rice. He recorded his second-straight double-figures tackling game and once again led the team with 13 against BYU to go along with one TFL, one PBU and one pressure, and followed that with his third by posting 10 tackles, one sack, two TFL, one PBU and three pressures at UCLA. He tied for the team lead with eight tackles at Iowa State with two tackles for loss and one sack in the game. **2010:** Acho recorded 87 tackles, three sacks, 12 TFL, six PBU, five pressures, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one INT last season. He had six tackles each against Rice and Wyoming. At Texas Tech, he tallied four tackles, two PBU, two pressures and one forced fumble. He matched his previous career high with seven tackles against UCLA before exceeding that with a 17-tackle (11 solo) performance against No. 8 Oklahoma that included five TFL, one sack and one forced fumble which almost provided the Longhorns a chance to tie. He was named the nation's top LB for the week by the College Football Performance Awards. Acho tallied seven tackles and one TFL at No. 5/4 Nebraska.

He missed the Iowa State game with an injury. Acho returned with 10 tackles, one TFL and one PBU against No. 25/24 Baylor before recording nine tackles and two TFL at Kansas State. He then added nine more tackles and one PBU against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. Against Florida Atlantic he tallied six tackles and a 57-yard INT return for a TD. He posted six tackles, one sack, one TFL and one pressure against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. **2009:** Acho posted 49 tackles (36 solo), two sacks, 10 TFL, three pressures, an INT, a PBU, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. His three forced fumbles were tied for the fifth most nationally. He started the season by posting three tackles and a forced fumble against ULM. Against Texas Tech, Acho tallied four tackles, two TFL and two forced fumbles. He led the team in tackles with seven against UTEP to go along with a sack, three TFL and two pressures. Acho added five tackles and three TFL against Colorado. Versus No. 20/18 Oklahoma, Acho posted two tackles and two fumble recoveries. He added five tackles at Missouri. Acho notched six tackles and a TFL at No. 13/13 Oklahoma State before posting five tackles and a sack versus UCF. He added three tackles, his first career INT and a PBU at Baylor. **Acho Career:** For his career, Acho has posted 190 tackles (112 solo), seven sacks, 27.5 TFL, 15 pressures, two INTs (one TD return), nine PBU, six forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in 39 games (17 starts).

Keenan Robinson: Robinson, who is on the Butkus Award, Bednarik Award, Nagurski Trophy and Lombardi Award watch lists, recorded eight tackles (two solo) in the 2011 season opener against Rice. He added five tackles (four solo), one TFL, two PBU and two pressures against BYU. At UCLA, he posted nine tackles (six solo), one PBU and three pressures. This past week at Iowa State Robinson forced a fumble to go along with five tackles. **2010:** Robinson led the team in 2010 with 113 tackles (61 solo), to go along with eight TFL, two sacks, two INTs, two PBU, two fumble recoveries, and a forced fumble. He was named the nation's top LB by the College Football Performance Awards and the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week

for his efforts against Rice, which included six tackles, a 10-yard fumble return for a TD, an INT and a TFL. Against Wyoming, he added eight tackles and a sack. He posted eight more tackles at Texas Tech, nine against UCLA and then had a career-high 19, including two TFL, against No. 8 Oklahoma. It was the third time in the Mack Brown era a player has recorded at least 19 tackles in a game. Robinson recorded seven tackles and recovered the fumble that led to Texas' first TD at No. 5/4 Nebraska, despite missing the second half with an injury. He returned against Iowa State and notched eight tackles and one INT. Against No. 25/24 Baylor, he notched nine tackles, one sack and two TFL. He recorded 12 tackles, one TFL and one forced fumble at Kansas State before registering 10 tackles, one TFL and one PBU against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State and four tackles against Florida Atlantic. **2009:** Robinson started all 14 games in 2009 and posted 74 tackles (42 solo), 1.5 sacks, four TFL, one pressure and four PBU. He opened the season with three tackles, a TFL and a PBU against ULM. Robinson added five tackles and a PBU at Wyoming before notching six tackles against Texas Tech. He posted six tackles against Colorado and had four tackles and a PBU versus No. 20/18 Oklahoma. Robinson added six tackles at Missouri and six tackles, a TFL and a pressure at No. 13/13 Oklahoma State. He posted three tackles versus UCF and had six tackles and a PBU at Baylor. He added four tackles and a sack against Kansas and six tackles at Texas A&M. Robinson posted the first 10-tackle game of his career in the Big 12 Championship game against Nebraska with 10. He then added seven tackles and a sack in the BCS National Championship Game against Alabama. **Robinson Career:** For his career, Robinson has posted 238 tackles (134 solo), 4.5 sacks, 16 TFL, two INTs, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles, eight pressures and 10 PBU in 42 games (30 starts).

Jordan Hicks: Second-year linebacker Jordan Hicks made his first career start against Rice and tallied five tackles (four solo) and two PBU. In his second start, Hicks recorded the second double-digit

tackle game of his career with 11 against BYU to go along with one PBU and one pressure before adding five tackles at UCLA. He also had three tackles at Iowa State. He played in all 12 games in 2010 and posted 23 tackles, one sack, one TFL and one pressure.

19 TACKLES: With his 19-tackle game against No. 8 Oklahoma last season, LB Keenan Robinson became the third player in the Mack Brown era to reach that mark, joining S Michael Griffin (25, at Texas A&M, 2005) and S Ahmad Brooks (22, vs. Colorado, Big 12 Championship, 2001).

FAMILIAR FACES: Despite the loss of Chykie Brown, Curtis Brown and Aaron Williams to the NFL, the Longhorns returned a talented secondary this season, led by senior S Blake Gideon who has started all 43 games of his career. Gideon is joined by senior Christian Scott, junior Kenny Vaccaro and sophomores Carrington Byndom and Adrian Phillips. Overall the five returners have combined to play in 129 games with 70 starts. The group has combined for 15 career INTs.

DID YOU KNOW?

Since Duane Akina arrived at Texas in 2001, 11 of his 12 cornerbacks have gone on to play in the NFL. Ten are currently active, while the other, Rod Babers, played for two years with the Detroit Lions. The group includes three first-round draft picks (Quentin Jammer, 2002; Michael Huff, 2006; Aaron Ross, 2007), two Thorpe Award winners (Michael Huff, 2006; Aaron Ross, 2007), a Thorpe Award finalist (Quentin Jammer, 2001), a Super Bowl Champion (Aaron Ross, 2007) and a Pro Bowler (Nathan Vasher, 2006). Most recently, three from the 2010 season who all shared time at starter were signed by the NFL, led by Aaron Williams who was the 34th pick of the 2011 draft.

Blake Gideon: Blake Gideon, who is on the Thorpe Award watch list, has started all 43 games the Longhorns have played since arriving at Texas as a true freshman in 2008. He opened 2011 with two tackles against Rice and added three against BYU. At UCLA, he posted eight tackles, one fumble recovery and two PBU. He was the top defensive player for UT at Iowa State with eight tackles (seven solo), one TFL, one sack and one interception. **2010:** Gideon had 68 tackles, two INTs, four PBU, one sack, three TFL, one forced fumble and one blocked punt. He posted eight tackles, one PBU and one forced fumble against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. He tallied two tackles, one INT, one PBU and one blocked punt against Florida Atlantic. He had a career-high 13 tackles against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. He notched four tackles and a sack at Kansas State, five tackles against each No. 25/24 Baylor and Iowa State, four tackles at No. 5/4 Nebraska, three each against No. 8 Oklahoma and UCLA, seven at Texas Tech, eight against Wyoming and four at Rice. He also recorded an interception at Texas Tech and returned it 22 yards. **2009:** Gideon posted 62 tackles (35 solo), two TFL, six INTs, five PBU and a fumble recovery. He opened the season by posting four tackles versus ULM. He added eight stops and a PBU at Wyoming and three tackles against Texas Tech. Gideon notched his first career INT against UTEP and then had another one against Colorado to go along with three tackles. He added six tackles versus No. 20/18 Oklahoma. Gideon notched two tackles and an INT at Missouri. He added another INT to go along with two tackles, a TFL and a fumble recovery at No. 13/13 Oklahoma State before posting four tackles versus UCF. Gideon tallied seven tackles at Baylor. He posted the first 10-tackle game of his career against Kansas with 10 stops to go along with two PBU. Gideon added five tackles and a TFL at Texas A&M. He notched two tackles, an INT and a PBU in the Big 12 Championship game against Nebraska and then posted six tackles and an INT in the National Championship Game against Alabama. **2008:** A second-team Freshman All-American and honorable mention All-Big 12 selection as a true freshman in 2008, Gideon finished third on the team with 64 tackles (41 solo) to go along with a TFL, eight pressures, seven PBU and a forced fumble. Gideon posted eight tackles and a PBU in his first Red River Rivalry

game against No. 1 Oklahoma and added five stops and four pressures in UT's victory over No. 10 Ohio State in the Fiesta Bowl. **Career:** For his career, Gideon has tallied 215 tackles (131 solo), seven TFL, eight pressures, nine INTs, 18 PBU, two sacks, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and one blocked punt.

Kenny Vaccaro: Kenny Vaccaro, who has seen action in all 29 games of his career on defense or special teams, including 10 starts, opened the 2011 season with seven tackles (five solo) against Rice. He added five tackles, one PBU and a career-high three pressures against BYU. At UCLA, he set a career high with 13 tackles to go with an INT and a pressure. In the Iowa State game, he notched six tackles, 1.5 TFL, one sack and one pressure. **2010:** Vaccaro posted 56 tackles (42 solo), one interception, four TFL, eight PBU, one blocked kick and one forced fumble. He collected six tackles (four solo), two TFL and one pass breakup against No. 17/18 Texas A&M. He recorded nine tackles (eight solo), one TFL, one interception and two PBU against No. 12/11 Oklahoma State. Vaccaro added a blocked punt at Kansas State and notched a then career-high 11 tackles (eight solo) in his first career start against UCLA. **2009:** Vaccaro appeared in 13 games at safety and on special teams and was twice named the team's Most Productive Performer on special teams. On the season, he posted 19 tackles, including nine special-teams tackles, a forced fumble and a blocked punt. He helped UT rank 12th nationally in scoring defense (16.7 ppg), third in total defense (251.9 ypg), first in rushing defense (72.4 ypg, 10th in pass efficiency defense (100.5 rating) and 19th in pass defense (179.6 pyg). He tallied a season-high six tackles against ULM and added three tackles at Wyoming. Vaccaro recorded his first blocked punt at Baylor. **Career:** For his career, Vaccaro has posted 106 tackles (75 solo), two interceptions, 5.5 TFL, one sack, two forced fumbles, 10 PBU and five pressures.

YOUNG DBS: The DB trio of sophomores Carrington Byndom and Adrian Phillips and freshman Quandre Diggs combined for 13 tackles, two TFL, one fumble recovery and one PBU in the 2011 season-opener against Rice. They followed that effort with 14 tackles, two INTs, two TFL, one forced fumble and two PBU against BYU. They continued their production increase

at UCLA with 15 tackles, two INTs, one forced fumble, one TFL and two PBU. The trio had 11 tackles, three PBU, one caused fumble and 0.5 TFL at Iowa State. Phillips tallied five tackles (two solo) and a first-quarter fumble recovery against Rice and added three tackles, one INT and one TFL against BYU before posting eight tackles (seven solo), one INT, one forced fumble and one TFL at UCLA. Phillips has seen action in 16 games on defense and on special teams over his career. Overall, he has tallied 27 tackles (19 solo), two INTs, three PBU, two TFL, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Byndom tied his career-high with five tackles (three solo), two TFL and one PBU in the opener. He proceeded to break that mark with eight tackles against BYU, including one TFL. He again had five tackles at UCLA with his first career interception and one PBU. At Iowa State he recorded five tackles and two PBU. Byndom has seen action in 16 games on defense and special teams and recorded a total of 43 tackles (34 solo), three TFL, five PBU, one INT, one forced fumble and one blocked punt. In his first game as a Longhorn, true freshman Diggs collected three tackles (one solo). Against BYU, he matched those three tackles, but collected his first career INT and forced fumble, to go along with two PBU before adding two tackles and a PBU at UCLA. He recorded his second forced fumble of the year on a kickoff coverage at Iowa State to go with four tackles and 0.5 tackles for loss. The younger brother of Texas' All-American DB Quentin Jammer (1997-98; 2000-01), Diggs was a pre All-American, two-time all-state and four-time all-district selection at multiple positions at Angleton High School. He was a four-year starter who finished his career with 237 tackles, 19 TFL, six sacks, 10 INTs, 52 PBUs, 11 forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries, seven blocked kicks and returned four INTs and three blocked kicks for TDs. In addition, freshmen Josh Turner, Sheroid Evans, Mykkele Thompson and Leroy Scott have all seen action. Thompson blocked a punt at Iowa State that Turner returned 34 yards for a touchdown.

BREWSTER FORCED TO GIVE UP FOOTBALL: Junior S Nolan Brewster has been forced to give up football due to a history of post-traumatic migraines and concussions over his college and high school careers, he announced on Sept. 26. A 2009 second-team Academic All-Big

12 selection, Brewster played in 30 career games, posting 35 tackles, an INT, two TFL, two PBU and a pressure. He red-shirted in 2010 due to a shoulder injury, but played in 14 games and recorded 24 tackles, two TFL, an INT, a pressure and a PBU for the Longhorns squad that played for the National Championship in 2009. Brewster played in all 13 games as a true freshman for UT's 2008 Fiesta Bowl Championship squad.

BLOCK THAT KICK: The Texas special teams have been just that since Mack Brown took over in 1998. Since then, Texas has blocked 75 kicks (45 punts/17 FGs/13 PATs), an average of 5.4 per season. That is 50 more than the 25 recorded in the 13-year span prior to Brown's arrival. *UT has blocked the second-most kicks in the nation since 2002 with 53* behind Fresno St. (59). At Iowa State, Texas got its first blocked kick of 2011 when Mykkele Thompson blocked a punt in the second quarter. The ball was picked up by Josh Turner, who took it 34 yards for a touchdown, marking the first punt block return for a touchdown since 2009 when Malcolm Williams fell on a blocked punt in the end zone for a score at Missouri. Last year, the Horns blocked five punts with two of them being returned for TDs. Since Brown arrived, the Horns have had players set or equal UT records for career blocked kicks, single-season blocked kicks, career blocked punts and single-season blocked punts.

RETURN GAME: Texas has improved its kick returning and defending on kick-offs and punts since Mack Brown arrived. *Since 1998, the Horns have produced 11 of UT's 28 all-time punt returns for TDs and seven of the 14 kickoff returns for TDs.* In contrast, UT has only given up four punt return TDs during the Mack Brown era. It had been 101 games (Kansas State, 1999) since Texas had given up a punt return for a TD before Kansas State returned one in 2007. That is a major difference from the 12 years prior to Brown's

arrival. During that time, Texas scored on four punt returns, while its opponents scored on seven returns. When Brown arrived in 1998, Texas hadn't returned a kickoff for a score since 1978. Then, in the 2000 Holiday Bowl, Victor Ike returned a kickoff 93 yards for a TD, snapping the 265-game streak. Selvin Young added a 97-yard kickoff return TD against New Mexico State in 2003, Quan Cosby posted a 91-yard kickoff return TD at Texas A&M in 2007 and Jordan Shipley notched a 96-yard kickoff return TD versus Oklahoma in 2008. D.J. Monroe returned two kickoffs for TDs in 2009, an 89-yarder against ULM and a 91-yarder versus UTEP. He is the first player in Texas history to notch two kickoff return TDs in a career. Marquise Goodwin added a 95-yard kickoff return for a TD at Texas A&M. With a punt return for a TD against Colorado, Jordan Shipley tied UT's all-time mark for career punt returns with three. When you add in his 96-yard kickoff return for a TD against Oklahoma in 2008, Shipley set the UT career record for return TDs with four. Texas' five return TDs (two punt/three kickoff) in 2009 are a school record. The Longhorns had two apiece in 1973, 2002, '05, '06 and '08.

PLACE-KICKS: Since 1998, five of Texas' most accurate field goal kickers (Kris Stockton, 1996, '98-2000; Dusty Mangum, 2001-04; Ryan Bailey, 2006-09; Hunter Lawrence, 2006-09; and Justin Tucker, 2008-current) have come during Brown's time at Texas. Lawrence (34-of-39/.872), **Tucker (29-of-34/.853)**, Bailey (25-of-30/.833) and Stockton (58-of-77/.753) rank first, second, third and fourth, respectively, on UT's field-goal accuracy chart (min. 25 attempts). *Senior PK Justin Tucker, who is on the Lou Groza watch list, joined the group after qualifying with his 25th attempt against Florida Atlantic in 2010. His 23 made FGs were sixth nationally in 2010 and were second on the UT single-season list, trailing only Hunter Lawrence (24, 2009), while his .852 percentage ranked third on the single-season list.* Mangum (121), Lawrence (76), Bailey (60) and Stockton (57) also are at the top of UT's consecutive made extra points list. In 2011 Tucker has made 6-of-7 (.857) field goal attempts, including his first five of the season. He had three made field goals at Iowa State, marking the third time in his career he has made three or more in a game.

LONG RANGE: Senior PK Justin Tucker's 51-yard field goal attempt at the beginning of the second quarter against Rice in 2010 was the third-longest initial field goal attempt ever by a UT player (Mark Schultis - 55, at Texas Tech (1994); Kris Stockton - 52, vs. New Mexico State (1998)). All three field goal attempts were made. Tucker joined Schultis (55, at Texas Tech - 1994); Stockton (52, vs. New Mexico State - 1998) and Phil Dawson (50, at Pittsburgh - 1994) to become the fourth UT player to make a field goal of 50 or more yards on his first collegiate attempt. Tucker also became the first UT player to start his career with two field goal attempts of 50 or more yards. For the season, Tucker went 23-of-27 on FG and 27-of-27 on PAT. He earned Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week honors against No. 5/4 Nebraska when he punted four times for an average of 47.2 yards, including kicks of 67 and 55 yards with two stopping inside the Huskers' 5-yard line. He also made FGs of 27 and 28 yards and two extra points for a total of eight points. He matched the UT single-game high for made FGs with five against No. 25/24 Baylor, including one from 49 yards out.

DOUBLE LONG RANGE: With a 67-yard punt at No. 5/4 Nebraska in 2010, junior Justin Tucker became the fourth UT player since 1953 to record both a 50-yard FG and a 60-yard punt in the same season. The others were John Goodson in 1980, Mike Dean in 1974, and Russell Erxleben, who accomplished it three times from 1976-78.

THAT 70s KICK: K Justin Tucker kicked a 70-yard punt against Iowa State in 2010, becoming the first UT punter in 105 games to clear 70 yards. The last one was 71 yards by Brian Bradford against Oklahoma State in 2002.

- 65:** Texas has won 65 road and neutral site games since 1999, which is the most in the nation.
- 70:** Texas has won 70-of-81 home games (86.4%) under Mack Brown
- 75:** Texas has blocked 75 kicks in 14 seasons under Mack Brown, an average of about six per season.
- 77:** UT has scored 77 non-offensive TDs since 1999, which is second nationally. Its 11 in 2009 ranked first nationally.
- 86:** Texas' 86 appearances in the BCS standings are the most of any team in the country.
- 92:** Texas' 92 wins in Big 12 play are the most of any team in the conference. Oklahoma is second with 87.

USE OF AUDIO/VIDEO IN COVERAGE

Any media entity collecting "video or audio materials" (film, traditional video or audio, digital video or audio, photos, etc.) from University of Texas Athletics events (games, practices, post-practice/post-game interviews and press conferences) may use that material only for traditional television newscasts, Web-based or print coverage, or other electronic transmission as approved by The University in writing, with a limitation of up to three (3) minutes in length from any single event. Its usage also must be used only as supporting video/audio for a reported story and not simply as rebroadcasted/streamed highlights or interview sessions. Such media entity may not offer any live video, audio or other coverage of the event (or tape-delay rebroadcast coverage in its entirety) without the advance, written permission of The University of Texas Athletics Department.

POSTGAME

The Longhorns' locker room is closed. Interview requests should be given to Assistant AD for Media Relations John Bianco. Requested players will be brought to the Moncrief-Neuhaus Athletics Complex meeting rooms following home contests and to a designated interview area at road games. **NO INTERVIEWS ARE TO BE CONDUCTED ON THE FIELD FOLLOWING THE GAME.** After a NCAA required and team-enforced 10-minute cooling off period, players and coaches will be escorted to the interview area. Failure to abide by this rule will result in termination of credential.

POST-PRACTICE AVAILABILITY

Practices are closed to the public and media. Players and assistant coaches are available by request after Tuesday's practice and assistant head coaches Major Applewhite and Duane Akina are available following Wednesday's practice to wrap up the week.
